

Cubs Gain Full Game, When Reds Rout Giants and Great Hubbell

CHICAGO SHAVES LEAGUE LEAD BY WIN OVER PHILLY

Pittsburgh Near Third Place — Boston Defeats Cardinals in Tenth.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 18.—(AP)—The Giants' loopy local cousins, the roughhouse Cincinnati Reds, failed to oblige as expected today, and sliced a full game off the New Yorkers' National league lead by taking a 4 to 3 decision.

They added insult to injury by whipping King Carl Hubbell in turning the trick, at least temporarily frustrating his ambition to become the first pitcher in the big league to win 20 games this season.

The defeat was double important to the Giants, since the second place Cubs knocked off the Phillies and shaved the league lead of Bill Terry's terriers to 2 1/2 games.

Peaches Davis, limiting the Giants to seven hits, and personally driving in what proved to be the winning run in the eighth, was the No. 1 hero of the encounter.

Today's clash ended the season series between the two outfits, leaving the Giants with 14 victories to eight for the Reds in their competition.

CHICAGO, Sept. 18.—(AP)—By way of a 12-hit attack that featured homers by Rip Collins and Joe Marty, plus six-hit pitching by Tex Carleton, the second place Cubs moved up to within two and one-half games of the league-leading New York Giants today by defeating the Philadelphia Phillies again, 9 to 3.

Carleton turned in his 14th victory. He embellished it by retiring the final 15 men in order, except for a wind-blown hit.

Marty's homer, a 400-foot liner into the dead center bleachers, tied the score at 2-2 in the second. Collins' homer, into right center with Gabby Hartnett aboard, put the Cubs ahead 4-2 in the third.

The game, witnessed by only 6,633, ended the season's business between the teams, with the Cubs winning 14 of the 22 games.

DOUBLE WIN OVER WHITE SOX PUTS YANKS NEAR FLAG

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Looking like the vaunted murderers row for the first time in weeks, the Yankees fired both barrels at the Chicago White Sox today and swept a doubleheader with a total of six home runs before a crowd of 24,010.

Joe Dimaggio hit his 43rd in the nightcap; Lou Gehrig hit one in each game, his 35th and 36th, and Bill Dickey, Frank Crosetti and Myril Hoag walloped one apiece in the opener as the Yanks took the first game, 12 to 8, from their one-time jinx, Lefty Thornton Lee, and followed up with a 4 to 0 decision in the nightcap behind Ivy Paul Andrews' six-hit pitching.

The double win, coupled with Boston's defeat by Cleveland, eliminated the Red Sox from their last mathematical hope as pennant contenders and left the White Sox hanging on the ropes, with a tie the best they could hope for.

DEER SEASON TO OPEN ON MORROW; PROSPECTS FAIR

Tomorrow is the day. At the first crack of dawn tomorrow morning, hundreds of Jackson county deer hunters will level well-odded shooting equipment at the elusive buck. Many local nimrods are planning on opening the season here in southern Oregon while score of others have made arrangements to be in Lake county and other eastern Oregon districts for the first day. The season lasts until October 25, giving hunters a month and five days of their favorite pastime.

Bag limit is two Columbian black-tail or one mule deer having at least two forked horns, with the requirement that both deer tags must be affixed to the mule deer.

Pre-season reports on the abundance of game indicates that hunting will be just fair. Here in the county, where blacktail abound in the higher districts, most of the action will be near Parker mountain in the Dead Indian district, in the Upper Applegate and Evans creek districts, on Red mountain off the new Beaver Creek road, and in the mountain country north and northeast of Medford. Also at Elk creek and near Fish lake, The Mt. Pitt territory is reported abounding with blacktail, although the land is brushy. The higher slopes of the Umpqua divide and Cascade mountains will also see many hunters tracking through the timber.

"Shoot when you see the horns and watch your fires," were last minute warnings. Four persons were killed and four wounded last year as hunters mistook each other for deer, and it was warned to be certain that the animals were your target before you pulled the trigger. High fire danger continues throughout all parts of the state, the forest service reports, and warned hunters to take extreme care in putting out all fires.

It was reported that deer were generally in good condition despite the hard winter. Summer forage was excellent and deer, even in congested areas, were said to be fat.

GEHRINGER WINS BATTING HONORS

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—(AP)—The major league batting races appeared today to be all but over.

From the looks of things in either league during the past week, it seems all that's necessary to make it official is to crown Charley Gehring, the strong sliver man of the Tigers, in the American league, and Ducky Medwick, mauler of the Cardinals, in the National.

Although both lost ground during the seven-day span, Gehring, with a .384 average, held a 31 point bulge on his nearest American league rival, Lou Gehrig, today, while Medwick, with .376, sported a 21 point edge over the deadlocked second-place pair, Paul Waner of the Pirates and Gabby Hartnett of the Cubs, in the National.

WORLD SERIES TO OPEN OCTOBER 6 ON YANKEE FIELD

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Assuming an American League pennant for the New York Yankees, the 1937 world series will open in the Yankee stadium Wednesday, Oct. 6. Dates for the annual fall classic were set today at conference presided over by Commissioner K. M. Landis and attended by representatives of the Yankees, New York Giants, Chicago Cubs, and Detroit Tigers.

After playing the first two games on American League grounds Oct. 6 and 7, the series will shift either to the polo grounds, New York, or Wrigley Field, Chicago, for three games on Oct. 8, 9, 10. The last two games, if necessary, will be played Oct. 11-12 in the stadium.

There will be no day off for travel even if the Cubs win the National League pennant. It was figured the train jump from New York could be made within 16 1/2 hours.

All games will begin at 1:30 p.m. E.S.T., except for a Sunday game in New York Oct. 10 the starting time would be 2 p.m.

SNEAD AHEAD OF SMITH BY POINT

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 18.—(AP)—A "picture shot" on the 15th "hill hole" at Canterbury gave "Hammin" Sned the mountaineer from White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., a one-stroke edge over the field at the halfway mark in the 37th annual western open golf championship today as he tacked a 74, two over par, to his 68 of yesterday for a 142 total.

On Sned's heels as the field of 68, composed of the 64 low scorers and ties, started the 3-hole stretch, was Horton Smith of Chicago, who turned in 471 for a 143 total. Smith's effort was the only one which bettered or matched par today as a heavy wind whipped across the course to send the scores soaring. Scores of 161 got into the finals.

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
