

PART PLAYED BY JUDGE CREWS IN ALASKA AFFAIRS

The following notice of the death of Judge W. E. Crews of Medford was taken from the Juneau, Alaska, Tribune, where the well-known local man resided for several years before coming to Medford.

"Judge W. E. Crews, widely and favorably known pioneer Alaskan attorney, died recently in Medford, Ore., at the age of 76, according to word received here today.

Judge and Mrs. Crews had celebrated 50 years of married life with a golden wedding anniversary. The jurist, who had resided in Medford since 1910, had been in excellent health until this past year, according to Juneau friends.

Coming to Juneau before the turn of the twentieth century, he played an important part in the making of Alaskan history. He was born in Portland, Ore. Graduating from the University of Oregon Law School in 1886, he became associated with Judge Gilbert and Senator Gearin in the practice of law. When Judge Gilbert was appointed to the bench, he and Senator Gearin moved to Seattle.

After spending more than a decade in Juneau law practice, he returned to Seattle about 1905. After five years he moved to Medford.

He is survived by Mrs. Crews and two brothers, one of whom resides in Oregon and the other in Washington."

CHINESE BANNER ON DISPLAY HERE

A large Shanghai municipality flag, veteran of the Chinese-Japanese war, was placed on display yesterday in the Flynn Electric Service show window at 151 West Main street.

The flag was brought to this country a few days ago by Harvey Nelson who had served with the 31st Infantry in the war-torn Chinese city. The flag saw active service in the International Settlement north station in Shanghai and was taken from a building under Japanese fire. Mr. Nelson related. The banner measures 14 by 6 feet.

Mr. Nelson lent the flag to Thomas Flynn for a week on Friday. Mr. Nelson was en route from Shanghai to U. S. Army headquarters in San Francisco. He stopped here to visit Mr. Flynn with whom he served in the 42nd division during the World war.

Possessed of allegedly stolen company literature, the alleged impostor sells policies and pockets the money, having no connection with the association, Reeves said. He works principally with business and professional men, Reeves added.

The man, who goes under several different names, started from Portland and was reported working southward from Eugene Thursday. Reeves asserted. He described the alleged impostor as being about 50 years old, five feet seven inches tall, about 165 pounds in weight, a fluent talker with three distinct chin dimples.

YREKANS GIVEN BIG HAND HERE

Bewildered miners, jaunty vaqueros and lovely ladies of the pioneer era invaded the peaceful business section of Medford Friday night with but one object in view—properly to publicize the forthcoming gold rush days to be held in Yreka next week-end.

They were greeted by members of the local 40 and 8 American Legion organizations with their famous French "choo choo" train consisting of one engine and one box-car, strictly French style, capacity 40 men or 8 horses.

Awaiting the close of the weekly band concert in City park the Yreka contingent, headed by the lusty drum corps of Rose Nelson post of the American Legion, paraded through the downtown streets, arousing enthusiasm and interest in their annual gold rush celebration. After the parade, the 40 and 8 train took several "excursion" trips up and down Main street, loaded with pioneer pulchritude from the neighboring California community, including the duly elected queen of the 1937 Gold Rush who rode majestically atop the cab of the French locomotive.

The Yreka delegation, slated to leave last night for the California capital, Sacramento, to publicize their gold rush were well pleased with the Medford reception as handed by the local American Legion and 40 and 8 organizations.

LIGHTNING SETS 4 TIMBER FIRES

Lightning yesterday set four fires in the Butte Falls district of the Rogue river national forest, several in state forest areas and blew out ten or a dozen transformer fuses of the California Oregon Power company system in the valley.

A sharp lightning bolt at 3:02 p. m. hit the Copco line on South Central avenue near 13th street and threw out the switch at the Medford sub-station. The switch closes automatically and service in the city was out only momentarily.

Twenty-three men were dispatched to put out the four Rogue forest fires that had been spotted. It was expected the men would be out all night. Crews were to check the state forest fires this morning.

Rain helped materially in reducing the danger of the forest fires spreading, foresters stated.

FISH EXPERT TO STUDY EFFECT OF ROGUE RIVER MUD

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 4.—(AP)—A survey of the Rogue River to determine if mining mud damages fish life and remedies if that contention is proved, was announced here today by Earl K. Nixon, director of the state department of geology and mineral industries.

Dr. Henry Baldwin Ward of Urbana, Ill., and Washington, D.C., having long listings in "Who's Who" and "American Men of Science" as an expert on fish, arrived today to begin the survey.

He will make his studies along the Rogue during the coming month and the department has an option for his services for another month at the time of high water, Nixon said.

Nixon emphasized that the survey would be impartial and told a miners' meeting yesterday that whether the decision is for or against them, the findings must be regarded as authoritative. He said litigation to enjoin miners from muddying the water of Rogue River will be a tremendous factor in mining not only in this district but over the state in comparable operations.

Miners have declared the injunction asked in Curry county might halt all operations.
