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COUNTY TO SEEK FORGER'S RETURN

Jackson county will mail to the governor at Salem today, its application for extradition of Leo M. Schroeder, held by the Asbury Park, N. J., authorities, on a felony warrant. The original application was sent back from the attorney general's office for additional affidavits and legal papers, before presentation to the governor of New Jersey.

It is indicated that Oregon authorities are considering the heavy expense to be incurred in returning Schroeder from the Atlantic coast.

Schroeder, under a three-year sentence in state prison, on a plea of guilty to obtaining money under false pretenses from a Rouge River auto camp and the J. C. Penney store here, escaped from the county jail June 29 with Leo Hicks, while under a two and one-half year sentence in state prison for grand larceny. Schroeder was arrested in the east on August 3, and the sheriff was advised he left a trail of bad checks across the land. No trace has ever been found of Hicks.

NEW LIFE GIVEN STREETCAR LINE

INDIANAPOLIS.—(AP)—Bankrupt seven years, the Indianapolis streetcar system today is a thriving concern—thanks to an \$8,000,000 modernization program begun in 1932 at the depth of the depression.

The system now operates 325 new streetcars, trackless trolleys and motor coaches. The 182 trackless trolleys constitute the largest fleet of this kind in the country. Thirty miles of new track have been laid, the entire system unified and schedules improved.

The public has responded. Daily passengers have increased from 168,000 in 1932 to 212,500.

MARYLAND TRIES TEST IN PARKING

JACKSON HELD TO GRAND JURY QUIZ

James Buck Jackson, charged with theft of an auto belonging to Tony Senodenus and afterwards wrecking it near the county poor farm on the Pacific highway, was given a preliminary hearing yesterday and ordered held to await action of the grand jury, by Justice of the Peace William R. Coleman. Bail was fixed at \$500 reduced from \$2500. Jackson was represented by Attorney E. E. Kelly. Senodenus, who signed the complaint, alleged that he met Jackson at a local beer parlor last Saturday night and started for another resort in Senodenus' car, with Jackson driving. They drove up McAndrew's road, where it is changed, Jackson threatened to kill his host, and relieved him of 35 cents and a package of cigarettes. Jackson then sped southward and wrecked the auto when it hit a mail box in front of the poor farm.

TOLEDO, Ohio.—(AP)—A persevering thief stole the same car twice within an hour here, only to have an even-more persevering deputy recover it both times.

The officer, Elmer Tiff, said he noticed a 14-year-old boy driving the car apprehensively, but the boy parked the car and fled when he sought to question him.

Tiff notified the owner, but while that individual was en route with his ignition keys, the car disappeared again. Tiff, unaware of the second theft, saw the same boy driving a car, chased him, and discovered that it was the same machine. This time he hung onto both thief and automobile.
