Hostetter, traveling with two companions, said he did not know he was doing anything unlawful or creating a hazard in leaving the campfire. The youths left the fire yesterday morning and returned in the afternoon to camp out again. They found three men fighting the blaze which had crept beneath an embankment. Hostetter assumed responsibility for the fire, readily acknowledging that he had left it burning, the ranger said.

Shirley Temple In Craterian Picture

Where are those self-appointed critics who have been harping that Shirley Temple was "through" as a top-ranking star? Judging from the audience reaction yesterday at the Craterian theatre, where "Wee Willie Winkie" opened its local run, Shirley is just beginning to come into her own. For it is a new and very different Shirley Temple. No longer is she just the cute youngster, possessed of remarkable talents. Never once is she called upon to fall back upon her familiar bag of tricks, her singing, dancing and mimicking that have been considered such assets in other films. Instead, she is cast in a dramatic role, which she handles in masterful fashion and from which she emerges a decidedly new character. And now it is not difficult to predict many new triumphs for the amazing little star.

Still, for all of this new Shirley, the screen conception of Rudyard Kipling's robust adventure romance drama is a happy combination of what it takes for rousing, good film entertainment. The story, combining appealing human interest with vigorous action, and compensating comedy with gripping suspense, is interesting, to say the least. And, for another thing, there is good acting to back up the entertainment elements. Capable Victor McLaglen, in one of his most outstanding characterizations, as C. Aubrey Smith, see to it that while Caesar Bonanza, June Lang, Michael Whalen, Douglas Scott and Constance Collier are not lax in their support of the principal trio. Backgrounds, military pageantry and stirring martial conflict add to the power and appeal of the story content. So, taking into consideration the stars, the story, the masterful production which leads drama into vigorous thrill-action, into romance and comedy with never a let-down in its pace, it's small wonder indeed that "Wee Willie Winkie" had a capacity audience for its initial showing with all indications showing more of the same.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Sept. 2.—(AP)—Authorization for the employment of a full-time nurse, the first to serve the Roseburg public schools, was announced today by the local board of school directors. The decision to employ a nurse was reached following a series of conferences with delegations from Parent-Teacher associations, arguing the action. Heretofore part-time supervision has been conducted by the county health unit.

Federal Deficit Tops Last Year

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—(P)—The treasury closed its books today on the first two months of this fiscal year, recording a \$352,144,000 deficit. This excess of expenditures was about \$3,000,000 more than that for the corresponding period last year. In July, the deficit ran far ahead of the same month a year ago. For August, government spending topped revenues by \$102,760,000. This compared with a \$226,523,000 deficit in August, 1936.
