It is contended the pinball machines are not lotteries, and not violative of Oregon law. The grand jury is scheduled to meet at the October term of the circuit court, starting late in that month.

HUNDREDS LEAVING MEDFORD DISTRICT CCC THIS MONTH

Four special train Troops to Take Men Home — Places Will Be Filled Under New Regulations

Four special trains will pull out of the Medford district late this month, carrying CCC enrollees back to their homes in Oregon and California. Because of the changes in eligibility requirements, a bigger than average number of men will be returning to their corps areas for discharge. Lowered age limits will make necessary compulsory discharge of a number of old-timers in the district, among them many who have held key positions in the companies.

Dates Not Set Definite dates for the train movements have not been announced. About 204 men from the fifth corps area will make up one special train for Fort Knox, Kentucky. About 430 men of the seventh corps area will be returned to Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, for discharge.

Two special trains will be sent to Camp Bullis, Texas, with eight corps area men. About 734 have signified their intention of returning home. Camp Bullis is located near Ford Sam Houston.

About 400 men in the ninth corps area, all of them from Oregon and California, will also complete their enrollment period this month and be returned home for discharge.

All of these members, together with others who have been discharged during the past five months will be replaced by new members from the same corps areas.

The new enrollees will be between the ages of 17 and 22 years. All members who have served more than two years or who are over 24 years of age are ineligible for enrollment.

Each camp has been allowed five exceptions to this rule, however, and older men may be retained as specialists for the following positions: 1 leader; 1 mess sergeant, and three cooks.

GEORGE B. FRANKS PASSES, AGED 77

George Barton Franks, 77, resident of Medford for the past 26 years, passed away while on a visit with his daughter, Mrs. Thelma Taylor, at Upper Lake, Calif., September 1, from pneumonia. He had been ill for only a few days.

Mr. Franks was born at Churchville, N. Y., January 15, 1860. He spent his early life in New York, and later moved to Gaylord, Mich., with his parents, where he lived for several years.

He was united in marriage, at Elmhurst, Mich., December 31, 1883. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on their December 31, 1933. Mrs. Franks passed away in this city on January 3, 1937.

During his residence in Medford he lived at 242 Beatty street, and leaves many friends to mourn his departure.

Mr. Franks had been an Odd Fellow for 55 years, and a charter member of Roxie Ann Grange. The Grange gave him a life membership two years ago.

He leaves two daughters: Mrs. Irene Shirley of Upper Lake, Calif.; and one son, Lee Franks of Medford; two brothers, Charles J. Franks and Albert Franks, and one sister, Mrs. Agnes Widger, of Gaylord, Mich.; also three grandchildren: James B. SIR MALCOLM UPS MOTORBOAT MARK

LOCARNO, Switzerland, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Pickering, who left off yesterday, Sir Malcolm Campbell, British speed king, boosted the world's motorboat record to 129.4164 miles per hour on Lake Maggiore today.

The British sportsman, holder of the world's land speed mark of 301.13 m.p.h., sent his single-engine unlimited hydroplane, Bluebird, twice over a measured course this morning to crack the motorboat record he set yesterday by a comfortable margin.

On the outward trip, Sir Malcolm traveled at a clip of 130.2379 m.p.h. Coming back his pace fell off to 128.4849 m.p.h., but his average of 129.4164 was well beyond the record of 125.7959 he established yesterday.

Gar Wood, Detroit veteran, set the former standard of 124.86 m.p.h. at Algona, Mich., in 1932 with his four-engine Monocraft.

NON-HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET SLIGHTLY HIGHER

The budget for Jackson county, for non-high school districts, has been completed and calls for \$65,431.06 to be raised by taxes for the school year 1937-1938. This is in excess of the 1936-37 period when it was \$61,837.90.

Largest item on the current budget is \$33,000 for tuition. Last year it was \$43,895.10.

For transportation of students, \$11,500 is allotted this year, against \$5,581.54 last year.

The budget committee this year decided to allow for all students in non-high school districts, one cent per mile per day for round-trip transportation, mileage to be based on the distance from his home to the nearest high school. The money thus accruing will be turned over to the school district furnishing the transportation. The student may attend any high school desired, but transportation cost will be allowed only to the nearest high school.

According to County Superintendent C. R. Bowman, this new system will provide a more equitable transportation cost distribution, and at the same time provide transportation aid to more students living in non-high school districts.

The budget committee is composed of A. E. Brockway of Jacksonville; Merrill B. Stone, of Table Rock area, and Superintendent C. R. Bowman, acting as secretary, ex-officio. Sitting with the budget board were Dr. George B. Dean, W. A. Stratton, Mrs. Alma Merrigan, and Lee Port.
