The Cull Pear Problem

IT is unfortunate more people don't visit our fruit packing houses, when they are in full operation, as is the case at the present time. It is really a most interesting and stimulating spectacle

AFTER all pear blossoms are pear blossoms the world over. But we doubt if anywhere else in the country, could one see a more inspiring picture of efficiency and concentrated activity, than is presented in the local packing houses, this week and next

Moreover the more outsiders that could be induced to pay a visit during the packing season, the better the sale of Christmas boxes, would be

THERE is only one fly in the ointment, as far as we are concerned. That is the sight of a more or less steady stream of cull pears, being dumped into trucks, to be thrown away—not to be used for anything, but merely left to rot and spread their fragrance on the "desert air"

These pears, of course, are just as valuable for local consumption, for stock feed, pear butter, pear cider, brandy, alcohol, or what have you,—as the pears sent to the New York market

In our judgment, nothing is more important, to the local pear industry than the development of such a by-product market,—the transfer of tons and tons of cull pears, from the WRONG side to the RIGHT side of the ledger
