

Tigers to Tangle With Alumni Saturday in Seasons Curtain Raiser

OPENING KICKOFF SLATED FOR 2 P. M. HIGH SCHOOL GRID

Four Veterans to Bolster Bowerman's Forward Wall — Former Medford Stars Make Up Alumni Squad

The curtain on a brand new football season will be lifted tomorrow afternoon as the turf high school stadium when Coach Bill Bowerman's 1937 edition of the Black Tornado faces a powerful alumni eleven, coached by Ray Henderson, and boasting some of the brightest stars who ever wore the Red and Black. Opening kickoff will be at 2:00 o'clock sharp.

Both teams, straining at the leash, ran through light signal drills last night under the lights. Both mentors proclaim their ball clubs entirely ready to blast off the lid.

Coach Bowerman will send a Tiger aggregation onto the field averaging about 170 pounds and studded with eight veterans. Coach Henderson of the former Tigers will counter with an eleven tipping the Fairbanks at around 180 pounds, with the forward wall greatly outweighing the prepsters, but the backfield dragging down the average poundage.

Fast Ball Carriers

On the shoulders of a veteran and lightning-fast quartet of ball carriers will Coach Bowerman's Tigers rely to average the 15-6 defeat handed the high school last year by the alumni. Bobby Ettinger, Jack Hill, Jack Bowman and big Eldon Grow, playing his first season at fullback, will open behind the line for the Tigers. All are lettermen and all are rugged, tough, shifty and 100-pound men. Although starting at the blocking quarterback post, Ettinger will also see action in the left halfback slot. Other shifts will see Hill taking over at fullback, Bowman shifting from left halfback to right half and Grow trying his hand as a guard post. Warren Bayless, Lee ("Shorty") Campbell, Rodney Stead and Willie Caples will also receive backfield workouts.

Ettinger, Bowman and Campbell, to date, have shown they can handle that football around, and will probably take care of the Tiger overboard. Hill and Bowman will do the punting.

Veterans in Line

Four veterans will bolster the Tiger forward wall. They are Hubert Santo and Dan Erhart, two grand tackles, Fred Stevens, a plenty good center, and Red Root, flame-haired and pocket-size flanker. Newcomers to the Tornado line will be Archibald and Eri, guards, and Don Monteth at the other end. Alternates who will undoubtedly see service are Eugene Miller, Bill Dickey and McCurdy, ends; Dale Howard and Alf Barrow, tackles; Grow, Scripset and Richardson, guards, and Prentice, center.

In the matter of experience, the alumni will hold a decided edge over their prep rivals. Every man was at one time a Medford high school luminary, and several have made names for themselves in college frosh and varsity ranks. Leading Leo Ghelardi, considered by many one of the greatest backs in local history, will take care of the quarterbacking for the grads. Dick Lewis, two years ago a Gonzaga frosh star, will be in the fullback hole. Racy Moores, former member of Prink Caillson's mighty Medford high team, and a University of Oregon letterman, will be at right half and Burt Luman, another ex-Tiger, will hold down the left halfback position. Other ball carriers who will see action are Jim Bayless, Bernal Stead, Leo Sakrals, Blondy Lewis and Jerry Trill.

Teams Out for Win

In the line, the alumni will offer Stan Kuzman and Johnny Smith at the ends. Bill Knipe and Don Stewart at the Tackles. Clyde Dickinson and Ron Baker at the guards and Lloyd Hammack, captain, at center. Other linemen will be Keith Estes, who may start at tackle, Ole Severson, end, Gene Orr, guard, Don Greer, center, and Clyde Pichtner, line or fullback.

Both teams will play for keeps, there is no doubt of that. The Tigers will be out to avenge that defeat suffered last year and the alumni will attempt to make it two straight. Probably the alumni, with Ghelardi on the throwing end, will try many passes. The Tigers boast several neat and precise passing maneuvers, some of which have thrilling laterals tacked on. Anyway, it will be a great battle, and a huge crowd is expected for the season's inaugural.

ST. MARY'S, ASHLAND TO VIE SATURDAY MORNING

Coach Wally Rickett sends his St. Mary's high Crusaders into their first football action of the year tomorrow morning on Van Scoeyd field against the Ashland Junior high eleven. Opening kickoff will be at 10:30 o'clock.

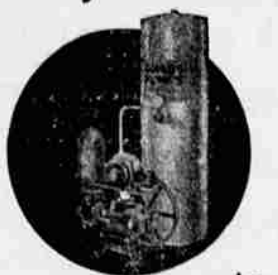

Phelan had planned to use Hill as his No. 2 full back behind Al Craver. But a leg injury sustained during spring practice, failed to respond, and a new operation ordered by Dr. Don Palmer, team physician, will mean Hill will be out until next spring. Don Jones, Sedro-Woolley, will be Craver's new understudy in tomorrow's game with Iowa.

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IMPORTANT TILTS DUE SATURDAY IN COAST SCRAMBLE

Webfoot-Bruins Only Conference Game — Golden Bears Take On Gaels — Oregon State Meets Idaho

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 24.—(AP)—One Pacific Coast conference game and several other important contests will send western collegiate football teams into a three-month pigskin scramble this week-end.

The only conference clash will send the Bruins of University of California at Los Angeles against Oregon's Webfoot under the floodlights at Los Angeles coliseum tonight, and tomorrow other conference teams will play independents in games in which reputations will be at stake.

U.C.L.A. was favored over Oregon mainly because the Webfoots are inexperienced in many positions.

Two big games tomorrow will share the spotlight in the San Francisco bay region. At Berkeley, University of California's Golden Bears, picked by western sports writers as the team to win the conference championship, will oppose the St. Mary's Gaels. St. Mary's won the annual battle last year, 10 to 0. This time the Bears were given a slight edge.

Stanford also has a tough opener. At Palo Alto, against the Santa Clara Broncos who last year lost only one game, to Texas Christian, finishing with one of the best records of any team in the nation. Stanford held an edge in the betting.

Huskies Face Iowa. Washington's Huskies, 1936 champions, were rated heavy favorites over Iowa at Seattle. Washington State will take on Gonzaga at Spokane, attempting to break a three-year jinx.

At Los Angeles tomorrow Veteran Coach Alonzo Stagg's College of the Pacific Tigers will oppose the Trojans of University of Southern California, who will take the field top heavy favorites.

Oregon State will face Idaho at Moscow and Montana will battle Whitman at Missoula.

Ross' Victory Over Garcia Saves Fans From Surfeit In Championship Carnival

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Three championship prizefights in one night, while a laudable enterprise on the part of any promoter, seems at this writing to be at least one championship prizefight too many. Especially if each of them goes the limit of 15 rounds without a knock-down and the feature event curls up and plays dead.

Thirty-two thousand, six hundred patrons sat through last night's pugilistic extravaganza at the Polo grounds, and when they finally stumbled out of the place some time this morning they were wondering if the new flat cap, Mike Jacobs, hadn't perhaps been guilty of choking them with cream.

Ross Wins Nod
 Barney Ross, a welterweight champion with a heart the size of a pumpkin, saved an otherwise uninspiring spectacle with a close and gory victory over Cefterino Garcia, challenger from the Philippines. It would have been a great fight had it stood alone.

Harry Jeffers, a clean-cut, smiling lad from Baltimore, whose chief ambition up to recently had been to become a golf professional, added a final fillip when it was badly needed by winning the bantamweight championship of the world from sedated little Sixto Escobar of Puerto Rico, on points.

The bout between Lou Ambers, rugged lightweight champion, and Pedro Montanez, a rashly over-exploited young man who owns a bar in Harlem, was the one that curled up in Ambers gave him an awful going-over in close, and it was a dreary thing to watch. Montanez, who had douted the champion down in a previous over-weight affair, looked muscle-bound and weary at 135 pounds.

Thill Loses
 Marcel Thill, the bald Frenchman, made a considerable hit in the night's initial turn before he suffered a serious cut on his right eyelid and was declared the loser to Fred Apostoli of San Francisco early in the tenth round. The burly Marcel had a clear lead on points at the time Apostoli stabbed him and the blood began to spurt. He had put almost a permanent wear in his flashier opponent's mid-section.

Apostoli, so far as anybody knows for certain, doesn't hold any more championships now than he did before. Thill's European middleweight title wasn't at stake. You've got to be a European to win that one. He can, however, claim the world middleweight title if he wants to start an argument.

Jeffers undoubtedly is the happiest of the winners. He beamed like an army searchlight when he had finished trimming Escobar and the announcer had hailed "the new champion." He deserved the verdict by a wide margin, winning something like nine rounds to Escobar's two.

Jeffers a Dancer
 There is a lot of waste motion to the new champ. He dances around much more than seems necessary and swings an awkward-looking right, but it must have felt more awkward than that to Escobar. He has a fine straight left that he kept in Sixto's face until it finally began to hurt the ringers.

Ross and Garcia gave the crowd a grand fight, and it was close right to the finish. The champion, fighting brilliantly in spurts and rating himself nicely, piled up a sufficient lead.

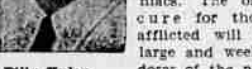
Billy Hulen Says:

FEW DEER SLAIN IN OPENING DAYS FORESTERS FIND

Reports from outlying districts in the Rogue River national forest indicate that but comparatively few deer have been taken during the first week of the open season. A number of local hunters have been successful but most of the deer killed to date have been small. Bucks appear most plentiful in the Butte Falls district, along the Rogue-Umpqua divide and in the vicinity of Brush mountain in the Dear Indian district.

Hunting conditions were made almost ideal by the rain of last week-end and the forest floor is yet quite damp west of the summit of the Cascades.

For those wishing to go into the higher country, which is inaccessible by roads, pack horses may be obtained at the following places: Trail, Prospect, Union Creek, Rocky Point, and Fort Klamath. Guides are also obtainable at these places.

To date, not a single hunter's fire has been reported in the forest. This is very commendable and is proof that hunters are fire conscious with weather reports indicating higher temperatures and lower humidity for the next few days, continued care with fire is necessary. About 80 percent of the forest fire guards are yet on duty and the fire danger will not be over until heavier storms occur.
