## LONG CHANCE BY LOSER ON FINAL HOLE GIVES WIN

### Billows Cuts Early Lead To One Up, One To Go On 36—Then Over Shoots.

second shot, trying to reach the green of the 561-yard hole. The big gamble failed. He pushed the ball to the right. It rolled off the fairway, hit a woman spectator and dropped into the rough.

The Finish  
Goodman, meanwhile, approached to within six feet of the pin. Billows came out strongly and the ball rolled 25 feet past the cup. His putt, too, was bold, and overran by a couple of feet.

The match ended then, Billows smiled, walked over to his rival and shook hands, thus conceding Goodman a birdie 4 on the 36th.

At no time of the match was Billows in front. Goodman shot the first nine in one under par 36 to Billows' 37 for a one-hole margin. He was 2 up at the 18th and 3 up at the 27th.

Goodman won the second with a par 4. Billows finding trouble in the rough and having a weak out. They halved two holes, the 510-yard fourth in birdie 4, and Johnny made it two up with a par on the next.

Billows' second shot banged against the pin on the eighth and he won it by tapping the two-inch putt in for a birdie 3.

The Omaha boy took the 10th with a par 4 to go two up again. Billows' second shot carrying over the green and hitting a tree to fall in deep rough.

New Yorker Strong  
Two birdies, a two on the 192-yard 11th and a 3 on the 149-yard 12th, put Billows on even terms with his rival. The New Yorker rammed down 12 and 30-foot putts respectively.

Billows lost the 13th when he failed to jump a short styrie, but he squared the count when Goodman was unable to get a five-footer down on the next hole, taking a bogie 4.

A birdie 4 on the 510-yard 15th—resulting from a 70-yard approach six feet over the cup—put Goodman one up again and he made it two on the 16th where Billows was trapped and muffed the out. Last two holes of the morning round were halved in par.

Billows came out after lunch to win the 19th with an eagle 3, putting his second up to within a foot of the cup. But Goodman made it 3 up again with a par 4 on the 20th. He held that margin for the next two holes, lost the 23rd and came back with a birdie 4 on the 24th and a par 4 on the 25th to go three up, a lead he held as they moved through the 27th.

Stymie Costly  
A stymie cost Billows the 28th and he seemed destined to go down to a one-sided defeat as Goodman posted a four-hole advantage.

But the youngster from the country by the Hudson river wasn't through yet. He pitched up from a bank to within six feet to win the 29th with a par 3 while Goodman was musing up the hole to take a 5. The next three were halved in even pars. Billows kept pounding away to win the 510-yard 33rd with a birdie 4 after knocking his shirt up to within six feet of the cup.

Johnny meanwhile bobbed on an eight-foot try, the ball stopping six inches away. That made the count two up in his favor. On the 34th Billows won with a standard 3. Goodman conceded after a weak chip, then over-running the pin.

They halved the 35th in 4s. It was one up and one to go. Billows made his one last try. It failed. The crowd gave a great ovation to a new champion.

The medal scores were the same for the day in reverse order. In the morning Goodman scored 72 on Billows' 73, and in the afternoon it was Billows with 72 and Goodman with 73. The total for the day, 145, was one over par.

In winning the national, the 28-year old Goodman achieved the ambition of all top flight Simon-pures—to win both the amateur and open championships.

He led the field in the open in 1933.

## CUBS SPLIT WITH BOSTON TO KEEP SLIM FLAG LEAD

### Hubbell Routed But Giants Down Pirates Twice—Phillies Surge.

BOSTON, Aug. 28.—(AP)—It was a gloomy birthday for Manager Charlie Grimm today until Relief Pitcher Clay Bryant belted a 10th inning homer to give the Cubs an even break with the Boston Bees and keep them in first place of the National league.

Bryant's circuit clout brought four runs and a 10 to 7 victory in the nightcap after Rookie Lou Pette had set down the Cubs 3 to 1 in the opener.

The Giants' double victory over the Pirates alloted the Chicago lead to less than a full game.

The homer, coming on Grimm's 35th birthday, climaxed a knock 'em down, drag 'em out second game which saw seven pitchers lambasted for 26 hits, four being home runs.

Pette hung up his 15th victory of the season in muffling the Cubs with five hits in the opener. Ray Mueller's double after DiMaggio had walked and Red singled in the second inning, did the damage as the Bees best Tex Carleton, their oft-time jinx.
