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ed out. During the president's talk he had stood at the rear of the train in the crowd, as did Senator Schwartz and Congressman Greener. "I had thought it was part of the duty of the president to keep in personal touch with the nation," the president said. "And so this year, since January, I have already made one trip through some southern states and now I'm going out to the coast for the third time since I have been president, not counting campaign trips; going out to get a look-see, to try to tie together in my mind the problems of the nation."

Many Problems Remain

He said the greater part of the emergency was over, but a lot of problems remained.

He said the government had spent a great deal of money putting people to work and at the same time the administration had tried its utmost to accomplish useful things. There were very few communities that have not benefited, he said.

On the question of airports, he said the federal government had assisted in the actual building of many thousands of these, with the result today the United States is checker-boarded with airports in every state. Thousands of schools have been built or renovated, too, with a combination of state, local and federal funds.

"We have to come to an end of that program sometime and just the other day we allocated the last of the money for public works projects."

On this trip, he said, he was looking at many types of projects. He said he was always keen when he came west to get more people from coast to coast and see things with their own eyes. The crowd applauded this remark.

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officially into the arms of the C. I. O. The secretary of agriculture had hoped to win the affection of the small farmer as well as the big planter by his cotton plans. He put into the soil conservation program provisions increasing the tenants' share of allotments.

But there has been a rift in the lute that may serve to turn the tenant farmers, or at least some of them, away from the administration. News has reached the headquarters of the farmers' union in Washington that the mayor of Memphis has announced that any C. I. O. organizer who comes to the town to organize will be thrown out. Unless the situation is ameliorated, it will, in all probability, be seized upon, either by John Lewis, head of the C. I. O., or other labor officials, for an attack on the administration which permits what they consider a breach of the workers' "civil liberties."

Hitherto, Wall street, which loves its "peaks and valleys" (the extremes of market fluctuations) as a yodeler loves his, has looked with suspicion on the Washington experts, especially members of the securities and exchange commission. The operators were afraid the economists wanted to "iron out" as they call it, all the peaks, fill up the valleys, and reduce market fluctuations to the dead and dreary level of a plateau. Or, in their language, enforce a "thinness of the market," reduce liquidity, and cause less trading.

But when William O. Douglas, new chairman of the SEC, flew down to Washington this week to make his speech of acceptance, he dropped one sentence of cheer. He said he didn't want to try to iron out all peaks. He knew that, in the natural course of events, what goes up must come down. All he wanted the men who make his market charts do was to chart the trends and locate the roots, find out whether the forces behind the movements were natural or artificial.

"We will interfere only when such forces are artificial," he said. "So we can still play among our peaks and valleys as long as we have enough cash to put up for margins."

ment with Great Britain and France, according to information available in diplomatic circles here.

Plans Left Out

However, their plans do not include the participation of Soviet Russia. The arrangement might be based on another Locarno accord, both Hitler and Mussolini reportedly being willing to enter into such a program. It was said that the new lineup of Locarno accord members would have to be the same as that of the old Locarno pact. The only changes to which they would agree being the omission of Belgium, which country has declared its neutral status, and the omission of the Rhineland clause, which is out of date now.

(The Locarno pact banded together Britain, France, Italy, Germany and Belgium to guarantee peace between Germany and France, under terms of the Versailles treaty. It became obsolete when Hitler remilitarized the Rhineland, the unarmed buffer state between the two old enemies.)

Difficulty Seen

This version was taken to mean Mussolini and Hitler intend to reject the idea of a northern Locarno embracing Britain, France, and Germany, and a southern Locarno embracing France, Germany and Italy. Political observers believed, however, that any real peace understanding with Britain and France will be difficult to arrive at so long as the Spanish civil war, danger point of the whole European situation, continues.

Foreign officials flatly rejected today any suggestion that Premier Mussolini had acted behind Reichsmarschall Hitler's back to strengthen his position with France and Britain before the fascist leaders meet here tomorrow.

But, informed quarters indicated, the talks between Italy's representative to Geneva, Bova Scoppa, and French foreign minister Yvon Delboe, would be one of the first subjects for discussion when the two heads of state get down to business after tomorrow's pageantry.

"Anything tending to improve Italo-Franco-British relations can only be welcomed by Germany," said one informant.
