

# Black Tornado Defeats Alumni 18 to 6 in Grid Season Opener

## LAST DRIVE GIVES BOWERMAN SQUAD INITIAL VICTORY

### Tigers Flash Offense And Strong Defense — Ends And Tackles Stand Out.

Medford high school's Black Tornado, showing flashes of a great offense and displaying a rock-like defense after the first quarter, whipped the alumni eleven yesterday afternoon at the stadium, 18-6, in the season's curtain-raiser.

It took Coach Hill Bowerman's ball club the entire first half to find its bearings. After falling to score in the first and second quarters, the Tigers opened up with a passing and running attack that swept the grids off their collective feet to the tune of two touchdowns in the third period and one in the finale. The Tigers were forced to come from behind to win, the alumni showing over a six-pointer in the opening stanza.

Margin of high school superiority over the out-of-condition alumni outfit is truthfully shown in the first-down tabulation. The prepsters gathered in 11, eight from running plays, two from passes and one from a penalty, while the alumni was being held to four, three on the ground and one through the air. The former Medford stars, boasting a potentially powerful lineup, couldn't stand the pace. They were shorted on reserve material and were forced to stay in there and take it the entire game, and it just couldn't be done. Most of the boys hadn't seen a football for over a year.

However, the grads did manage to generate enough scoring power to reach pay dirt in the first period, moving 85 yards with the aid of an 18-yard gallop off left tackle by Dick Lewis, a pass that was ruled complete on the high school 24-yard stripe for interference, and a 14-yard blast over center by big Clyde Fichtner that placed the ball on the 10-yard line. Leo Oehlard and Fichtner then took turns in advancing the ball to the six-inch line where the husky city oop hammered through for the score. An attempted place kick for the conversion was wide.

The high school threatened to score twice before the half was over, but failed on both occasions. Red Root, who played a whale of a game at end, dropped a pass from Ettinger that had touchdown written all over it and just before the half ended, another forward toss from Bobby Ettinger was intercepted on the goal line.

However, the battling Tigers roared into high gear in the third period to grab off their first win of the year. Dan Earheart, tackle, recovered an alumni fumble on their 22 soon after the third quarter started and the Tigers moved in. Jack Bowerman and Eldon Crow, on smashes at the line, made it a first down on the alumni 18. Jack Hill swept around right end with neat interference to the 7. A penalty for offside moved the ball to the two-yard stripe and Grow shot off the weak side of the line for a touchdown, tying the score. Chris Barker's attempted dropkick for the extra point was wide.

A few seconds later the Tornado had its second touchdown, and it was Red Root, making up for his previous misplay on a forward pass, that did part of the work. After Dick Lewis of the alumni had punted out to his own 25-yard line, Shorty Campbell, who had gone in for Bobby Ettinger, whipped a 20-yard pass into the extreme right-hand corner of the end zone and Root hauled it down for the score. A running play failed to add the extra point and it was 12-6 for the Tigers.

Campbell started the Bowermanites on the way to their third score shortly before the game ended. Taking a punt on his own 39, he raced back 17 yards to the alumni 44. Bobby Ettinger, back in the game, lined a bullet pass to Don Monteith and the latter was finally downed on the 11-yard line. Jack Hill picked up nine yards on a reverse over right tackle, and then proceeded to hammer over left guard for the touchdown. Chris Barker again failed to convert with a dropkick, and the score was 18-6, where it remained as the losers vainly tried to connect through the air in the closing seconds.

Dick Lewis and Malcolm Shine were outstanding in the alumni backfield, both testing off several nice punks of territory. Leading Leo Gielardt was completely bottled up, but Clyde Fichtner ripped through the high school line several times for substantial yardage. In the alumni line, Lloyd Hammack turned in a great defensive game.

**SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 25.—(AP)—**Washington State's "revenge boys" stopped Gonzaga's three-year football winning streak here today but lacked the punch to break a 0-0 deadlock.

Each team threatened seriously to score only once in the colorless contest.

Henry Haug, 148-pound halfback from Seattle, actually went across the goal for Gonzaga in the second period, but an offside penalty nullified the play and the Bulldogs lost the ball on downs. Gonzaga gained its scoring position on the best run of the day, a spectacular 30-yard off-tackle dash to the 5-yard line by "Automatic" George Karamatic, 1936 all-Coast fullback.

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## STATERS BEATEN BY IDAHO 7 TO 6, IN FIRST UPSET

**MOSCOW, Idaho, Sept. 25.—(AP)—**The University of Idaho provided the first upset of the season in the north-west here this afternoon and defeated the favored Oregon Staters, 7 to 6, in a last minute rally.

Trailing as they went into the final three minutes of play, the Vandals "got the break" when an exchange of punts gained them 20 yards to put them on the Oregon 34-yard line.

A completed pass and a line buck sent the fighting Idahoans on to the Oregon 12, and another pass. Boise to Howard, tied the score. Boise's place kick, with but a minute and a half to go, was good.

Oregon State's score came in the second period. Gray, Oregon's star half back, passed twice to his running mate, Eilers, to put the ball on Idaho's five-yard line and then went over for the touchdown. He missed a place kick try for point after the touchdown.

Idaho completed six passes out of 17 attempted and the Staters completed three out of 15. Idaho made 289 yards from scrimmage and Oregon State 370.

## WASHINGTON WINS OVER IOWA 14 TO 0 TO OPEN SEASON

**SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 25.—(AP)—**The University of Washington defeated the University of Iowa here today before a crowd of 25,000.

Twice Iowa moved into scoring territory but their resultant efforts spurted and fizzled.

Midway in the first period Iowa gained the ball on the Washington 44 after a Husky punt and Bush Lamp moved the pigskin to the 40 with a plunge.

A following pass from Kinnick to Eicherly ate up 31 yards to push Washington back to its eight.

The Huskies made a great stand at this point, however, allowing Edwin McLean, Eicherly and Kinnick only one more yard in three smashes and fourth-down pass by the latter was batted down by Johnston and Chuck Newton of Washington.

Two more aerial shots failed, the last over the goal line, and Washington took the pigskin on its 20 and kept the Iowans at bay from there on.

## BOB SMITH GETS OREGON SCORE AS UCLANS WIN 26-13

**LOS ANGELES, Sept. 25.—(P)—**The University of California at Los Angeles unveiled a surprisingly strong 1937 grid machine before 35,000 fans in Memorial Coliseum last night, scoring an impressive 26 to 13 victory over the University of Oregon Web-foot.

A powerful backfield, led by Kenny Washington, 200-pound colored half-back, and fullback Walt Schell, and a supposedly weak line that held surprisingly well, supplied the edge needed for the Bruins' initial win.

Washington opened up in the first quarter with a 57-yard run off right tackle for a touchdown, and led a running attack in the third that brought the ball to the Oregon 13-yard line, passing to Bob Nash for another counter. He had gained 40 yards before the scoring pitch.

Jay Graybeal and Paul Rowe sparked a Webfoot attack which brought a tally in the second period after a 60-yard march. Bob Smith crashed through for the score after Graybeal put the ball in position with a 21-yard half spinner.

Another Oregon drive started in the final period with a 25-yard pass from Graybeal to Nilsen. Another pass from the same pair gained 14 yards more, and Smith passed from the seven-yard line to Graybeal over the goal line.

St. Mary's saved itself from a complete rout by scoring in the third quarter, the touchdown coming from a 63-yard thrust gained entirely from ground plays.
