

FEHL AGAIN SUES NIEDERMAYER, INC. SEES 'CONSPIRACY'

L. Niedermayer and Niedermayer, Inc. are named as defendants in a \$40,000 damage suit, filed by Earl H. Fehl, former Jackson county judge today in circuit court. Fehl alleges a "joint conspiracy to defraud," and lists three causes of action, in voluminous complaint prepared by himself. The plaintiff uses the affix "Judge."

The complaint sets forth that on April 1, 1930, Fehl borrowed from Niedermayer, on a promissory note, secured by a mortgage on Sixth street property, \$3500, which "has been more than paid." It is alleged the note and mortgage "were fraudulently endorsed and assigned to Niedermayer, Inc." and testimony offered \$3500 note had not been paid by Fehl. On this count \$15,000 is sought.

On the second cause of action, \$10,000 is sought, and on the third cause \$15,000 is asked, for "mental anguish and suffering, and loss of credit, and business standing."

It is also averred that a considerable portion of the alleged "joint conspiracy" occurred while Fehl was "forcibly detained" in the Oregon state prison, while serving a four-year sentence for conviction in the Jackson county ballot theft trials.

Fehl early this week filed a "notice-demand" ultimatum upon County Judge Earl B. Day, calling upon Day to relinquish the county judgeship. In this unusual document, Fehl claimed he was the "elected and qualified county judge," and held that Day had usurped his office.

CRATER CLUB TO PARADE OLD STAGE

Riding in an antique stage coach drawn by four black horses, the Crater club will make another bid today to capture first prize honors in the featured parade of Gold Rush days in Yreka, Calif. The Craters took the sweepstakes award last year.

The old coach, relic of by-gone days, has been procured in Yreka and will be an appropriate addition to the annual celebration designed to revive the roaring mining days of 1849.

About fifteen members of the Crater club, attired in their Daniel Boone regalia, will ride in the stage. An effort will be made to find two or three genuine pioneers to ride with them.

Craters planning to take part in the celebration are asked to be at the Yreka fair at 12:30. All members are invited to participate. George T. Frey and Larry Schade are in charge of the delegation.

BODY OF KYLGE CASH WILL BE SENT HOME

The body of Kyle Cash, 21-year-old bakery worker who was killed Wednesday night when he was crushed in an elevator accident at Flourer's bakery, was shipped to Belton, Ark., Friday for burial, according to the Peet funeral home, in charge of arrangements. His mother, Mrs. Maude Cash of 714 West Palm street, with whom young Cash lived, accompanied her son to their former home.

A post mortem performed Thursday afternoon revealed actual cause of death was "traumatic shock from a crushed chest and abdomen." Contributing to death was an internal hemorrhage, result of the rupture of a large vein.

After being located at 125 East Main street for 20 years, the F. W. Woolworth company will move into new quarters that will equal the finest of any Pacific coast unit. The store space will be completely remodeled and refitted and all fixtures will be of the most modern available. A feature of the store will be an up-to-date lunch room on the main floor with the kitchen located in the basement. Food will be transferred by means of an electric elevator. Lunch counter will be of tan tile and all equipment will be the latest word in modernity.

The building will be steam heated and feature the latest in indirect lighting. Eight mahogany booth-counters instead of the present four will be used, and the entire building will more than double the present display and selling space of the store. In addition to the kitchen, the basement will be utilized for a stock room.

R. M. Schino, manager of the Medford store for the past three years, said that the tremendous increase of business made it necessary to move to larger quarters. He was highly pleased with the plans for the new setup and expressed his unreserved faith in the community.

BUS SERVICE IS INAUGURATED ON MEDFORD STREETS

After a lapse of many years, a public transportation system is again supplying pedestrian Medfordites with conveyance. Three shiny, cream-colored buses were inaugurated in service here Saturday by James Rudides and Robert Harnish.

The new buses bring to long-time residents memories of the old Jacksonville trolley and Medford street cars in operation here many years ago. Portions of the Main street tracks of the line, relics of boom days, of greater travel between historic Jacksonville and the busy fruit metropolis of Medford, still remain toirk motorists and cyclists.

Main routes to be followed by the Medford Motor Bus company's cars are West Main, East Main, West Jackson, fair grounds and Berrydale, which will maintain daily schedules.

A split shift mornings and evenings will serve the high school, Roosevelt school and the Crater Lake highway to Spring street. This shift will not be run on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. Detailed schedule of this split shift will be announced later.

Terminal of the routes will be the intersection of Main and Central avenue, where transfers will be made. Expansions or changes in the present routes may be made later, according to requests or need of residents if feasible, the owners state.

The Main street route will serve from the west border of town to Wellington Heights just this side of the Rogue Valley golf course; the Jackson street bus will also travel on North Central avenue and continue to Berrydale on the Old Pacific highway and the fair grounds as the other terminus.

FAKE DEPUTY IS SOUGHT FOR AUTO STOLEN BY RUSE

State police were last night searching for an unidentified man who yesterday afternoon, under the guise of a deputy sheriff from Josephine county, allegedly stole a 1935 Ford coach from Perry L. Ashcraft, local Packard motor car dealer.

Ashcraft reported to state police that about 1 p. m. yesterday, a man, "30 or 35 years old and dark complexioned," entered his establishment at 128 South Riverside avenue and wanted to purchase an auto. Ashcraft told the authorities that he and the man drove about town in the Ford coach, and upon returning to the garage, the man left to "think it over."

Then, the Packard dealer explained to state police, the man reappeared about an hour later and requested the use of the car to drive to Central Point so that he could show it to his wife for final decision on the "sale."

Ashcraft told state police that the man produced deputy sheriff's badge purportedly from Josephine county, and otherwise, apparently identified himself. The man took the car.

When the man and Ford hadn't returned by 6 p. m., Ashcraft notified state police and the latter immediately sent word to Grants Pass and Ashland city police, the California quarantine station, and the state police broadcasting station in Klamath Falls.

TYPHOON SWEEPS JAPANESE COAST

TOKYO, Sept. 12.—(Sunday)—(AP)—Japan today counted at least 60 dead in the wake of a 73-mile-an-hour typhoon which scourged her western and southern coasts, injuring hundreds and leaving scores missing.

The gale, accompanied by torrential rains, swept in from the Loochoo islands and yesterday morning struck Shikoku, the southern island, where its ravages were greatest.

At many places the winds coincided with high tides, sweeping walls of water inland, inundating hundreds of houses and trapping many victims. Property damage running into millions of dollars was spread from the extreme southwest to the Tokyo-Yokohama area, a swath some 900 miles long.

COLUMBIA RIVER MILLMEN'S UNION PLEDGE CIO AID

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Sept. 11.—(AP)—All locals of the Columbia River district council have pledged their support in a fight against the A. F. of L. in Portland, Al Hartung, president of the parent organization of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers' union, said today at the opening of the two-day monthly conference.

He told delegates that 90 per cent of the workers in the Portland sawmills, where the A. F. of L. is contesting with the C. I. O. for control, have signed membership cards of the C. I. O. affiliate, the Lumber and Sawmill Workers' union, and that any election among them as to union preferences would be welcomed with the outcome beyond doubt.

A campaign designed to acquaint A. F. of L. workers with objectives of the C. I. O. probably will be stepped out at the conference as well as a program for improving the financial position of the council and the submission of resolutions affirming its position in the Portland crisis.

VOTE EXAMS FOR FOOD HANDLERS

THE DALES, Sept. 11.—(AP)—With an approximate 25 per cent of the electorate voting, citizens at a referendum election Friday affirmed by a margin of 34 a city ordinance which will compel employees of food shops, barbers and beauticians to submit semi-annually to physical examinations.

The ordinance, initiated by the Wasco county health unit, is aimed at a control and prevention of venereal and other infectious diseases. The ordinance was referred by an organization of food handlers, whose chief criticism was that the regulation places the cost of the examination on employees.

NATIONAL GUARD BACK TO CLATSOP

SALEM, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The Oregon national guard, ataging the largest troop concentration in the history of the state, will train on Oregon soil next year, approximately 3,600 officers, and men gathering at Camp Clatsop, near Astoria, in June, Maj. Gen. George A. White said today.

Previously the Oregon coast artillery has encamped at Fort Stevens.

Jap Ship Troubled

SEATTLE, Sept. 11.—(AP)—District coast guard headquarters said the 13,026-ton Japanese steamer Shinyo Maru flashed a distress call at 9 a. m. (P. C. T.) today off the southern coast of Japan.
