HOUSEWIVES TOLD MEATS HIT PEAK

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Housewives who have been hawling about the high cost of meat had the word of the government experts today that prices had reached a peak and declines would follow shortly.

Charts on retail meat prices at the bureau of agricultural economics showed they had touched seven-year highs recently—especially the tender juicy steaks and savory pork chops.

The economists said high prices were caused by droughts and business recovery.

The decline will come, the economists predicted, as a result of larger crops and protests by the public over high costs.
