

Estes Given Task of Taming Les Wolfe in Tonight's Main Grapple

CARTER TO MEET MEAN ARGENTINE IN SEMI-WINDUP

Wagner and Zbyszko Tangle in Opening Brawl at Armory — Fans Hot for Estes End Villain's Reign

Lean, lanky Les Wolfe and popular Toots Estes, tops in their respective grappling brackets, will have it out tonight in the main event at the Medford armory. The meanest rascal now appearing in southern Oregon, Wolfe will face the number 1 man of the brigade which depends on clean and scientific maneuvers, Toots Estes.

Building up to what is expected to be one of the most sensational matches of the year, Marshall Carter will meet Gorilla Pogi in the middle bout and Bobby Wagner and Young "Zibby" Zbyszko will lock horns in the opener. The main go will be for two out of three falls or a one-hour time limit, while the two other matches will be staged under the Australian system, six 10-minute rounds or the best two out of three tumbles.

In defeating Carter last week, Wolfe displayed a villainous offense that not only gained him the verdict but left the popular Carter painfully injured on the mat. The match, while a thriller, aroused an intense fan-hate toward the Texan, and a capacity crowd is expected tonight to discover whether Estes and his belting dropkicks can overcome the all-around brutality of Wolfe.

By his loss last week to Wolfe, Carter, the ex-University of Missouri wrestling instructor, dropped down a notch in the billing, and will face the hairy and horrible Argentinean, Gorilla Pogi. Bated a dyed-in-the-wool meanie, Pogi proved no disappointment in his initial showing last Monday, but is expected to have his hands full with Carter, who will be fighting for main event action again following last week's loss.

The curtain raiser pitting Wagner and Zbyszko will be the lone match of the evening featuring clean wrestling versus cleanie. Both are masters of all the real wrestling holds.

SENATORS APPEAR CINCH FOR FLAG

(By the Associated Press) The Sacramento Senators appeared "in" today as they paced the Pacific Coast baseball league by five games with one week of competition left before the playoffs.

They shared a double header with Portland yesterday, dropping the opener, 7 to 9, but Tony Freitas' one-hit pitching in the nightcap gave the leaders a 2-to-0 shutout.

San Diego, which up to a fortnight ago led the league, before losing seven in a row to skid to second place, divided a brace of games with Los Angeles. The Angels took the opener, 5 to 2, but the Padres pounded the ball hard in the second game to take an 8-to-3 decision.

Base hits flew in all directions as Oakland and Seattle shared a pair. Although outlived 15 to 11, Seattle won the 10-inning opener, 6 to 5, with two singles and a long fly to center field. In the nightcap, the Oaks pounded on the offerings of three Seattle pitchers for a 11-to-9 win.

San Francisco's Seals, pushed into third place Saturday when they lost two to the San Francisco Missions, marked Old Timers' day Sunday with a 5-to-4 win over the Missions.

FREDDIE STEELE TO TAKE LONG VACATION

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 13.—(AP)—If any more middleweights have a hankering to take the world's championship from Freddie Steele of Tacoma, Wash., they will have to wait a while.

Steele, after knocking off Ken Overlin of Washington, D. C., in four rounds here Saturday, decided immediately to take a long rest. He was all broken up over the recent death of his manager, Dave Miller.

"I don't want to fight any sooner than I have to," he said. After firing two crushing left hooks in quick succession to finish Overlin in the fourth, Steele broke down before the near-capacity crowd of close to 8000 fans and sobbed openly. "The boys didn't see it; the boys didn't see it."
