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RAINFALL SEASON SLIGHTLY BELOW NORMAL AVERAGE

As September 1 opened a new rainfall season, weather bureau records showed total rainfall of the season just closed was slightly below normal despite high averages during spring and early summer months.

From September 1, 1936 to September 1, 1937, a total of 16.39 inches of rainfall was recorded, as compared with the normal of 18.08, leaving a deficiency of 1.69 inches.

The fall months last year were extremely dry, resulting in a deficiency of over 5 inches at one time. Every month since January, 1937, however, showed a precipitation excess except July and August.

Although the mean temperature of 69.6 degrees for the month just past is lower than average, it is not at all unusual, weather officials report.
