Year's Biggest Fish Tale Yielded by Diamond Lake

The tale concerns Mrs. John Bohnert, daughter of Mrs. Tracy, and an unfortunate Diamond Lake trout. Mrs. Bohnert and family and friends have just returned from a 10-day vacation at the lake.

Mrs. Bohnert is an ardent fisherwoman and went out on the lake last Sunday morning with her sister, Arlene Inmann, and Freddie Coffman of Klamath Falls.

After landing a 23 1/2 inch trout, Mrs. Bohnert set out her line again with her favorite midjoreno lure. The lure was quickly snapped up again but just as the catch had been drawn almost to the boat, he broke the leader and escaped.

After initiating a new lure by catching a 22-inch trout, Mrs. Bohnert and companions returned to the spot of the loss of her midjoreno in the hope that the fish had ejected it. On the surface of the water they saw an apparently dead fish, floating bottom-up. A vigorous tail-flapping, however, proved life and they hastened to land him with a net.

It was the same fish previously hooked. The leader had become tightly wrapped around its gills, shutting off air. The lure was found in the fish's mouth. The trout was 18 inches long.

Among Mrs. Bohnert's catches at the lake was a 26-inch rainbow, weighing 7 1/4 pounds, caught August 15.

PORTLAND GERMAN CHURCH DIVIDED

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 28—(AP)—Splitting over the matter of language, the congregation of the First German Baptist church of Portland, largest church of the denomination in the United States, will divide into two separate units, the Rev. F. W. Mueller, who recently resigned as pastor, said today.

Mr. Mueller, who will have charge of the new unit, preaches in both English and German. He succeeded Dr. Jacob Kratt, who delivered his sermons in German only, in 1936.

"There is no bitter feeling," he said. "We are going out because we refuse to be handicapped."
