

HAMMOND JR. AND PERL GRAB LOWS IN ELKS TOURNNEY

Competing against 85 Elk golfers from all parts of the state, Bob Hammond and Frank Perl, both of Medford, yesterday walked off with the low gross and low net scores, respectively, in the 18-hole medal play tournament staged at the Rogue Valley Golf club as one feature of the annual convention of the Oregon State Elks association.

Hammond toured the course in a par 70 to win the bronze medal and become the state Elks champion. Hubert Bentley of Ashland finished second with a 71 and Leland Clark Jr., of Medford took third place with a 72.

Frank Perl, with a gross 87 and a 22 handicap for a 65 net, won the beautiful silver platter donated by Larry Schade for the low net scorer. George Roberts of Medford was second with a net 68, and Howard Scheffel and J. V. Watson, both of Medford, tied for third with 69a.

Lee Watson of Medford blasted out a drive of 258 yards to win the long-driving contest, and J. V. Watson holed an 8-foot putt to win the long-putting award.

VICTORY CLAIMED ON ARAGON FRONT

MADRID, Sept. 25.—(AP)—The Spanish government tonight announced an important victory on the north Aragon front near the French border, while behind the front official word of crushing a great plot to overthrow the Madrid-Valencia regime.

Two hundred persons were arrested. The government accused them of using the Chilean embassy for headquarters.

Other hundreds of insurgent sympathizers who have hidden under diplomatic protection in Madrid legation buildings since outbreak of the civil war were believed to be in jeopardy.

Government dispatches from Aragon said insurgent concentrations near Huesca had been annihilated on that middle border front.

"Hundreds of truckloads" of enemy soldiers were trapped by aerial bombers, declared the communique.

SEPTEMBER CORN 'SQUEEZE' PROBED

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Disciplinary action against some of the participants in the September corn "squeeze" on the Chicago board of trade loomed today. Emergency action by exchange directors abruptly suspended trading in that delivery.

Reliable sources said if guilt is proved, either suspension or expulsion from the giant exchange would be the penalty.

The board of directors, only a few hours before trading opened, stopped trade in September corn.

The drastic order also provided all open contracts (there were 8,001,000 bushels in them) be settled on a basis of \$1.10 1/4 a bushel. "Shorts" have the option of paying that price for their unfilled contracts or delivering corn. They have until Monday afternoon to choose.

RESCUE HERO IS ACCIDENT VICTIM

INDEX, Wash., Sept. 25.—(AP)—George Abernathy of Index, hero of the all-night descent of Mt. Index with the unconscious form of Joe Halwax, northwest mountain climber, who fell during an ascent of a peak, suffered a fractured skull and a blood clot on the brain in a logging accident today.

Abernathy was felling timber for the Miller Logging company of Index when a tree struck a snag and snapped the top out of the snag, causing a piece about four feet long to swing back and strike him.

Force of the blow knocked Abernathy about 10 feet and rendered him unconscious.

Halwax is still in a Seattle hospital recovering from his mountain trek.

FILENE, MERCHANT PRINCE, IS DEAD

PARIS, Sept. 26.—(Sunday)—(AP)—Edward A. Filene, Boston merchant, died at the American hospital here today.

The 77-year-old merchant suffered a pneumonia attack last Saturday while on his way to London after a tour of Europe. Brought to the hospital here, his condition gradually became worse because of complications.

His attending physician said a "respiratory failure induced by pneumonia" caused death.

Lillian Schoedler, Filene's secretary, a physician and two nurses were at his bedside.

HISTORY MADE AS IL DUCE, HITLER VISIT AT MUNICH

MUNICH, Germany, Sept. 25.—(AP)—The brown-shirted and black-shirted rulers of Germany and Italy had their first meeting in three years here today, and after demonstrating they were brethren under their shirts, moved on to Mecklenburg tonight for army maneuvers.

Premier Mussolini seemed well-pleased with the tremendous welcome accorded him by Reichsfuehrer Hitler in this gaily-decorated, cheering city.

Most of the shouting was for Chancellor Hitler until Max Schmeling, the heavyweight fighter brought here as part of the stage dressing for a display of 400 of Germany's most beautiful stage and movie stars, stole some of the show.

Mussolini and Hitler had little time for political talking but their followers disclosed they managed to at least break ground in a general way.

Their time, from the moment Il Duce's train rolled into the station here this morning until they departed for Mecklenburg by separate trains some nine hours later, was completely taken up with visits and exchanges of visits, a luncheon, military reviews, formalities and the ten.

QUICK TRIAL FOR BROTHER KILLERS

SHELBYVILLE, Ky., Sept. 25.—(AP)—A quick trial for the three Garr brothers, charged with murdering Brig. Gen. Henry H. Denhardt, if the grand jury indicates them, was indicated here today by opposing counsel.

The grand jury meets October 4.

J. Ballard Clark, defense counsel, said he would insist on trial in October if the trio were indicted.

State Atty. Gen. Hubert A. Merdick, aiding in the prosecution, said he wanted trial then also.

The brothers, Roy, Jack and Dr. E. S. Garr, were held to the grand jury in bail totaling \$50,000 after an examining trial here yesterday.

Roy Garr admitted he shot the 81-year-old former lieutenant governor, who was to have gone on trial the next day charged with the murder of his fiancée, Mrs. Verna Garr Taylor, trial ended in a hung jury. He was killed Monday night. The brothers claimed self defense.

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A.F.L. CHIEFTAINS MEET IN DENVER

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Labor leaders from all parts of the nation started gathering in Denver today for the American Federation of Labor convention which starts October 4.

The early arrival of some men has been taken as evidence that the convention will be an open battleground between the AFL and the Committee for Industrial Organization.

William Green, president of the AFL, is expected here next week.

The first battle of the convention is expected to start Monday, with a preliminary meeting of the metal trades division. John L. Frey, militant head of the department, said today what he termed communism in the CIO, minimum wage legislation before congress, and CIO tactics used in the metal trades would be discussed.

Frey said today the unions of the metal trades had faced the brunt of the CIO attack and therefore have been thrust to the front as the chief defenders of the AFL.

The metal trades division is the second largest in the federation.

FEDERAL GRAZING PROGRAM UPHELD

DENVER, Sept. 25.—(AP)—The federal farm security administration's policy of buying western land for re-settlement projects and then prohibiting its use for grazing was upheld by U. S. District Judge J. Foster Symes today.

The court granted injunctions asked by the government to enjoin four Weld county stockmen from grazing their stock on land which the government purchased in north central Weld county for a federal re-settlement project. He also assessed damages against the cattleman.

Russian Farm "Forge"
MOSCOW, Sept. 25.—(UP)—Seven persons were sentenced to death at Novosibirsk, in south central Siberia, after conviction on charges of wrecking the agricultural program, it was reported here today. Six others were reported sentenced to death in Crimea for spoiling grain.

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DIPLOMATIC MOVE TO END SPANISH CRISIS UNDERWAY

PARIS, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Officials confirmed today Britain and France have moved to bring Italy into a tripartite conference to settle dangerous international issues arising from the Spanish civil war.

A joint note by Britain and France was sent to Rome and the Italian government was notified it would be followed shortly by another proposing representatives meet at the French foreign office.

A French spokesman said this second note probably would be dispatched immediately after Premier Mussolini's return from Germany.

It was generally understood France and Great Britain would seek withdrawal of foreign volunteers from Spain.

Falling in this, they would ask guarantees against sending more "volunteer" troops into Spain.

Stopping transportation of foreign munitions to Spain also may be discussed.

France may throw open her frontier for such armaments shipments, observers believed, in case Italy is unwilling to cooperate.

Admiral Pini, adjutant to the chief of staff of the Italian navy and head of the Italian delegation, will come to Paris Monday for a conference to arrange for Italy's participation in the Mediterranean "anti-piracy" patrol.

WILMINGTON, Del., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Miss Beatrice Andrews, daughter of Mrs. M. M. Andrews of Denver, Colo., and Victor Arthur Miller, Denver attorney and brother of Mrs. Alfred Victor Dupont, were married today at the Dupont home, Westover Hills.

The Rev. Charles L. Candee, former pastor of Westminster Presbyterian church, Wilmington, performed the ceremony.

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TEACHER SHOT BY BOY, 12, NOT TO PREFER CHARGES

TOLEDO, O., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Miss June Mapes, 59, Arlington school principal, said today she would not prefer charges against Robert Snyder, 12-year-old pupil who shot her and then turned the gun on himself.

Police said this indicated the boy may escape punishment. After two days of investigation, they announced they would leave the case to the juvenile court.

"I believe a psychologist should examine the boy and plan a course of future development for him," Miss Mapes said.

Miss Mapes was shot through the abdomen when, Robert told police, he became angry because the principal refused to call a girl classmate from her classroom.

"I intended to force Miss Mapes to buy ice cream cones," Robert said.

Blith Mapes and the boy, who has a bullet wound through the head, are expected to recover.

OAKLAND HOMES IN PATH FLAMES

OAKLAND, Cal., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Fire which swept over four square miles of hilly terrain in a fashionable Oakland residential district was temporarily under control tonight after destroying several homes and menacing many others.

Fire-fighting equipment from Oakland and Berkeley was called into action when the fire, presumably started from spontaneous combustion, swept rapidly through tinder-dry brush and trees.

CHURCH TO FLAY INDUSTRY PROFIT

CINCINNATI, O., Sept. 25.—(AP)—A movement to have the Episcopal church disapprove of the profit motive in industry promised today to further split conservatives and liberals at the church's 52nd triennial general convention, opening here October 6.

The movement is fostered by members of the Church League for Industrial Democracy, which has drawn criticism by inviting Homer Martin, president of the United Automobile Workers' union, to speak.

The Rev. William Spofford of New York, secretary of the league, has prepared a resolution opposing the profit system.

League members were doubtful whether the resolution would recommend a substitute. Many of them favor the consumers' non-profit system.

Some backers of the resolution feel it will serve to bring attention to the league's campaign to bring the working man closer to the church.
