JAP FIRE TAKES HUGE LIFE TOLL AMONG CIVILIANS

Kiangwan district, Shanghai's civic center, had been evacuated by Chinese troops. American firms suffer. Two American companies suffered heavily in the fighting. The Ball Lumber company yard at Hongkew, in Shanghai's international area, was destroyed by incendiary fire. The Bloch Packing Box Manufacturing company, near Soochow creek, was damaged by a Japanese air bomb. Japanese superiority in armaments and equipment was enhanced by the completion of a new landing field near Shanghai university and the landing of many trucks, tanks, heavy guns and tractors along the Whang-poo. Chinese commanders declared that more than 1000 Japanese troops were killed or wounded in a fierce Chinese counter-attack in the Lotien sector, north of Shanghai. They admitted 500 casualties in their own ranks and declared that the Japanese force included many renegade Chinese from Manchoukuo and Korea. Chinese Cruiser Sunk. The China-long Japanese naval blockade was reported to have sunk a Chinese customs cruiser near the British crown colony of Hongkong, in South China, and to have forced a British passenger steamer back to port on a river trip from Hongkong to Canton, China. Japanese heavy artillery was moved against Machang, advance base of the Chinese, right flank in north China on the Tientsin-Pukow railroad, apparently as a prelude to imminent large scale fighting. Opening day of Shanghai's schools passed unheeded by 300,000 children, the only ones who could find any solace in the unheeded war that made schoolhouses too hazardous for classes.

Craterian Romance Delights Audience

A smart, rapid-paced comedy-romance "Love Under Fire" which opened the local run at the Craterian theater yesterday, brought forth a capacity crowd that apparently found much delight in the many diversions of the film. Loretta Young, gay and lovelier than ever, and Don Ameche, smashing star of radio's Sunday night bright-spot, rattle out kisses by the light of bursting star-balls, to the tune of whining shrapnel, and the mad music of Borrah Minevitch and his gang, whose catchy rhythms make machine-guns rat-tat-tat in swing time. The cast also features Frances Drake, Walter Catlett, the goggle-eyed, blustering comedian and John Carradine, new subtle screen menace.

Forced by trickery into the belief that she is a hunted thief, Loretta Young seeks obscurity in Spain, only to meet a Scotland Yard detective, played by Don Ameche, who is on a human's holiday and is seeking excitement. Don arrests his susceptible suspect, but their trip back to England and justice is interrupted by the appearance of the pretty owner of some fabulous jewels which are being sought by military officials. The fate of the gems has an immediate and telling effect upon the fate of a multitude of innocent bystanders, and the adventurous suspense and excitement works up to a high climax when a British vessel is stopped at sea by a Spanish gunboat.

Prison Life Theme Of Rialto's Drama

About as powerful a melodrama as the screens have reflected in a considerable period is "San Quentin," laid in and about the famous California penitentiary, which had its first local showing yesterday before thrilled audiences at the Rialto theater. Pat O'Brien is seen first as an ex-Army captain appointed to command of the prison yard in the hope he can, with square dealing, maintain discipline, which has a lack of need through the old-school methods of MacLane, who has been demoted. Just before taking the job, Pat goes to a night club and meets Ann, a blues-singer. She doesn't know what he does. She's bitter about prisons, because her brother, Red, who is Humphrey Bogart, has just been sentenced to San Quentin. So Pat doesn't reveal his job. Red and some others make a successful break. What happens then leads up to the powerful climax of "San Quentin."

Guy Kibbee shares double bill honors with "San Quentin" in his latest starring role, that of a country horse doctor who went to the big city and became the biggest crook in the business in "The Big Shot."

The two pictures will remain at the Rialto until tomorrow night.
