

Budge and Jadwiga Blast Way to Final Rounds in Tennis Classic

WIMBLEDON STAR TRIMS PARKER AS POLE BEATS HELEN

Wimbledon Champion Takes Ease in Clearing Last Barrier to Title Play — Jadwiga Wins, 6-4, 6-4

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 10.—(AP)—J. Donald Budge, flaming-haired favorite from Oakland, Calif., today won his semi-final match in straight sets from Davis cup teammate Frankie Parker, of Milwaukee, 6-2, 6-1, 6-3, and thus cleared the last obstacle between himself and the final round of the men's national singles championships.

The Wimbledon champion, who hasn't lost a set since the tournament started, at no time was in danger of going over-time this afternoon as he performed with all the ease of a veteran executioner before a capacity crowd of 14,000 in the West Side Tennis club stadium. He was wild at times, but those streaks were more than balanced by the fact that Budge, from fore-court and back-court, on fore-hand and back-hand, rattled off 47 placements to Parker's 12.

Thus Budge went into the finals alongside of Jadwiga Jedrejowska, another blaster from Poland, who defeated veteran Helen Jacobs of Berkeley, California, 6-4, 6-4, to reach the title round of the women's competition.

ERRATIC SEALS GAIN SECOND PLACE TIE BY EFFORTS OF SERAPHS

San Francisco's erratic Seals moved up into a tie for second place in the Pacific Coast baseball league today.

They got there largely through the efforts of the fourth-place Los Angeles club. The Angels punted down the San Diego Padres, recent league leaders and yesterday sole possessor of second place, 11 to 7 and 9 to 2 yesterday.

The Seals haphazardly split a double header with the San Francisco Missions, 5 to 6 and 14 to 3. The Seals banged out 19 hits in the second game while Win Ballou limited the Reds to 5.

Sacramento increased its lead to six and a half games with a pair of wins over Portland. The Solons got off to a running start in the opening frame to take the opener from the Beavers, 16 to 5, and rallied in the eighth inning of a scheduled seven-inning game to win, 5 to 2.

Home runs played a prominent part in Seattle's double victory over Oakland by 3 to 2 and 7 to 6 scores. Seattle has been in seventh place for two weeks, but by virtue of its two victories last night was only a game and a half behind sixth place Oakland.

WILD BILL BOYD WINS BY TECHNICAL KAYO

Boyd had opened a free bleeding cut over Smith's eye with a half dozen well directed rights.

Smith weighed 221½ and Boyd 187.

"Beanball" Puts Mickey Out of Active Baseball

Old Pop Time marked the final out for one of baseball's grandest playing careers today.

Mickey Cochrane was definitely and officially through as a catcher; in the future, he'll be bench manager only for his Detroit Tigers. His 34 years and the effects of a "beanball" that fractured his skull caused his active retirement.

And all over the big leagues, the reaction was the same:

"He was a great guy while he had it."

Mickey is one of the fellows who makes baseball the national pastime. He was the sparkplug of one world championship team and backbone and manager of another. But, in addition to all that, he's a "right guy."

The boys all like Mickey, and baseball will have to go a long way to find another "man in an iron mask" with his playing ability, his "pepper" or his personality.

In his 12 seasons under the big tent, he's batted 320 in 1,455 games and has driven in 820 runs. He's been in five world series, three for the Athletics and two (1934-35) as pilot of his own Tigers. Those are the only clubs for which he's played since coming up from Portland in 1925 at a fancy price of \$50,000—but worth every cent of it.

While Mickey prepared to leave tonight for a tour of Europe, the rest of the big time dug in again for the stretch drive.

WRESTLING VILLAINS TO MEET HEROES IN TWO BOUTS MONDAY

With the exception of the opening bout between Bobby Wagner of New Hampshire and Young ("Zibby") Zbyzsko of Poland, all grappling action on the Medford armory mat next Monday night will be of the clean versus mean variety, with the Les Wolfe-Tomita team main event apparently destined to explode enough thrills to thoroughly satisfy the most bloodthirsty.

Appearing before a local gallery for the first time in over a year last Monday, Wolfe defeated the popular clean-wrestling Marshall Carter in one fall when the latter was unable to continue after receiving a terrific hammerlock and Chicago crab combined. Setting Carter up for the payoff, Wolfe displayed some of the most vicious mat work to ever insult the game, and is right now the most unpopular gent hereabouts since Ted Christy packed his bags and left in the dead of night.

In defeating Gorilla Pogi, the hairy and horrible Argentinean last Monday, Estes won the right to attempt to put a halt to the terrible Texan, who was once, strangely, one of the fair-haired boys in this neck of the brush.

The middle event will see Marshall Carter facing Pogi, and in this bout, as in the headliner, it will be clean versus mean, with Carter upholding the honor of the whites and Pogi taking care of the blackguard honor, if any.

Bobby Wagner and Young Zbyzsko, both clean and scientific, will open the program in a six 10-minute round or best two out of three fall embroglio. Sailor Dick Trout will conduct official tugs and referee to the best of his ability.

GOOD SEASON SEEN FOR DEER HUNTING; FISHING IMPROVED

The following recreational bulletin was issued today by Rogue river national forest headquarters:

"Fishing conditions throughout the forest are somewhat improved by the cooler weather. Camping and picnicking are made especially attractive for this time of year by the continued clear atmosphere. Prospects for deer hunting appear to be good."

"Successful catches have been made during the past week from the middle fork of the Rogue, and fair catches from the south fork and Seven lakes basin. In the Big Apple-gate, good catches have been reported by use of both flies and bait; the smaller streams in the Applegate district are poor."

"A few large eastern brook trout have been taken on flies in Rogue river near Union Creek, some of them weighing over three pounds. Limit catches are still being made in Fish lake on the Umpqua national forest where over five thousand fish have been taken this season."

"Fishing at Fish lake in the Dead Indian district, Fourmile lake and Lake of the Woods is poor. The resort at Lake of the Woods is now closed, although it is still possible to secure gasoline, groceries and cabins from the caretaker."

"Good deer hunting is indicated near Big Elk and Brush mountain, on the south slopes of Mount McLoughlin, and near Clover creek. Bucks appear to be plentiful in the vicinity of Browns Cabin and Herschberger mountain, and a few have been reported on Huckleberry mountain."

"There is no open season on grouse, native pheasants and gray squirrels this year."

"Attention of all forest travelers is called to the fact that the state laws in regard to smoking while traveling and camp fire permits are still effective. The humidity is low, ground cover dry, and east winds prevail daily. The September conditions in this locality have proved in the past to be the most hazardous of the year and great care by everyone in the forest is necessary if we are to avoid disastrous fires."

FIDGETY DIEGEL GOOD IN CANADA

TORONTO, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Fidgety Leo Diegel, who isn't to be mentioned in the same breath with Ralph Guidahl, Sam Sneed and Tony Manero the other side of the international boundary, is still head man north of the border.

One of Leo's favorite pastimes is winning the Canadian open. He did it in 1924, '26, '28, and '29. Now he's back trying again and in a big way for he shot a sparkling 68, three under par, yesterday to tie the Lighthouse Harry Cooper for the lead at the end of the first day of the 72-hole tournament.

Cooper too knows what it's all about. He won the crown in 1932 at Ottawa with 290. But yesterday he had to take a back seat. Even though he tied Leo, Diegel's first nine took the play not only from Cooper but from Guidahl, Sneed, Manero and the rest.

The Philmont, Pa., veteran went out in 31 with four birdies and five threes. He "slumped" coming in and took a 36, one over regulation figures. Cooper's round was less spectacular but amazingly steady.

Giants Save Face Of Pro Gridders By Taking Stars

Those New York Giants of the National Professional Football league, Bill Morgan's outfit for four years until he retired not long ago, may take a bow. In fact the Giants may stand out there on the Polo Grounds and take all the bows they want and be assured that thousands of so-called experts in the country over, even including sports writers, will remain to applaud.

By their 14-7 victory over the eastern college all-stars of Andy Kerr Wednesday evening, the Giants not only saved the face of the entire game of professional football, but preserved the collective physiognomy of the nation's very extra, super-intelligent platoon learning. The latter group, numbering nearly every supposedly smart football man in the country and probably 99 per cent of the sports writers, who are sometimes referred to as experts (by themselves), were unanimous in their opinion that college football couldn't hold the proverbial candle to the boys who play for pay.

Until this season, that assumption had been pretty well borne out by the annual all-star college teams versus the big-time pro aggregations. However, last week the pick of college football talent rose up to defeat the mighty Green Bay Packers, last year's world champs, 6-0 in Chicago, and a horrified cry was immediately heard from the "pro" cohorts.

It couldn't be so, they yelled. Then, down in Dallas, Texas, a few nights later, Chicago's professional pride and joy, the Bears, took a 6-0 licking from the same gang of college all-stars. That was almost the last straw, and you could plainly see the foundation of America's newest professional sport began to crumble around the edges.

The loss of prestige to the pro game was really reaching serious proportions when the Giants faced off against the college all-stars in New York city. And, because the Giants won, thousands of dollars were undoubtedly saved for pro team coffers; dollars that would have found their way to college treasuries had the collegians made it three straight.

Local football "eggheads" who still couldn't believe that the "rah rah" boys could beat the professionals, advanced the theory that the collegians were in better condition. They claimed that the pros, all older men, needed considerably more actual drilling to reach their peak than did the collegians, fresh out of school. They likened the pro footballer to the aging professional baseball player who never reaches top form until mid-year. That seems about as good an explanation as any other regarding the two defeats suffered by the professionals. Being one of the guys who would back the pros with our all against any college or collection of collegians, that's good enough for us, anyway.

Wally Rickert, who will manage the Jackson county all-stars in their three-game series against the Josephine county outfit at the county fair

in Grants Pass Sept. 23 and 24, has just about decided on a roster of 13 players. Rickert said that a couple of workouts would be held shortly before the series.

Pitchers expected to see action in the Climate City are Lowell Brown, Ashland southpaw, and Ray Erickson and Jack Hughes, Medford right-handers. Cliff McLean, Ashland receiver, will probably do all the catching. Leonard Patterson, Ashland, will be on first base, and the remainder of the Jackson county infield will be selected from Rickert, himself, Dick Lewis, Medford shortstop, Frank Donovan, Medford third baseman, Arga Ager, Ashland third baseman, with all seeing plenty of action. Outfielders will be Barrell Leavens, Ashland, and Paul Hoffman, Dick Sakaida, and George Glitzen, all of Medford.

Cuff Scribbings: Night baseball is hitting the major leagues in earnest . . . both the St. Louis Browns and Cardinals will follow in the footsteps of Cincinnati next year and turn on the glimmers . . . 44 JUNIOR GRIDDERS GREET HARRINGTON IN FIRST CALL OF YEAR

George Harrington, former Medford high and Linfield college star athlete, beginning his first year as coach of local junior high school teams, was greeted by 44 potential first string players yesterday afternoon as he issued his first practice call of the year.

Louie Thurman, fullback, was the lone letterman to report, but Harrington stated that prospects looked extremely "bright" because of the large number to turn out and the apparent size of many. He said that five candidates weighed over 160 pounds.

Drills yesterday consisted only of offensive blocking and lumbering-up exercises. Junior high's first game will be played in about two weeks, the new coach said, with a scrimmage session against the second or third high school team being staged beforehand.

Although no definite schedule has been arranged, Harrington said the juniors would play St. Mary's of Medford, and the Ashland and Grants Pass junior high outfits. Also, a game may be arranged with the Klamath Falls Juniors.

Coach Harrington plans to work with a squad of 33 players all year. Many who turned out yesterday, he said, would be too small for varsity action and will be turned over to Loye Marshall, who will coach the junior high midgets.
