Their hope, though they couldn't express it publicly, was that he wasn't, and, if he was, that it would not be on their road.

Furthermore, the financial return for providing a rolling White House far from compensates for the extra services required and the wear and tear on nerves.

Formerly, a pilot engine was always run ahead of the president's train, but this isn't done any more.

The tracks are so carefully guarded that the pilot is considered superfluous. If any attempt to disturb the presidential train were made, it isn't considered likely that the pilot train would be mistaken for the real article.

Some of the White House secret service men apparently feel the same way as the railroad men do about the president's long train trips.

At least it looked that way at Tuesday's crowded press conference. Although they seemed bored enough when the president read his statement concerning Senator Black, they cocked their ears when he was asked about his proposed trip to the west.

Postmaster-General Farley dropped into town Tuesday when the president returned, but had to drop out again for those New York primaries.

Possibly he did not have time to look over the mail on his "other" desk.

If he didn't, then Senator Bailey of North Carolina will understand why that letter of his to the chairman of the Democratic national committee, asking some pertinent question about the famous and unfortunate Guffey speech which took the hide of Senators Wheeler, Burke and O'Mahoney, wasn't answered.

What Senator Bailey wants is an admission that the Democratic committee sponsored the speech or a flat repudiation of its contents. He'll get neither, unless Mr. Farley changes his mind.

It's pretty well established that the committee had nothing to do with the speech, that Charles Michelson, Farley, and the president did not see the text before the speech was delivered. Nor did the committee make arrangements for broadcasting it.

But, as stated in this column earlier, none of them faints when they hear it, nor is Mr. Guffey likely to be read out of the party for his harsh words against his colleagues.

8 DIE IN CRASH EN ROUTE TO LIMA

LIMA, Peru, Sept. 16.—(AP)—An ambulance crew today gathered up the bodies of eight persons killed when a coastal passenger plane crashed into a hillside 40 miles south of Lima.

The plane, piloted by Stanley Harvey, identified as native of Illinois and former United States army flier, had battled heavy fog last night along the western coast of South America en route from Arica, Chile, to Lima. It carried seven passengers.

In the list of the victims, as issued by the Faucett airlines, operators of the plane, was Thomas J. Rice, identified as a representative of the Wrigley chewing gum concern, and a man identified as Luis Guillen, former counselor of the Spanish legation at Lima.

Four of the passengers were identified as Peruvians and the seventh as a German or Austrian named Feisman.
