Relic Exposition
ROME, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Italy's modern Caesar, Premier Benito Mussolini, today inaugurated a vast exposition of imperial Rome on the 2000th anniversary of the year of the birth of Emperor Augustus. With a group of diplomats and high officers of state, he strode through the large exhibition rooms where are gathered 10,000 different objects reconstructed from the old Roman era. "We must go back to Augustus to find a spectacle that compares to what Italy offers today," he said recently.
