

# Favorites Come Through in Showers in Annual Golf Tournament

## HAMMOND TO PLAY LELAND CLARK IN MORNING TUSSLE

### Course And Entrants Dampened By Rain — Eddie Simmons In Good Form.

Beneath a pelting rain that deadened fairways and greens and soaked 122 golfers to their skins, the ninth annual southern Oregon-northern California golf tournament moved into the quarter-finals yesterday afternoon at the Rogue Valley Golf club with favorites coming through about as expected.

At 10:30 this morning the championship flight will tee off for semifinal positions, which will be staged at 1:30 this afternoon. The 36-hole finals will be played tomorrow morning and afternoon.

Quarter-final matches this morning will see Medford's Leland Clark Jr. facing big Bob Hammond, another local star; Don Thompson, Portland favorite, meeting Ivan Harrington of Medford; defending champion Eddie Simmons of Medford playing Hank Pringle of Medford; and Hubert Bentley, great shotmaker from Ashland, meeting Bill Selkirk, the Yreka, Cal., clubber.

Eddie Simmons, shooting the finest golf of the day, entered the quarter-finals yesterday afternoon by downing Bill Goodwin of Eugene, 5 and 4. The champion was 2 under par when the match ended on the 14th, later whamming over the first nine in 35, one below perfect figures.

Leland Clark Jr., medalist, eliminated lanky Jean Eberhart of Ashland, 7 and 6 for the most decisive margin enjoyed by a winner during the championship flight. Another pre-tournament favorite, Don Thompson of Portland, posted a 4 and 2 win over Bob Wood of Phoenix to advance to the quarter-finals.

Other championship flight matches yesterday afternoon saw Bob Hammond of Medford beat Dr. B. G. Barkwill of Marshfield, 7 and 6; Ivan Harrington of Medford whip Dick Sleeter of Medford, 1 up on the 19th; Hank Koke of Eugene eliminate John Koke of Eugene, 2 and 1; Hubert Bentley of Ashland out George Harrington of Medford, 4 and 2; and Bill Selkirk of Yreka defeat W. Jewett of Eugene, 2 up.

Don Clark, tournament director, announced that a scotch foursome would be staged tomorrow morning about 9:30 with prizes donated by Leonard and Alfred Carpenter.

Quarter-final matches in all seven flights will also be shot this morning with the semi-finals being staged this afternoon. Finals will be held tomorrow. Consolation matches for first round losers in all flights will also get under way today.

In yesterday morning's championship round involving the 32 low medal scores, of which 15 took an 18 or better to qualify, seven Medford golfers, three from Eugene, two from Ashland, and one each from Portland, Marshfield, Phoenix and Yreka, Cal., won their way into the championship flight.

## HUBBELL IN FORM AS GIANTS GAIN UPON IDLE CUBS

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Carl Hubbell returned to form today, whitewashed the Brooklyn Dodgers, 3 to 0, with one of his most artistic performances of the season and hurtled the New York Giants another notch forward in their National League pennant drive. They led the Chicago Cubs, who were idle, by one full game again.

The screwball master yielded six hits, five of which were of the infield variety, and struck out eight batsmen. He retired the side on strikes in the fifth and fanned the dangerous Babe Phelps for the final out in the ninth with two on base.

Dick Bartlett's home run, into the upper left field deck, broke up a fine flinging duel between Hubbell and Max Butcher, Dodger righthander. It was Bartlett's 14th circuit clout.

Butcher, yielding only five hits in seven frames, gave way to a pinch hitter in the eighth, whereupon the Giants pounded his successor, Ben Cantwell, for two home runs.
