

# College Stars Tackle Packers in Annual Grid Spectacle Tonight

## 'SLINGING' SAM WILL LEAD STARS AERIAL OFFENSE

Four All-Americans Slated for Lineup at Kickoff — Best Green Bay Talent Will Start for Pro Champs

CHICAGO, Sept. 1.—(AP)—It'll be football time but certainly not football weather when the College All-Stars and the professional champion Green Bay Packers meet at Soldier Field tonight.

Forecaster J. R. Lloyd said anticipated weather for this afternoon would disappear by kickoff time 7:30 p. m. (central standard time) but for that hour he predicted "temperature about 80; humidity high."

CHICAGO, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Green Bay Packers, current last word in professional football accomplishment, will take their turn on the spot against selected college talent tonight before 85,000 fans at Soldier Field in the fourth annual all-star gridiron spectacle.

The Packers, like the Chicago Bears, and Detroit Lions, their predecessors in football's biggest one-night stand, will defend the prestige of professional football against the collegiate brand. The All-Stars, 65 hunkies selected by more than 5,000,000 fans as the brightest stars of the 1936 college season, will be defending only their individual reputations, leaving most of the pressure on the professionals.

Baugh Heads Offense  
Charles E. (Gus) Dorais of the University of Detroit, a specialist in forward passing, who also was selected by the fans to head the all-star coaching staff, has drilled his squad for 17 days, with most of the offensive sessions devoted to an aerial game built around "Blingin Sam" Baugh, Texas Christian's great shrapnel shooter. He had a host of other flankers at his disposal, notably Ray Sulvid of Marquette, Vernon Huffman of Indiana, and big Sam Francis of Nebraska but apparently has decided to leave the victory or defeat question up to Baugh.

Dorais will start the first eleven men named by the fans—a lineup which did not include Baugh—but after the opening kickoff will be at liberty to send in anyone on the squad, and Baugh is expected to make his appearance without much delay.

Four All-Americans  
The All-Star team, which will be out there at the kickoff, included four members of the 1936 All-American, Geynell Tinsley of Louisiana State, end; Ed Widsch, Minnesota, tackle; Max Starovich of Washington, guard; Averil Daniell of Pittsburgh, the other tackle, and Francis. The Packers, who moved through their professional opposition last year with a combination of slambang running offense and a great passing game manned by Arnie Herber and Don Hutson, will send their best onto the field at the start.

Two new faces and one old will appear on next week's wrestling card, which will be moved back to the Medford armory. Promoter Mack Lillard announced today.

Young Zbyzsko of Poland, a nephew of the great Stanislaus Zbyzsko, former champion of the world, will make his first southern Oregon appearance, as will Gottlieb Gogol of Buenos Aires, a hairy monster who is rated one of the dirtiest in the game. Lea Wolfe of Texas will also be on the card, returning after an absence of over a year.

Lillard said that he might hold Marshall Carter over for more local matches.

Billy Hulen Says:  
Southern Oregon Golf Tournament Classic of Area

One of the year's major sporting events for southern Oregon will take place starting Friday and lasting through Monday, Labor Day, when the Rogue Valley Golf club stages its ninth annual southern Oregon-Oregon-California golf tournament over the nitty 18-hole layout which late H. Chandler Egan designed and founded way back in 1911.

For the past eight years, members of the local golf club have figuratively worked their fingers to the bone to make this a really "big" event. That they have been successful is attested by the fact that the tourney, at least during the past two years, has been the most important in Oregon outside the state meet, and one of the finest in northern California north of Sacramento.

At least 150 golfers from north, south, east and west are expected to enter this year. The 18-hole qualifying rounds will be shot off Friday with the match play in all flights being staged Saturday, Sunday and Monday. The 36-hole championship finals will be played Monday. Defending Champion Eddie Simmons will again be entered, as will two more of Medford's ace shotmakers—Leland Clark, Jr. and big Bob Hammond. Ashland will send its brilliant Hubert Bentley down for a crack at the title, and many more stars from other cities will pit their skill against each other.

After the way the Egan memorial fountain dedication program was handled two weeks ago, there can be no doubt in anybody's mind that nothing will be left undone by those in charge toward making this year's meeting the best of them all. And, that's just what local officials are figuring on.

The athletic depression in northwest colleges is over for good. When the University of Montana was voted back into the Pacific coast conference, northern division, basketball race the five big universities admitted once and for all that the wolf, that more than sniffed at their back doors for several years, had departed for better hunting grounds.

Montana, which never turned out such hot quints anyway, was dropped from the northern division circuit about four years ago. It was plenty slim pickings for all the schools along about then, and the long trip to Missoula didn't help financial matters any. Montana never drew many paying customers even at home, and while on the road, played to even more meagre crowds. Last year, all northern division schools showed sharp attendance increases, which no doubt accounts for the readmittance of the Grizzlies.

So this coming winter, it will be a six-cornered battle for the title and right to meet the southern division winner for the coast championship.

LOUIS TO TAKE REST; BOUT WITH SCHMELING OUT OF FALL PICTURE  
DETROIT, Sept. 1.—(AP)—A defense of the heavyweight title against Max Schmeling this fall was announced as definitely out of the picture for Joe Louis today.

A rest of two months, possibly six, was recommended for Louis by physicians who studied x-ray photographs of the hands he injured in defending his title against Tommy Farr Monday night in New York.

No fracture was disclosed but the x-rays showed badly bruised muscles and tendons around the knuckles of the right hand and slightly less serious bruises on the left.

When the findings were telegraphed to John Hoxborough, Louis' co-manager, in New York it was announced the Schmeling bout was definitely off for this fall.

"When I fight that boy I don't want to have to worry about my hands," said Joe. "I'll be glad to rest." Dr. Chester C. Ames who studied the negatives said they explained 15 rounds of one-handed fighting by Louis.

SOUTHERN GOLFER PACES QUALIFIERS  
LOS ANGELES, Sept. 1.—(AP)—It may be the western amateur golf championship but a slender lead from New Orleans, Fred Haas, Jr., carelessly left the impression today in the second round of qualifying play that it belonged to the deep south.

"There was no reason," spoke the national intercollegiate titlist from Louisiana state, more to himself than to the gallery at the eighteenth green, "why I missed that 4-foot putt."

Haas needed it for a 67, but for nothing else because he already had handed a tough par 71 on the Los Angeles country club course a fine lacing and his 68 was a stroke better than anyone was going to score yesterday.

Many of the prominent names were scattered in the higher scoring brackets and the preliminary indication was cards of 183 or better would be needed to survive the day.

SIR MALCOLM ADDS SPEED BOAT RECORD TO LIST OF LAURELS  
LOCARNO, Switzerland, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Sir Malcolm Campbell, famed British sportsman, added the world's motorboat speed record to his international automobile speed standard today.

The 52-year-old Briton piloted his 23-foot speedboat, Bluebird, over Lake Maggiore's smooth waters at 128.795 miles per hour to eclipse Gar Wood's five-year-old mark of 124.86 m.p.h.

Sir Malcolm's aquatic Bluebird—his record-smashing automobile was called by the same name—was powered by a Rolls-Royce aero engine and traveled over the measured mile course in smooth and effortless fashion.

With the land speed record already among his trophies, Sir Malcolm built his motorboat with the idea of lifting the water speed record as well.

## DIAMOND LAKE GIVEN 320,000 BABY TROUT

SALEM, Sept. 1.—(UP)—Oregon's state game commission employees during July released 320,000 rainbow trout in Diamond lake, 797,000 in the Deschutes river and 150,000 in Davis lake.

Eastern brook trout released during the month included 525,000 in East lake, 240,000 in Elk lake, 240,000 in Paulina lake and 57,000 in Fish lake.

In Malheur, Baker, Umatilla and Union counties, a total of 556,000 eastern brook trout were released in June. A planting of 226,000 eastern brook trout was also made in Mud
