

CROWD OF 1000 DUE TO ATTEND GOLD HILL FAIR

Northwest County Fete Program Includes Barbecue, Parade, Games, Dancing—Exhibits in 5 Buildings

Final plans are rapidly being completed for the annual northwest Jackson county fair to be staged in Gold Hill September 18. Members of the fair board and committees in charge of the event state that this year's fair will be the most successful of all.

Mrs. Icie Walker and the committee in charge of the barbecue have announced that the menu will consist of real barbecued meat, mashed potatoes and brown gravy, sandwiches, cheese and crackers and coffee. The finest young beef in the valley has been secured for the free feed and plans are being made to handle at least 1000 persons. The barbecue kitchen on the city hall grounds will be used to prepare the meal. Those who attend are asked to bring their own silver and a good appetite.

A feature of the fair will be the parade starting at 10 a. m. A band has been procured for the event and there is expected to be keen competition for the many cash prizes. Nearly every merchant, organization, school and citizen in Gold Hill are expected to take part. Mrs. Pete Krause and Bill Puhl have promised a surprise for their contribution this year.

To Hold Contests
During the afternoon, races and various contests will be staged with a polo game and tug-of-war by the Granges featured. The barbecue will be served at 6 o'clock and a dance will round out the day's entertainment.

Exhibits will be open September 17 and 18, and will be housed in the five buildings the same as last year. Mrs. S. K. Barnes, chairman of the canning department, urges exhibitors to observe the following rules:

- (1) Food products must be protected from dust and flies. Fruit jars, jelly glasses and other food containers must be clean and labeled; (2) housewives should be encouraged to bring canned products of good quality prepared for home use rather than fancy pack; (3) the method used and length of time processed must be on the labels.

JOHN C. INGLING, 90, CIVIL WAR VETERAN, DIES IN GOLD HILL

John C. Ingling, one of the few remaining Civil War veterans of southern Oregon, passed away at his home in Gold Hill early this morning at the age of nearly 90.

Mr. Ingling was born in Michigan October 22, 1847. He enlisted for service in the Civil War in Company F, 12th regiment, Michigan Infantry.

He came to Gold Hill in 1919 where Mrs. Ingling passed away in 1926, and where he had since resided. Mr. Ingling was the father of nine children, two of whom, Charles and Ella, are deceased. Surviving are Mrs. Ina Millspaugh and Myrtle Millspaugh of Portland; Alta VanEman, Pasadena, Calif.; Jessie Akina, Waverly, N. Y.; Edith Bornemann, Gold Hill; Harry R. Ingling of Medford and Arthur of Albany, N. Y. Also two sisters and one brother survive.

Funeral services will be held in the I. O. O. F. hall, Gold Hill, at 2 p. m. Thursday with Rev. Garland of Talent officiating. Interment in Gold Hill cemetery. Conger funeral parlors in charge of arrangements.

RUSSIAN VESSEL SUNK BY UNIDENTIFIED SUB IN SPANISH WAR ZONE

The Russian steamer Timiryazev was reported today to have been torpedoed and sunk in Mediterranean by a submarine of unknown nationality. Algerian fishermen were said to have picked up 29 of the Timiryazev's crew after the attack last night.

Capture of several strategic mountain positions, some as high as 10,000 feet, in the Sierra Nevada range west of Almeria, was announced by Spain's government today, telling of a new offensive in southern Spain. Government troops also wrested strategic positions from insurgents in the vicinity of Orjiva, Darnajo and Calar, points overlooking Granada.

Generalissimo Francisco Franco's Aragon forces have broken through the government's lines on the Zaragoza front, an insurgent communiqué said. Fighting raged both north and south of Zaragoza.

fire in Hongkew, brought millions of disease carrying rats and insects to the area north of Soochow creek.

Sanitary officers from the international settlement were seriously hampered in their work there. The Japanese military insisted the stricken sections be closed because of the presence of looters and the danger

of Chinese troops returning there from the north and west.

Japanese were firing the bodies after saturating them with gasoline. This in itself horrified the surviving Chinese for they believe, the burning of a body means there can be no redemption in the life beyond.

The bombing of the Lung Shan created a panic, although no damage was reported. The ship was bombed near Woosung, north of Shanghai, where the Whangpoo and Yangtze rivers flow together for the embattled city's only waterway—and only avenue of escape—to the sea.

A Domei (Japanese) news agency dispatch said the invaders had occupied the Woosung forts.

The forts, China's vital defenses on the lower Whangpoo, had been held by at least one division of Chinese troops despite almost incessant Japanese aerial, naval and artillery

bombardments for more than two weeks.

Chinese deny advance. Chinese denied that the Japanese had started an advance from the Woosung area.

They declared Chinese forces had repelled a Japanese attack and that the Japanese were barely holding their lines in that sector, about 12 miles from Shanghai.

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, virtual civil and military commander of war-time China, in effect, demanded immediate foreign intervention to end the hostilities.

Chiang warned at Nanking that "Japanese aggression" to establish "a continental empire for herself" is a threat not only to the sovereignty of China but also to "international safety."

Flight Or Death.

The frightened populace reacted, at first. They fled, however, when Japanese police convinced them they had a choice between flight and death.

Japan's action in warning the native population of an impending attack was believed to have been inspired by sharp reaction a broad road against sudden Japanese attacks in which thousands of non-combatant Chinese have been killed or maimed.

Advices from Peiping said American consular officials in north China were alarmed for the safety of 99 United States missionaries who have not been heard from since the Tsinan consulate was evacuated Friday.

They and 40 others are believed to be caught before parallel Japanese columns advancing southward from Peiping and Tientsin. When Japanese evacuation of the northern part of Tientsin is completed, possibly to-

day, there will be no way of escape from the war except by a long, hazardous land journey to the south.

Chiang Warns World. Generalissimo Chiang, warning of commercial and political consequences to the rest of the world, of Japanese domination of China, declared: "The question of intervention rests with the powers which, like the United States, created the Kellogg pact and nine-power treaty and who organized the League of Nations with its covenant. A distinct responsibility rests on the shoulders of someone to prevent the utter ruin of China."

(In Geneva, meanwhile, Chinese delegates to the League of Nations placed the whole blame for the war on Japan's "irrevocable policy of military conquest and expansion." The Chinese called it "a case of aggression pure and simple," but framed their letter as a statement, not as an appeal for league action.)
