Hitler Stresses Solidarity With Japan, Italy Against Red Flag

NURNBERG, Germany, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler stressed Nazi Germany's solidarity with Japan and Italy against "communist confusion" in east and west.
His annual proclamation, read to the Nazi congress by Adolf Wagner, Bavarian Nazi leader, also made an emphatic reiteration of Germany's demand for return of her war-lost colonies, and called the attitude of other powers toward this demand "incomprehensible."

STOCKS DIVE TO YEAR'S LOW ON NEW WAR SCARE

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Touched off by a fresh foreign war scare, stocks crashed through resistance areas in today's market for losses of 1 to 10 points generally. There were a few wider set-backs.
It was the worst break of the year, with numerous issues plunging into low territory for 1937 or longer. The ticker tape lagged 3 minutes behind at the peak of the decline. Volume dwindled later and there were mild recoveries here and there. Most leaders, though, closed at or near bottom levels.

CITES EX-HUSBAND AS CHILD STEALER

A complaint charging her divorced husband, Alton Coughlin, with child stealing, was issued this morning by the district attorney's office upon the complaint of Mrs. Kathryn Coughlin.
The complaint alleges that Coughlin "did forcibly entice and take away the two children, Donald and Robert, aged four and seven."

SOVIET EXECUTES EIGHT 'WRECKERS'

MOSCOW, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Eight regional officials in the Ukraine and Azov districts died before firing squads today, convicted as "wreckers" in the Soviet agricultural program.
A provincial newspaper reported four were executed at Gain and the others at Salsk, near Rostov, on the River Don. Nine also were sentenced at Salsk to prison terms ranging from one to ten years. They were convicted of spreading foot and mouth disease by allowing diseased cattle to graze on fields.

SUGAR PRICE BOOSTED BY NEW EXCISE LEVY

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Leading refiners announced today an advance of 45 cents in refined sugar to \$15 cents a pound.
The boost lifted the wholesale price to the highest since November, 1935, when the staple was quoted by refiners at 5.30 cents, giving effect to a processing tax of about 1/2 cent a pound under the agricultural administration act, later invalidated by the supreme court.

Roosevelt Returns From Fishing Trip

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Sept. 7.—(AP)—President Roosevelt returned to the Summer White House today after a five-day fishing cruise in eastern waters.
His vacation vessel, the U. S. S. Potomac, docked shortly after 1 p. m. (E. D. T.) at Poughkeepsie, after a run around New York from an overnight anchorage off Larchmont, in Long Island sound.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—There is a red-hot potato spoiling the varnish on the desk of Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles which may well have caused him to embark with additional speed on his European vacation.
The sizzling tuber that he skillfully avoided was the draft of a treaty with Mexico, suggested by Senators Sheppard and Connally of Texas, but carefully guarded from the public eye. It was dropped on the undersecretary's desk just as he turned the key, and there it lies.

The situation arises over a three-cornered fight among the Mexicans, the Texans of the lower Rio Grande valley and the folks of Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona and California, whose fields are irrigated by the Boulder dam project of the Colorado river.
The Mexicans say that they aren't getting their share of the Rio Grande, which, since it's a borderline stream, is in part theirs. They say they will be satisfied, however, if they are provided with seven million acre-feet of the water from the Boulder dam project.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Heavy and sustained selling hit the bond market today and prices tumbled from as much as 1 to 5 points in one of the worst breaks of the year.
Convertible issues and railroad bonds took the heaviest hammering. Federal loans joined the downslide with the whole list off fractions of a point.

Montague Denies Guilt in Holdup

ELIZABETHTOWN, N. Y., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Smiling John Montague, going playmate of moving picture stars, today pleaded innocent to a seven-year-old charge of robbery and trial was set for the week for October 11.
Although Montague uttered not a word in the courtroom, he told newspapermen, outside, that he "never had heard of Roger Norton, 35-year-old truck driver, said by District Attorney Thomas McDonald to be ready to identify the one-time 'mysterious golfing marvel' as a participant in the robbery."

KLAMATH FALLS, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Sale of the Golden Rule, Klamath Falls, largest home-own department store, to the J. C. Penney company, was announced today by E. W. Van-sic, manager. The new owners will take possession immediately and plan a complete change of stock as well as extensive remodeling.

Youth Killed By Fireworks Used In Church Fete

LODI, N. J., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Fifteen-year-old Rene Porriello was injured fatally today when an aerial bomb prematurely exploded at a church celebration.
One of 3000 spectators at the finale of the feast of St. Joseph, at St. Joseph's R. C. church, the boy was struck in the stomach by the bomb.

PAVING REPAIRS TO START SOON SAYS CHAIRMAN

Repair of Medford's paved streets will be started in the near future, probably toward the end of this month, it was stated today by Larry Schade, chairman of the council's special streets and roads committee.
Proceeds from the \$50,000 bond issue, authorized at a special election for the repair and reconstruction of paved streets, are now in the city treasury, Mr. Schade said, and about \$15,000 of this sum will be utilized on this fall's repair program.

MORE STUDENTS ON OPENING DAY

Main avenues to Medford schools were crowded at an early hour this morning as well over 2000 city youngsters marked the end of a summer vacation by a return to classrooms.
Almost a hundred more students had entered Medford schools by noon today than at the corresponding period last year, preliminary enrollment figures showed. Total enrollment this morning was 2291, an increase of 97 over the 2194 registered on the first day last year.

ORDER CONSULS TO SEEK SAFETY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The American government today ordered its consuls at Amoy and Foochow, in south China, to close their offices and proceed to places of safety as soon as they have done all possible to evacuate Americans in their districts.
Amoy and Foochow have been bombed by Japanese airplanes several times, state department officials said. Ambassador Nelson T. Johnson advised the state department he issued instructions as a matter of precaution.

BUS SERVICE WAITS MACHINES' ARRIVAL

Bus service will be started tomorrow or Thursday, it was stated today by Robert Harnish, associated with the company to operate the line here.
The service was to have started today but delivery of the buses was delayed at the factory, Mr. Harnish said. The buses, three 21-passenger vehicles of the latest streamline design, are now expected to arrive here tonight or tomorrow.

ILLINOIS CHICKEN LAYS GIANT EGG

EARL FEHL FILES DEMAND THAT DAY RETURN JUDGESHIP

HARRY BRIDGES WARNS A. F. L. TEAMSTERS NOT TO SPREAD PORT TIEUP

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 7.—(AP)—AFL teamsters, slowly stifling waterfront activity in a union jurisdictional fight, were warned today by their opponents against spreading the dispute to other coast ports.
Plans to refuse handling of dock cargoes in Oakland Wednesday have been followed by threats to extend the embargo to all west coast harbors in a situation such as never before has faced Pacific coast ports, scenes of two of the nation's bitterest strikes.

PORTLAND HOUSEWIVES PAY MORE FOR BREAD
