

PORTLAND BUND DENIES EFFORTS TOWARD FASCISM

Leader Invites Press to Attend Any Meetings—Admitted Foes of Communism—G-Men Make Survey

PORTLAND, Sept. 10.—(AP)—The Portland chapter of the American Bund, through its leader, Hans C. Scheurer, invited reporters to attend any of its weekly meetings, held at a local restaurant, as its answer to charges of being an American branch of Adolf Hitler's storm troops.

The invitation was issued following publication of a copyrighted story by the Chicago Times which asserted the organization was preparing for a counter offensive "when the communist revolution starts."

Nothing to Hide.
"We have nothing to hide. We'll be glad to show you our books," Scheurer said. "There is no truer American organization than this. We are fighting communism in the United States—we are in the open on that—but storm troops, that gives me a laugh."

The Portland group is said to have about 150 members.
Robert G. Clostermann, German consul, said that while he was not a member of the Volkbund, he was aware of its existence. He said it was his belief that all members were American citizens and that the German government did not desire Germans retaining their citizenship to join.

"You can quote me as saying there are no storm troops, or anything along that line. It is a fraternal organization, for social affairs and culture of its members," the consul said.

J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the federal bureau of investigation, revealed here yesterday the bureau had started an investigation of alleged nazi activities in the United States six weeks ago, at the request of the attorney general.

"We expect to make an extended report on the nazi matter, but I can't say when we'll be ready to give this report to the attorney general," he said. "It will be several weeks, because we are going into this matter very thoroughly."

EAST OREGONIANS HAVE DAY AT FAIR

SALEM, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Eastern Oregon residents and members of farm organizations were honor guests at the 78th Oregon state fair today. Feature of today's nine-event racing card will be the Eastern Oregon handicap. Attendance today was expected to be less than the 12,500 persons who came yesterday, which was Portland day.

Floyd T. Fox, Silverton, was elected president of the Oregon Purebred Livestock association at its meeting here. M. C. Maris of Portland was named secretary-treasurer.

The fair management presented a gold trophy to three Canby boys who won the Future Farmers of America livestock judging contest. Ray Farnsworth of Canby took individual honors.

The livestock division of the 4-H club contest, there were 614 head of stock, including 165 dairy cattle.
All fair judging was completed yesterday.

Worse Depression Coming Mormon Apostle Warns

MESA, Ariz., Sept. 10.—(AP)—Warning of a depression "no much worse than the last it will not admit of comparison," Melvin J. Ballard, an apostle of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, toured Arizona today, instructing Mormons to fill great storehouses with food and clothing sufficient to last a year.

"No man knows what hour it will strike, but it is certain to come and it may come soon," he told 3000 members of the St. Joseph Stake at Safford. "The church must be ready to care for its own."

Ballard came to Arizona from Salt Lake City, Utah, to address the quarterly conference of the vast Maricopa Stake here Sunday. At that time he is expected to deal further with plans of the church to take its members from government relief rolls and prepare for future economic tribulations.

At Safford Ballard ordered Mormons of the Gila valley to immediately begin building a huge warehouse and start production of supplies. He declared their stored products should be ample to feed and clothe all members of the district at least a year.

"We are making great progress toward our end that no member of the Mormon church be a burden to the government at this or any future time," Ballard said.

"We are building storehouses and producing and storing vast quantities of meats, vegetables and breadstuffs."

"We are carrying on an extensive building program to give jobs to men taken from government relief rolls, and we are buying large tracts of land susceptible to irrigation on which we will place thousands of families."

The increases are not general and apply only to the business area. Many of the rates remain the same as they were while others have been reduced, the Mail Tribune was told.

The increases, it was understood, may be eliminated by removal of the hazards made the basis of charges against the individual properties by the Oregon Insurance Rating bureau.

While the present increases are individual, it was indicated that a blanket hiking of rates for the whole city might follow unless the hazards cited by the bureau are eliminated.

Faulty Installation Cited
Principal hazards causing the rate increases were said to be the faulty installation of oil burners and stove pipes, change in occupancy of buildings and alterations which made ingress into adjoining properties without adequate fire safeguards.

A survey of the business area has been made this week by W. F. White, engineer, and Lester L. Large, surveyor, of the Oregon Insurance Rating bureau. Mr. White was to return to Portland headquarters this afternoon while Mr. Large was to remain here another week, making surveys in communities adjacent to Medford.

Code Held Adequate
To forestall misunderstanding over the rate increases, Mr. White said they had absolutely no relation to this year's fires at the Medford Domestic Laundry and the Rogue River Valley Canning company, two of the most serious blazes here in a long period. The increases, he pointed out, apply only to individual downtown buildings where remedial hazards exist.

Mr. White acknowledged that the city in general has an excellent reputation for fire prevention and control, with a comparatively small per capita fire loss record.

It was indicated also that the city's building code and related ordinances are adequate in covering the fire hazard situation.

1 cup Borden's Evaporated Milk
1/2 cup water
6 tablespoons granulated sugar
1/4 cup cornstarch
