

LIVESTOCK SHOW WILL BE STAGED BY 4-H CLUBBERS

Largest Display Of Stock
And Farm Produce Ever
Assembled To Be Exhib-
ited September 29-30.

Next Wednesday and Thursday, September 29 and 30, Jackson county residents will have the opportunity of seeing at the county fair grounds in Medford the largest exhibition of 4-H club livestock and crops ever assembled in the county according to the number of entries now coming into the club agent's office.

The largest number of entries and probably some of the strongest competition will be in the dairy classes which are filling up rapidly. The Bellevue community will furnish more animals for these classes than any other part of the county.

New Class Added
A new class added this year, and in which there will be some high quality exhibits, is the class for dual purpose cattle, shown mostly by boys from near Eagle Point and Little Butte creek.

Most of the sheep will be brought to the fair when Edwin Taylor, local leader in the Applegate country, brings a truck load of 4-H stock from that vicinity.

Competition will be keen in the beef classes and interest is already running high on the baby beef auction which will be held at 2 p. m. the second day of the fair. The beef club members have been making use of all the best methods of growing and fattening their calves that were available, and the buyers are assured tender, juicy roasts and steaks because the steers have been gaining between three and four pounds a day for the past several months.

Demonstrations Stated
Several demonstrations, grooming and fitting contests, and showmanship contests will be held Thursday morning. These contests are always interesting and show the club members putting their animals in shape for the showing.

The exhibits will be kept in the cattle barns on the northeast section of the fair grounds. The main entrance by the CCC headquarters will be used and sufficient parking space will be available near the cattle barns.

The grounds will be kept open until dark the first evening, making it possible for all the business people and others who are busy through the day to view the exhibits.

15 PROPRIETORS STORES HELD ON PINBALL CHARGES

Sheriff Seizes Devices In
Attempted Re-Opening—
New Drive Opened In
County.

Warrants charging proprietors of fourteen Medford establishments with "promoting and setting up a lottery," (pinball machines) were served yesterday by the sheriff's office. A score of pinball devices were seized, and stored in the courthouse, in a renewal drive against the contraptions in Jackson County.

Official action followed close upon the heels of the opening of a number of pinball machines Friday despite notice, the August 25 ban was still in effect.

Mrs. Margaret Wilson, first of the defendants to be arraigned in justice court, was granted until Monday to plead, and was released on her own recognizance.

Distributors of the devices, as soon as ownership is definitely established will face warrants, Sheriff Syd I. Brown said.

Complaints are pending against Ashland and Rogue River establishment owners, reported to have unadmitted pinball machines.

A number of Medford concerns refused to unlock their machines. A check-up showed no pinballs in operation in Central Point, Gold Hill, or Jacksonville.

Sheriff Syd I. Brown said there were 287 pinball machines in the county, and, if and when unlocked the proprietors faced arrest, and confiscation of the machine.

The more or less general pinball opening followed the circuit jury disagreement, in the trial of Earl A. Sims, local distributor, charged with setting up and operating a lottery. The jury stood seven to five for acquittal, most of the time throughout eight hours deliberations.

SYMPATHY FOR CHINA MAY EMBROIL U. S. IS PEACE WORKERS FEAR

David E. Norcross of Seattle, field secretary for the National Council for Prevention of War, was in Medford Friday on a speaking tour of coast cities. He is scheduled to speak at the Neighborhood Congregational church in Ashland this (Sunday) morning at 11 o'clock.

Although his schedule prevented appearance before local groups, Mr. Norcross gave a brief interview here in which he warned against propaganda.

Pointing out the sympathy existing in this country for China, in the current defense against Japanese invasion, the peace advocate declared "they'll be asking us again to go and fight for democracy."

"It is impossible to fight for democracy abroad," he said. The United States tried that in the World war, and after the war the world turned fascist."

Norcross urged the invocation by President Roosevelt of the neutrality law, which would automatically prohibit shipment of arms to either Japan or China. He said Japan had avoided the declaration of war in order to evade the embargo, but added that the president could invoke the law by declaring a state of war existed.

Finns Protest
HELSINGFORS, Finland, Sept. 25.—(AP)—The Finnish government today ordered its Moscow delegation to lodge an energetic protest with the Soviet government against the flying of Russian planes over the Finnish frontier.

NEED PERMIT TO BURN SLASHINGS

Permits for the burning of brush in land clearing operations as well as for the reduction of slash hazards within the forest areas of the state will still be required after October 1, according to a statement issued today by State Forester J. W. Ferguson. The old law which officially ended the closed season for burning on October 31 of each year was amended at the last session of the legislature, according to the forester, and now is extended until December 31 unless ended prior to that time through a proclamation by the governor.

"While there has been considerable rain throughout the state and the hazard is materially reduced," stated Mr. Ferguson, "indications at the present are that it is of a temporary nature and a few days of low humidity would put the organizations back to face with a serious fire problem. The regular personnel will be kept in the field and those who desire burning permits will have no difficulty in getting in touch with wardens."

Epidemic Ban Eased
CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—(AP)—The board of health lifted today the ban on classes for elementary school children, excepting kindergarten and first grade pupils, provided "no unusual rise in the number of infantile paralytic cases" occurs during the next 24 hours.

MEDFORD SCHOOL ENROLLMENT 2587 HEDRICK REPORTS

Enrollment in all Medford's schools was 175 more than at the same period last year, E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent, announced yesterday. The total all schools is 2,587.

At the close of last week, the senior high school had 727 students attending and the junior high school had 625. Elementary schools were listed as follows: Washington, 365; Roosevelt, 363; Jackson, 289; and Lincoln, 218. Total elementary enrollment was 1,235.

Because of the crowded facilities at Roosevelt, bus students from El Rey near the fair grounds were being transferred to Lincoln, Hedrick stated, and added that more transfers might be necessary due to the crowded conditions at Roosevelt.

Later work has stopped many junior and senior high pupils from registering to date, Hedrick said. He estimated that within two weeks 75 more students would be attending those two institutions.
