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## FOREST RECEIPTS SHOW LARGE GAIN; COUNTY BENEFITS

Rogue River national forest receipts for the 1937 fiscal year ending last June 30, totaled \$33,412.47, data compiled yesterday showed. This compares with \$7,439.90 for the 1936 fiscal year and was the highest figure since 1931 when receipts totaled \$45,330.50.

\$33,412.47, a sum of \$105,000 collected for timber cut was deposited in a special account to be used as part payment for the area along the Crater Lake highway which is to be procured from the Rogue River Timber company through an exchange agreement. The exchange was arranged to meet public demand to save the area adjacent to the highway for its scenic and recreational value. Forest executives pointed out. Cutting of the timber along the highway was threatened.

The 1937 receipts were divided as follows: timber sales, \$26,151.50; Christmas tree sales, \$404.52; cattle grazing, \$3,636.73; sheep grazing \$796.62; special uses (summer houses, resorts, etc.) \$2,423.70.

Receipts in previous years were: 1936, \$7,439.90; 1935, \$7,188.70; 1934, \$8,818.53; 1933, \$7,340.53; 1932, \$6,954.75; and 1931, \$45,330.50.

Executives explained that 25 percent of the gross receipts of the national forest is distributed to the counties in which the forest is situated in the proportion which the forest acreage within the county bears to the total acreage of the forest.

For the Rogue River national forest, the distribution is almost wholly to Jackson and Klamath counties, foresters said. An additional ten percent of the gross income is available for construction of necessary public roads and trails in the forest. The remainder goes to the national treasury.

## Butter Prices Up In Frisco Market

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Butter producers were getting 38½ cents a pound Friday in wholesale markets for top grade butter. This price was up 1 cent in the last two days, having been marked up in two moves of ½ cent each.

The price has been moving up recently and is now higher than at any time since late March, when it broke swiftly from 40 cents.

## PORTLAND LABOR DISPUTE HEARING OPENS TOMORROW

PORTLAND, Sept. 18.—(P)—Charles W. Hope, regional director of the national labor relations board, said today notice of a labor board hearing into the local AFL-CIO sawmill controversy, to be held here Monday, had been served on all parties to the dispute.

Those served, he said, included seven Portland sawmills, the Lumber Workers' union, the Building Trades council, the Teamsters' union and the Carpenters and Joiners.

All parties having a legitimate interest in the controversy will be given a "full day in court," he added.

No charges against the mill owners or employers are involved, Hope explained, the problem being one of representation of employees.

Headquarters of the Marine Firemen, Oilers, Waterenders and Wipers union in San Francisco said last night notices had been posted clearing the crew of the steam schooner W. R. Chamberlain, Jr., tied up here with a cargo of G/O lumber bound for Los Angeles. The crew refused to work the ship in a walk-out in sympathy with the AFL boycott on the products of local mills.

The message also condemned picket lines near the vessel and stated the union headquarters was 100 percent behind the timber workers.

## Death Is Probed Of Snipe Hunter

NORTH BEND, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Coo county officers started an investigation today into the death of Oral "Buck" Engdahl, 19, fatally wounded Wednesday while hunting snipe.

Coroner Ennis Keizer scheduled an inquest.

Engdahl apparently was accidentally shot when a gun carried by his companion, Frank Kurda, discharged. Kurda carried his wounded friend a mile before he found help.

## Stock Shipments From Baker Heavy

BAKER, Sept. 18.—(AP)—A tremendous movement of livestock, especially sheep, to Idaho and the middle west from Baker is now underway. Practically all of the sheep are feeders.

High prices and good feed are the principal reasons for the increased shipments.

A Baker sheep commission man has shipped 100 cars, containing more than 25,000 sheep, in the last 10 days.

## PINBALL APPEAL SEEN THIS WEEK

SALEM, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Formal appeal in a recent Polk county case, in which Circuit Judge Alfie Walker held pinball games legal and the laws under which they are licensed valid, probably will be filed in the supreme court here not later than Thursday of next week, it was announced here today.

The appeal is being prepared by Bruce Spaulding, district attorney of Polk county.

A number of district attorneys throughout the state will defer action against pinball machine operators pending a decision of the supreme court, they announced.
