ARMY RADIO POST WORK PROGRESSES

Construction of the new army radio station on Crater Lake highway is progressing and bids were called today on the re-roofing of the transmitter building formerly utilized by the bureau of air commerce.

The building is to be re-roofed with cedar shingles. Bids should be submitted to Sgt. William Daws at the municipal airport not later than Saturday for mailing to Maj. Paul E. Burrows at Pearson field, Vancouver, Wash., for selection Monday.

Major Burrows, commanding Pearson field and the air corps detachment at the airport here, returned to his post yesterday after inspecting the work being done at the radio station. It is expected that the construction work will be completed by the end of this month and the station in operation by mid-October.

McMinnville Farm Has Big Fire Loss

MCMINNVILLE, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Fire struck the well-known Foothills Farm, seven miles north of here, last night, destroying three main buildings and bringing damage variously estimated at from \$35,000 to \$60,000.

Breaking out about 9 p. m. in the rear of the main barn, it swept that building and a connecting dairy barn and machine shed, threatening other buildings including one of the three residences on the place.

Vallejo Ferries To Abandon Run

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Ferries between San Francisco and Vallejo, which have operated since 1895, are to be abandoned.

The state railroad commission authorized the discontinuance today, effective on five days notice.

The ferries have been operating at a loss for some time. The Southern Pacific-Golden Gate Ferries, Ltd., previously had been denied permission to halt the service.

Swatow Consulate Is Ordered Closed

NANKING, Sept. 9.—(AP)—United States Ambassador Nelson Johnson today ordered the American consulate at Swatow closed and all Americans evacuated.

His action was taken because of the increasing danger from Japanese bombardment of the important south China port.

CARSON HEADS TREK OF PORTLANDERS TO OREGON STATE FAIR

SALEM, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Mayor Joseph K. Carson of Portland headed a large delegation of Rose City citizens to the state fair today, the day being dedicated to Portland and service clubs.

Yesterday 14,629 persons attended on Salem day. Attendance during the first three days was 47,080; 2,747 more than for the same period last year.

Livestock awards were virtually completed last night, with S. B. Hall of Troutdale having the grand champion Holstein bull.

Mrs. Edyth Tosier Weathered of Hillsboro was elected last night president of the life members of the fair.

All championships in the Belgian stations went to Luther Harrel of Ellensburg, Wash.

The Umattila county 4-H dairy demonstration team won the state title, and will compete with champion teams from 10 other western states at Columbus, O., October 9 to 16. Members of the winning team are Kenneth Beusel and Eugene Rugg, both of Hermiston.

Death Of Sisters Puzzles Doctors

ST. HELENS, Sept. 9.—(AP)—The deaths of two sisters within 48 hours of each other gave Columbia county doctors a medical puzzle today.

Ruth Ledford, 13, died Monday in Portland and this morning Dorothy, 15, succumbed. A post mortem on Ruth failed to disclose the cause of death, said Dr. L. G. Rose.

The girls became violently ill several days ago after a blackberry-picking expedition. Dr. Rose said it was possible that an arsenic spray used on a nearby orchard might have blown onto the berry patch.
