GORE CLAIM FOR O-C SERVICES IS HEARD BY COURT

Second Civil Action Seeking Payment by County Gets Under Way—Guy Cordon Takes Part in Defense

Civil action of William H. Gore against Jackson county for \$3446.66, assertedly due for services rendered in behalf of the passage in 1926 by congress of the California-Oregon land grant tax refund bill, was under way in circuit court today with participation of a jury. It was anticipated a special venire would have to be drawn to complete the jury.

Claims Agreement

In the present action Gore asserts that under an agreement with the 1926 Jackson county court he was to receive 1 per cent of all monies collected. The complaint further cites that under the statute of limitations the agreement does not apply to O. C. payments before April, 1932.
