

**BOOTHS ARRANGED FOR JACKSON CO. AT FAIR IN SALEM**

Fruits, Vegetables, Model Airport in Agricultural Display — Plans Also Include Exhibit of Gems

Pears, tomatoes, peaches, gems, minerals and a model of Medford municipal airport will represent Jackson county at the annual state fair in Salem September 6 to 12. A booth has been planned for the agricultural department of the fair by Fletcher Fish, federal fruit inspector here, with the cooperation of Robert G. Fowler, county agent, and Clifford B. Cordy, county horticulturist. It will be made up of fresh pears, tomatoes and peaches grouped around a commercial display of canned fruits and vegetables from Medford and Ashland canneries. As it ripens, the fresh fruit will be given to spectators stopping at the booth, Mr. Fish said. He expects to have a large supply of pears on hand for this purpose.

**Model in Foreground.**  
In the foreground of the Jackson county booth will be placed the model airport made by Edward Cannoce and Howard Glascock, members of the Medford fire department. The miniature has been lent for the display by the fire department. Having attracted considerable interest wherever it has been displayed, the model will give the booth a novel foreground that will undoubtedly call attention to the whole Jackson county exhibit, Mr. Fish pointed out. In the mineral section of the fair the county will be represented by a display of semi-precious stones and minerals. The exhibit is being arranged by E. R. Santo, president of the Southern Oregon Gem and Mineral society.

Mr. Cordy plans to leave for Salem Saturday morning, to be followed in the afternoon by Mr. Fish. Mr. Fowler will go to the capital later. Mr. Cordy will be in charge of the Jackson county agriculture booth during the first half of the fair, Mr. Fowler during the last half.

**TWO RUNAWAY GIRLS RETURNED TO HOMES**

August of 1936 totaled 783 and July of this year saw 457 permits issued to out-of-state motorists. Total for the year to date is 2926, Garlock said.
