Inmate of Asylum Garners Votes In Jersey's Primary

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 22 (AP)—William H. West, an inmate of the Atlantic county insane asylum, ran for nomination as a candidate for the state legislature in yesterday's primary.

In Atlantic City alone he got 817 votes. He ran as an "independent Republican." He was confined several weeks ago after secret service men arrested him on a charge of sending President Roosevelt threatening letters. West contended he brought about Roosevelt's nomination at the Chicago convention in 1932 by projecting "thought waves" from Atlantic City to vacillating delegates.

MOVING PICTURES OF PEAR HARVEST MADE IN VALLEY

Pear Bureau Preparing Lengthy Feature Film to Show All Phases of Fruit From Tree to Table

First shots of a moving picture feature which is to present all phases of the pear industry were taken here this week by a Movietone cameraman for the Oregon-Washington-California pear bureau.

Francis G. Mullins, vice-president of the Izzard company, advertising and marketing organization of Seattle, Wn., and a Movietone representative, left here today after spending three days filming harvesting of the local pear crop. Shelby Tuttle, local fruitman, assisted in conducting the two through orchards and plants of the valley.

Each step in harvesting, from picking, transporting, washing, grading, packing and storing to the time the pears are loaded on freight cars for their journey to all parts of the world, were covered in the film.

All packing plants which are members of the bureau were photographed for individual scenes depicting the various processes used to prepare pears for market.

Further pictures will be taken this week-end in the Wenatchee district. To complete the picture of the pear from "tree to table," orchards in bloom will be filmed next spring. Also included in the picture will be shots of Pacific coast ports, showing loading of the pears onto ocean vessels. The care taken in handling of the fruit in all stages will be emphasized throughout the film.

Pictures of the Hood River and Yakima districts will be taken later. Scenic shots of mountains, lakes and rivers will also be covered by the cameraman.

The elaborate 45-minute sound feature will be released next fall after all phases of the growth and shipment of pears have been photographed at the peak of each activity.

Sabotage Causes Grounding Of Ship

PORTLAND, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Testimony that steam was turned off from the steering engine of the States line steamer California before the vessel ran aground near Astoria Saturday brought the launching of investigations by the marine inspection bureau and the United States justice department.

J. Marple, first assistant engineer, told the inspectors that he found the steam valve tightly closed after the accident, that he opened it and that the steering motor operated perfectly when the vessel was returned up-river for an inspection of damage.

Federation of Labor and the American Legion.

"We have so much in common as to make it comparatively easy to promote understanding and cooperation between these two great patriotic forces. Time and experience have shown that the fraternal bonds which were established in the beginning, when the American Legion was formed and which have remained unbroken, have been of mutual benefit and of great public service."

Warns of 'isms'

He also warned the convention against the destructive forces of communism and nazism which he said were at work in this country, and he stressed the necessity of preserving democratic forms of government in the United States.

"There is always grave danger that those not directly connected with strikes, lockouts and industrial conflicts may be drawn in and forced to take sides. We know that passion and ill-feeling is aroused in communities where serious differences exist. The American Legion, however, has pursued a wise policy in avoiding participation in these industrial controversies."

BLACK'S EX-PARTNER LEAVES TALK OF KKK TO JURIST'S RETURN

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—(AP)—William E. Fort, a former law partner of Associate Justice Hugo L. Black, said today he would leave it up to the jurist to say whether they were fellow members of the Ku Klux Klan.

Fort, now a special assistant to Attorney General Cummings, refused to discuss Klan affiliation with reporters.

"Mr. Black is on his way home," Fort said, "and I am sure that any statement he makes on his arrival will be the truth."

Fort and Black formed their law partnership in Birmingham, Ala., October 1, 1925, and terminated it two years later.

Cummings said today the justice department had not made any investigation of Black's qualifications prior to his appointment to the supreme court.

At a press conference Cummings answered reporters' queries with the following statement: "It has been frequently stated that the department of justice made no investigation of Mr. Justice Black prior to the time his name was sent to the senate. This is correct. Indeed, it is not the practice of the department of justice to make investigations of prospective appointees to the supreme court, or any other investigation relative to them."
