

JACKSON COUNTY 4-H CLUBS TAKE HONORS AT FAIR

Nine Prizes Won in Keen Competition—Table Rock, Ashland and Howard Dis- tricts Prominent in Tests

Nine prizes have been taken by Jackson county's 4-H club members at the state fair so far this week, including two first prizes, one second, one third, one fifth, two sixths, one seventh and one eighth.

Etna Davis of Table Rock placed first in the Northwestern Yeast company's special bread baking contest, sponsored for the first time this year. In this part of the contest the eight girls entering the contest were judged on the actual mixing and baking of the bread at the fair in addition to the quality of the finished product.

Mary Esther Davis, also of Table Rock, and a sister of Etna, placed third, while Etna placed eighth in the other division of the special contest which was an exhibit of one loaf of brown bread and a dozen light rolls. This contest was open to all Oregon 4-H Cookery III girls.

Win Canning Honors

In the Ball company special canning contest, Mary Esther Davis placed seventh against more entries than in any other canning contest, and in the canning judging contest, Mary Esther and Olive Davis placed sixth.

BIG POPULATION GAIN IS SEEN FOR ONTARIO

PORTLAND, Sept. 10.—(AP)—The completion of the Owyhee project and the rehabilitation of 100,000 acres in Malheur county should give Ontario a population of about 10,000 persons in the next five years, Representative Virgil Staples said today.

"There isn't a business house vacant in the city, and the school district was forced to employ from eight to nine extra teachers," he added. "Our population has grown from 1900 seven years ago to more than 3000."
