RUSSIA THREATENS U-BOAT REPRISAL

WILL ACT ALONE IF NECESSARY IS WORD AT PARLEY
Italy Termed Pirate Government in Thinly Veiled Warning by Litvinoff—Meet Again Tomorrow

GENEVA, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Soviet Russia's foreign commissar warned a nine-nation Mediterranean conference today that his country "must and will take its own measures" against submarine pirates in that sea.
This was interpreted as a threat of reprisals against Italy.
In an impassioned address not long after the nine powers met to adopt a collective means of stopping attacks on neutral vessels, Maxim Litvinoff, of the Soviet Union, cried: "The Soviet government cannot allow anyone to destroy its state property."
He linked these words with a thinly veiled accusation of Italy as a "pirate government."

DORE SHOWS DOOR TO C. I. O. WOMEN IN STORMY SCENE
SEATTLE, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Mayor John F. Dore ordered 26 women C.I.O. sympathizers from his office today after reiterating his declaration that he will not tolerate picket lines unannounced by the Seattle central labor council. They had threatened to have him recalled.
"I'm going to make this clear," he told the women who were headed by State Rep. Margaret Coughlin, a leader in the Washington Commonwealth Federation. "There going to be no picketing of the Seattle Star (where an American Newspaper Guild strike has been on since July 3) or any other newspaper."

WOULD-BE DICTATOR BLAMED FOR SCHISM IN RANKS OF LABOR
KANSAS CITY, Sept. 10.—(AP)—President William Green of the American Federation of Labor declared today the split in labor's ranks was not over craft or industrial unions, but "was caused by the ambition of one man to control the labor movement . . . and set himself up as a dictator."

CAMPS ARE RAIDED BY PAIR OF BEARS

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ALBANY FARMER HURT WHEN TRAIN HITS CAR
ALBANY, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Hiram Bierly, well-known farmer living two miles east of Halsey, received injuries today when a Southern Pacific passenger train struck and demolished his car at a crossing south of Albany.
The farmer suffered cuts, bruises and severe shock.

PORTLAND MILLS FACE LONG STRIFE
PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 10.—(AP)—The militant AFL laid down the lines for indefinite strife in the Portland sawmill industry today when it said it was prepared to continue a national boycott even though a labor-relations board referendum reveals preference for the CIO.
The AFL, protest against CIO handled lumber has closed five major mills and numerous smaller ones. Only three big plants have avoided a shutdown.
Another city council "peace session" brought little or no results. Bonn R. Mathis, secretary of the AFL building trades council, said his men "probably" would not be bound by an election.

MRS. PEARL JOHNSON HAS SLOW RECOVERY
GRANTS PASS, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Sixteen days after her skull was fractured in a car accident east of Eugene Rapids dam, Mrs. Pearl Johnson of Medford continued in a semi-conscious and irrational state at the hospital here.
Jack Woolfolk of Medford whose skull also was fractured in the home of his parents here. He was moved from the hospital Sunday.
Mrs. Florence Morgan, Medford, died shortly after the accident.

VON CRAMM QUALIFIES FOR MATCH WITH BUDGE
FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 10.—(AP)—Baron Gottfried von Cramm, German Davis cup ace, qualified today for a return match with California's Don Budge in the final round of the United States tennis championships tomorrow by rallying to beat Bobby Riggs of Los Angeles, 6-8, 6-3, 6-3, 6-2. Von Cramm's semifinal triumph followed the straight-set victory of Budge over Frankie Parker of Milwaukee, 6-2, 6-1, 6-3.
Amila Lizana of Chile won the second set, 6-3, and the match, 6-2, 6-3, from Dorothy Bundy, California.

FOREIGNERS FACE GROWING DANGER IN JAP ASSAULT

Washington, Sept. 10.—(AP)—The state and navy departments warned American merchant vessels today that it is dangerous for them to operate in waters adjacent to the China coast because of the Japanese blockade of that area.

Tourist Business Reaches New High With 116,129 Cars
SALEM, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Oregon's tourist business reached an all-time peak this year of 116,129 out-of-state automobiles up to September 1, Secretary of State Earl Snell said today.
July registrations totaled 31,847 while in August they fell to 31,252.
The figure for the first eight months this year was about 12,000 more than for the same period last year.
Tourists spent about \$35,000,000 in Oregon last year, while this total easily will be surpassed this year, Snell said.
Some 16,885 California cars were registered so far this year, and 17,411 from Washington. There were 3,399 cars from Canada.

CLIMAX SEEN NEAR IN FIGHT BETWEEN TWO UNION GROUPS
Beck Says AFL Will Call On East Coast Members to Refuse Handling of Cargo Loaded in West by CIO
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10.—(AP)—A nationwide tieup of docks was foreseen today by Dave Beck of Seattle, international vice president of the teamsters, who arrived here to direct activities of his union against the longshoremen in a jurisdictional dispute which has halted cargo movement in the bay area.

SECOND GORE SUIT ON O-C SERVICES SET FOR SEPT. 27
The second suit of William H. Gore, pioneer farmer, and former banker, against Jackson county, for money allegedly due for services rendered in securing passage of the Oregon-California land grant tax refund bill by congress in 1926, has been docketed for trial in circuit court, September 27. The trial is expected to last two days.
