

Loretta Young And Don Ameche In War Romance On Craterian's Screen

BRILLIANT STARS IN COMEDY-DRAMA BEGINNING SUNDAY

CAPONE PARTNER HELD FOR FRAUD

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—(P)—Johnny Torrio, once the boss and partner of Scarface Al Capone in Chicago, and more recently listed here as "Public Enemy No. 1," today was twice indicted by a special federal grand jury on income tax charges. Sentences totaling twelve year imprisonment and fines amounting to \$30,000 may be imposed if Torrio is found guilty. Torrio is charged with defrauding the government by failure to pay income taxes for 1933 and 1935 amounting to (with penalties) \$110,276.80, and with conspiracy to evade income tax payments for 1933, 1934 and 1935. TWO OFFICERS, BANDIT KILLED IN GUN FIGHT

SPRINGFIELD, O., Sept. 4.—(AP)—Two officers and a bandit were killed, a third officer was wounded, and one bandit was captured in a gun battle today near Medway, 15 miles southwest of here. The shooting followed the \$1,297 payroll robbery of a Springfield cafe proprietor, who was abducted from a city street about noon. The other gunmen escaped. Patrolman Martin Randolph, 38, and chief Deputy Sheriff Edward Furry, 45, were killed. Patrolman Martin Donnelly was slightly wounded in the furious exchange of shots.
