C. A. Wing was awarded first for Comice and D'Anjou pears and second for Red Delicious apples.

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## Wall St. Report

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Heavy selling waves hit the stock market today, driving numerous leaders down 1 to 6 points and some much more.

Traders threw holdings overboard at even a faster rate than in last Tuesday's break and at the peak of the release near the final hour the ticker tape fell 5 minutes behind. Bottom marks for more than a year were widely distributed.

Analysts could find no outstanding news development to account for the slide. They at first attributed it to a "secondary reaction" which usually follows a downturn such as occurred the early part of the week. The retreat, though, turned out to be much greater than "secondary."

Both the Mediterranean and Far Eastern situations were watched closely, but brokers thought developments in these sectors were not such as to revive the market's war fright. There was no appreciable change in the murky business picture.

## Chicago Wheat

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Fresh tumbles of wheat prices carried the market here down about 2 1/2 cents a bushel late today.

As dealings approached an end, selling pressure on wheat increased owing largely to greater notice taken of possible use of the United States neutrality act in connection with the undeclared war in the Orient. It was contended that such use of the neutrality act might result in serious restriction of American export products like cotton and wheat as well as in arms.
