Resumes Faculty Post—After having spent the summer carrying on research into the geologic problems of Crater lake, Dr. Howell Williams, nationally famous volcanologist, returned this week to the University of California to resume faculty work. He spent last winter in Japan, New Zealand and Sumatra studying volcanoes as a part of his project to piece together the volcanic history of the Crater lake area. He has reached a number of interesting conclusions which he plans to announce in published form when his Crater lake studies are completed.

At Crater Lake—Among recent visitors at Crater lake were Mr. and Mrs. George Barron of Miami university of Oxford, O., formerly of Ashland and Vienna, Austria. Mr. Barron was a member of the Crater Lake national park ranger force in 1931, '32 and '33, just prior to taking up music study in Europe. He is now instructor in voice in the Ohio university. Mr. Barron related experiences on an attempted Skyline trail hike from Mt. Hood to Crater lake this summer. Ten days from Mt. Hood, his only pack horse broke away and disappeared, leaving the Barrons stranded high in the Cascades. The horse was never found. The trip had to be abandoned in favor of automobile travel.

NIPPONS' BARRAGE SETS GREAT FIRES IN SHANGHAI AREA

Shellfire demolished the American-mortgaged Wing on cotton mills at Woonung. The mills had been seen flying the United States flag.

The German supported Tungchi university was razed in the bombardment. The shelling was so heavy that the university's newly-constructed bombproof dugouts had to be evacuated.

Woonung suburbs were occupied by Nippon's warriors after hand-to-hand fighting. Time and again waves of Japanese attackers, bayonets gleaming, charged the Chinese lines. Finally the defenders fell back.

Revenge Costly.

Thus Japan gained revenge for her early defeats at Woonung in 1932, but only at heavy sacrifice.

For the first time Japanese artillery reinforcements moved into the international settlement. Four-inch and six-inch guns, mounted on caterpillar tractors, rumbled into Yangtze-poo, a part of the settlement.

Japanese unloaded tons of war supplies from three steamers. Additional Japanese troops landed at Wayside wharf in Shanghai. Regu-

lar army units replaced exhausted Japanese bluejackets in the Hongkew sector at the north of the international area.

Eight Japanese ships heavily laden with troops and supplies arrived at Woonung from Japan. Escorted by

warships, one of the transport vessels steamed up the Whangpoo and landed reinforcements.

In the Lottien sector 12 miles northwest of Shanghai, Chinese regulars held their own against Japanese attacks. Chinese military sources said

the Japanese there suffered heavy losses.

Despite the bitter fighting about the city, the Shanghai municipal council relaxed its curfew ordinance. The time for evacuating the streets at night was extended from 10 p. m. to 11:30.

Shirley Temple In Leading Film Role At The Craterian

Hailed everywhere as one of the most outstanding motion picture productions to ever be released, the picture of Rudyard Kipling's "Wee Willie Winkie" is on the screen of the Craterian theatre today, starting a four day engagement with Shirley Temple and Victor McLaglen in the starring roles.

One of the new show season's most spectacular offerings, "Wee Willie Winkie" takes on added interest with its introduction of "toning" and "tinting," a cinematic art as old as the making of pictures—which how-

ever, was apparently forgotten in the transition from silent to sound films. Avoiding the occasional harshness and the uncertainty of color photography, yet relieving a picture of the unvarying black-and-white of ordinary photography, toned and tinted films add beauty and dramatic quality when their use presents itself. "Toning," contrary to color photography, is a process in which the picture is treated after it has been printed. The process doubles the length of time necessary were the picture made in color. Only the images are colored, the pure white parts of the picture remaining clear. Although not suitable for all pictures, the use of toning and tinting has long been recognized as an invaluable dramatic device in certain cases. And the release of "Wee Willie Winkie" is regarded in the film industry as halting this return to an ancient art which has been too long neglected.
