OREGON FARMERS GET 17 MILLION FOR 1937 CROPS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Higher prices and larger crops brought rich reward to farmers of the Pacific northwest states and Utah this year.

Agriculture department statistics show that farm income in the four states—Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Utah—jumped from \$143,548,000 for the period from January 1 to July 31, 1935, to \$188,612,000 for the same period this year. Income from crops and livestock and livestock products for the same months last year was \$139,351,000.

The department was optimistic about the remainder of the 1937 season, saying a survey disclosed fruit crops above average and the prices of most crops, except apples, at least as high as a year ago.

"The wheat crop in the region is considerably larger than in 1936," the department said, "and the income from livestock should exceed

that of the same period last year." July income rocketed from \$23,862,000 in 1935 to \$36,810,000 this year, hitting \$33,914,000 on the way up in 1936.

Some of the estimates made by the agriculture department experts: Oregon crops brought \$4,954,000 in July, 1937, compared with \$4,456,000 in 1936 and \$2,214,000 in 1935. Oregon farmers received \$5,935,000 from livestock and livestock products last July, \$5,685,000 in July, 1936, and \$4,937,000 the same month of 1935.

Crops brought Oregon farmers \$17,306,000 up to August 1 of this year, compared to \$11,063,000 a year ago, and \$11,429,000 in 1935. Sales of livestock and livestock products, during the same period, yielded \$39,360,000 in 1937, \$27,190,000 in 1936, and \$26,162,000 in 1935.

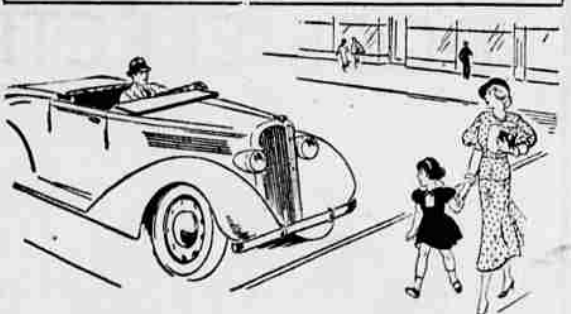
HOT? GET AN EYEFUL OF THIS!

STOCKS REVIVED, LOSSES REGAINED TRADING RAPID

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Stocks forged ahead today in the fastest Saturday session since last March and many of the most active shares regained \$1 to \$3 of yesterday's sharp losses.

Brokers said many "shorts" scrambled for cover over the week-end while bargain hunters bought here and there what they considered "oversold" issues.

Trading was rapid from the start.

with the ticker tape frequently behind transactions and blocks of 1000 to 3000 shares quickly snapped up. There was a bit of profit taking toward the close and there were some reversions from the day's best prices.

Buying sentiment was buoyed by orders to purchase from abroad and strength in the Amsterdam market, the only important European securities exchange open to Saturday trading. Wall Street appeared to consider the Mediterranean war scare almost entirely discounted.

As usual U.S. Steel was one of the most actively traded issues. It closed at \$95.25, up \$2.25. Other gainers included Bethlehem, \$82.50, up by the same margin. Chrysler \$96.25, up \$2.37. International Harvester, \$93.50, up \$3.50. J. I. Case, \$140, up \$3. U. S. Rubber, \$43, up \$2.50 and American Can \$94.50, up \$2.25.

HARMONY SOUGHT IN LABOR RANKS

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 11.—(AP)—The first meeting of the new Lower Columbia Labor Unity Council, outgrowth of a split in the central labor council, brought a plea from Roy Kizer, temporary president, that the unions join "in the interests of harmony in the labor movement" regardless of affiliation.

Eight A. F. of L. members and 32 I. O. representatives attended. At a separate meeting, the central labor council wired President Roosevelt urging that the United States like the marines to evacuate Americans in China and then adopt hands-off policy in the Sino-Japanese conflict.

MEDFORD SCOUTS ON EUROPE TOUR HOME THIS WEEK

(Editor's note: The following letter was received from Jack Thompson who, with Jerry Vawter and Bud Thierolf, attended the world jamboree of Boy Scouts in Holland recently. The Medford youths are now on their way back to America, being due to arrive in Portland September 15.)

Paris, Sept. 1
The following is an account of our wonderful trip from Switzerland through Italy to France. At Lucerne, Switzerland we went sightseeing around the lake, we took a ride up to the hotel on the top of the mountain in a car on a continuous cable. We spent most of our morning up there, then came back to Lucerne and toured the city. Next day, the 20th, we took the most beautiful of our trip. This was over the Alps to Interlaken, where we spent one night. Then we took an 800-foot climb by electric train to a small town called Lauterbrunnen which is higher in the Alps than Interlaken. At Lauterbrunnen, the boys going to Italy joined the Seattle, Wn., boys and the next day we left for Interlaken and got our pack boards and other equipment and boarded the train for Milan, our first stop in Italy.

There, we stayed one day. We saw the famous cathedral in the morning also the famous painting, "The Last Supper." In the afternoon we took an electric train to Venice, where we spent most of our time going around in gondolas and seeing the St. Mark's cathedral, Bridge of Sighs, and the Rialto bridge. On Aug. 15 we left for Florence where we shopped for leather goods and saw the tomb of Amerigo Vespucci, for whom America was named. We left for Rome the next day.

In Rome, we took a sightseeing tour through the ruins, to St. Peter's cathedral in Vatican city, the Vatican's palace, and Mussolini's home and office. We had only two days in Rome, so we had to hurry through everything. We left Rome for France at 9:30 a. m. Aug. 29 by sleeper car, which proved to be very trying—20 hours on the train.

In Paris, we spent three days sightseeing, seeing the Unknown Soldier's tomb, Napoleon's tomb, and the Notre Dame cathedral. Today, Sept. 1, we were free to go to the exposition. The prettiest and best time to see this is at night with the Eiffel tower decorated with different lights and colors. Today, the president's mother saw the American exhibition.

Hurricane at Sea
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 11.—(AP)—A tropical hurricane carrying "dangerous conditions" for shipping whirled through the Atlantic ocean today, its northeasterly course carrying it away from land.

1,198 NEW HOMES BUILT IN OREGON

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The bureau of labor statistics reported today 118,597 new dwelling units were built in the nation's urban areas during the first half of 1937, an increase of 39 per cent over the corresponding six months of last year.

"The bureau's figures show that cities of all sizes registered gains in the number of family dwelling units provided," Secretary Perkins said. The bureau announced state totals of new dwelling units for the first six months this year including: Oregon, 1,198.

Walter Abbey Has Large Shipment Of Model M Tractors

new show rooms at Ninth and Bartlett.

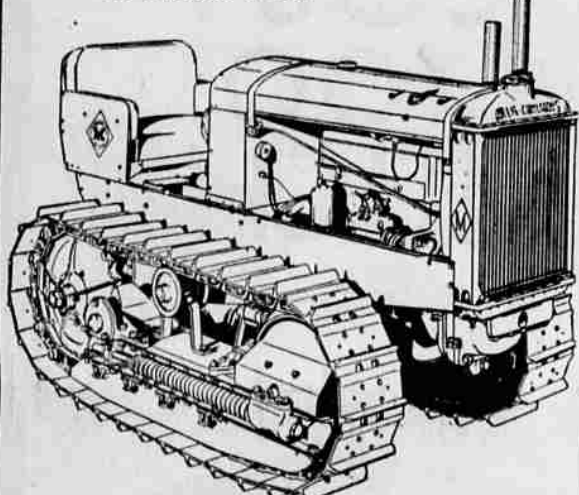
Pass Billion Mark
