

# JACKSON COUNTY EXHIBITS PLANNED FOR FAIR IN G. P.

September 23 has been designated as Jackson county day at the 21st annual Josephine county fair to be held in Grants Pass September 22 to 25, inclusive. It has been announced by Fred G. Roper, secretary and manager.

With cash awards for exhibits totaling \$1400 and many entertainment features planned, expectations are for the most successful celebration in the history of the fair. Roper said that a rock drilling contest had been added to the program, with the single-jack event taking place September 23 for a purse of \$75 and the

double-jack drilling to be staged the following day for a cash award of \$150. Other fair features will see the world-famous Fordyce brothers present their head-on collision, each driving cars at 35 miles an hour. They will also stage balloon ascensions and parachute jumps daily. All-star baseball teams from Josephine and Jackson counties will meet September 25 in the first of a three-game series. There will be fireworks, a carnival and dancing every day.

Many Jackson county farmers and ranchers are expected to enter the following exhibits to compete for cash prizes: draft horses, registered dairy cattle, swine, sheep and goats, poultry, agriculture, horticulture, women's textile, wood and metal work, culinary, flowers and others.

There will also be exhibits for 4-H club members and prizes awarded for the best displays of various minerals from any place in southern Oregon.

## Chicago Wheat

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—(AP)—Sudden late tumbles of September corn quotations today took the market down 5 1/2 cents from a maximum rise of 6 1/2 cents to new high price records for the season.

The reaction followed delivery of a small lot of corn on September contracts. This was the first time this month that a single bushel had been offered in settlement of outstanding bargains, and in some quarters was interpreted as betokening a break in the deadlock "corner" that recently has disturbed the grain trade.

Although the carrier wage conference was still under way at Chicago, and Well Street had thoughts of a compromise agreement, doubts arose regarding the outlook for an immediate settlement.

News from both foreign and domestic fronts was spotty and seemingly lacked particular stimulation for either the buying or selling side.

Dealings were comparatively slow throughout, transfers being around 900,000 shares.

## AUTUMN SHOPPING GAINS MOMENTUM

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—(AP)—Trade movements expanded beyond the usual fall proportions this week. Dun & Bradstreet said today in the weekly review of business.

"Consumers covered their deferred requirements so generously that retail distribution attained a vigorous momentum," the agency said. "Quick to respond to the faster rate of consumption, wholesale markets recovered rapidly, the aim of retailers revealing the incompleteness of inventories in many stores.

"Except in those divisions affected by the customary between-season lag, industrial operations edged upward, with durable goods in the foreground.

The review estimated retail sales for the country as a whole at 4 to 10 per cent ahead of the preceding week and 8 to 20 per cent better than the like week a year ago.
