## FARM PROGRAM HELD JUST COMMON SENSE

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—(AP)**—A ruddy-faced western wheat farmer Norris E. Dodd of Haines, Ore., described the proposed federal farm program today as "just common sense."

He said the complicated plan for establishing national, state, county and farm "pools" or limits on acreage of corn, cotton, tobacco, peanuts and rice, actually is simple.

"Just regard my farm as an example of all the farms in the country," he said. "If I have 100 acres of wheat land and 90 acres will produce enough feed for the nation, it's silly to plant more."

## First Willamette Law Dean Passes

**MCMINNVILLE, Sept. 17.—(P)**—The first dean of the Willamette university law school and a former mayor of Salem—William Marion Ramsey, 90,—died at his home here yesterday.

Ramsey, member of the Oregon bar since 1888, served as judge for the 12th judicial district, headed the Salem city government for one term and served as mayor of McMinville for two terms. Judge Ramsey lived at Salem for 14 years and was mayor early in the century.

## Fire Hazard Delays Opening Of Forests

**SALEM, Sept. 17.—(P)**—Forests will remain closed longer than usual this fall because of the high fire hazard, the state forestry department said today.

A hazard existed throughout Oregon today, although lessened somewhat by moist winds and fog on the coast.

There were only a few small blazes, all under control, in the state today. They started during the low humidity period Monday and Tuesday when a hot wind blew down from the north.

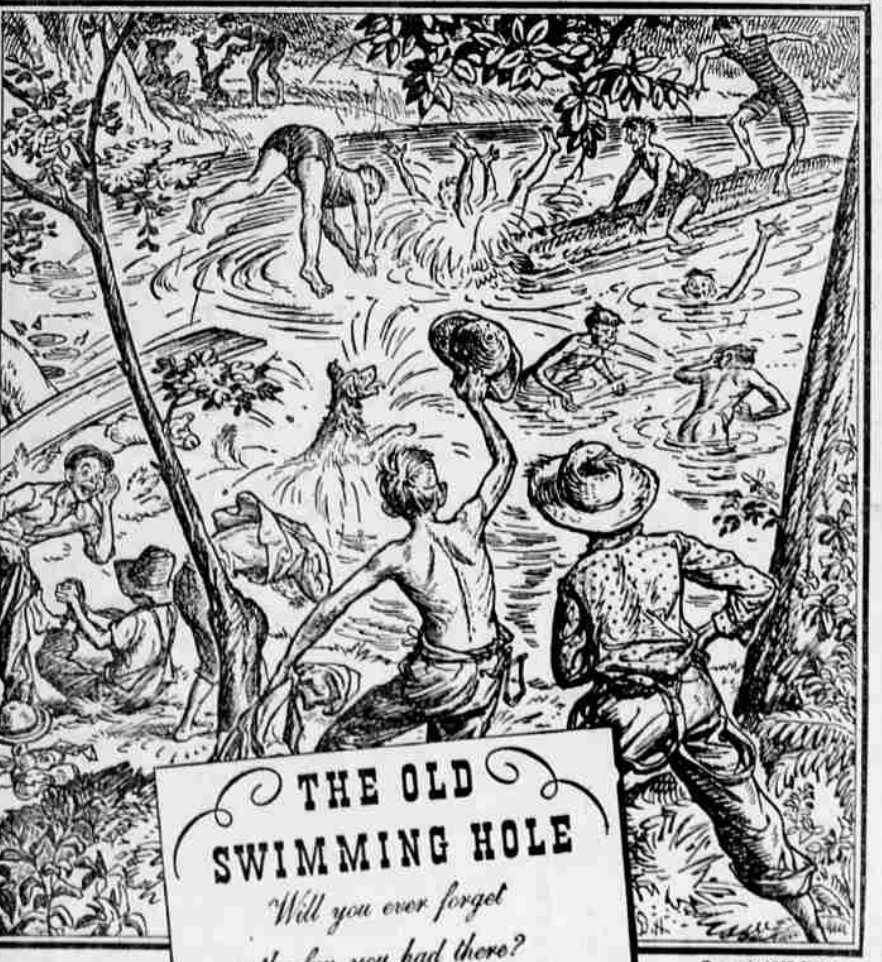
