

RED LABEL BEER BEING DELIVERED TEAMSTERS AVER

Seven members of Medford local No. 57 of the International Teamsters union, named by the Acme Brewery of California, and 10 midwest brewers, in a \$155,000 suit against the Teamsters union, for alleged conspiracy to boycott, in a deposition action in circuit court yesterday afternoon, testified they were now obeying a federal court injunction, and were now delivering the products of the plaintiffs, known as "red label" beer, in Jackson and Josephine counties, and would continue to do so.

The suit complaint alleges the Teamsters union conspired to refuse to deliver the "red label" beer. The witnesses averred they had delivered all orders for it when received, as well as "white label" beer.

The suit is based upon a jurisdictional fight between the Teamsters union and the Brewery Worker union, in which only products of Oregon and Washington breweries, known as "white label" beer were distributed by Teamsters union members. The federal court injunction called for delivery of both, and is still effective pending settlement.

Attorneys for the brewery interests said the action was "exploratory," and a number of pertinent facts had been developed from the testimony. Witnesses called were Millard Crabtree, J. P. Donham, Ben Easley, L. J. Cox, Ralph Modell, Gordon Meredith, and Arthur Shimmick.

Attorney Charles W. Robinson of Portland, represented the Teamsters union, and attorneys Charles W. Reames and Harry Skyrman the brewers.

JACKSON COUNTY PEARS AWARDED FIRST PRIZE IN STATE FAIR DISPLAY

That Jackson county produces the finest pears in the state was conclusively proved yesterday when first prizes were awarded local growers of Comice, D'Anjou and Bartlett at the annual Oregon state fair being held in Salem.

Showing against pears from Roseburg, Hood River and other sections of the state, the Comice and D'Anjou varieties of southern Oregon's most famous fruit received blue ribbons. They were grown in the Wing orchards and were displayed in standard half-boxes after being placed on exhibit by Fletcher Fish.

First prize on Bartlett was won by Mrs. C. Hugger of the Central Point district.

With the exception of first prize on Bosc, all top awards were gained by local growers. Waldo Gilbert of Salem received the blue ribbon for his Bosc exhibit.

It was pointed out by Charles A. Wing, manager of the Wing orchards, that southern Oregon not only produced prize pears, but apples as well. He said that the orchards' Newtown apple exhibit won first prize at the Pacific International two years ago at Portland and the exposition at Phoenix, Ariz., two years ago with eight states competing.

Officers Here Compete in Coast - Wide Economy Tour

A battle of driving skill between Medford police and fire department heads, the Jackson county sheriff's office and state police was staged at 3:00 p. m. today on the Pacific highway, starting at the Pine Cone. This course was selected by members of the four services who will vie in economy and second-gear speed tests sponsored by Graham-Palge Motors corporation and the Gilmore Oil company.

The contest, one of a series being held throughout the west for members of law enforcement agencies and

fire departments only, will introduce the officers to a new Graham model, specially designed for police and fire work. The car, shipped here from the factory for the test, utilizes a Graham 116 Supercharger chassis, fitted with a 120 Supercharger motor and overdrive.

The tours in this state are sponsored by the Windolph Motor company of Portland, state Graham distributors, and local prizes will be offered by Larry Pennington, local Graham dealer and the Gilmore Oil company to the two officers placing

highest in today's contest. The grand prize for the entire western area will be a round-trip via United Air Lines to the world series baseball games in New York. The Windolph agency will supervise the local test.

The competition will be run in two sections, an economy tour and an acceleration test. The economy section will be over the equivalent of a 20-mile course, with speed not to exceed 45 miles per hour with deducting and trick driving prohibited. The acceleration test will be a speed run from 10 miles per hour to 80 miles per hour in second gear.

Gilmore Red Lion gasoline and Lion Head motor oil will be used throughout the contest.

The scarlet sedan which the officers will drive offers, according to Carl Windolph, the most brilliant performance in the Graham line. Second-gear top speed, in overdrive, is 98 miles per hour, and top speed in high is well over 100 miles per hour.

John A. Baker, sales promotion manager of Windolph Motor company of Portland is in Medford today assisting in the details of the economy tour.

SANDERSON, WALKER WILL MAKE TRIP TO STUDEBAKER PLANT

On their way to join 600 other Studebaker dealers and salesmen from the Pacific coast, E. L. Sanderson head of the Sanderson Motor Co. local Studebaker dealer, and W. MISSIONARY REPORTS ON YEAR'S ACTIVITIES

ASHLAND, Sept. 9.—(Spl.)—D. D. Randall, the union Sunday school missionary for southwest Oregon, in his annual report released today, said he had traveled 27,000 miles during the past year in caring for the 70 rural communities in which he ministers.

He has distributed 1,000 bibles, testaments and gospels in the 800 homes he has visited. With the aid of 22 teachers from six different denominations, he has supervised 148 vacation bible schools into which 448 children and youths gathered for two weeks of intensive bible study. He said his students memorized 5,600 bible verses.

Two bible conferences were made possible through the hearty cooperation of pastors and laity interested in the youth of the rural sections. Mr. Randall said during the year more than 100 have professed conversion in this work.

FRANCO TO FREE AMERICAN PILOT

He said the Elk Summit ranger station reported 181 hunters have checked in there and 137 have checked out.

In Wolf's jail the prisoners are told to pass the time at odd jobs, or at playing cards and checkers.
