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A Great Legionaire

WE know nothing about the new commander of the American Legion who hails from Massachusetts. We only hope he proves as good a one, as his predecessor, Harry Colmery of Kansas, and follows in that gentleman's foot steps.

Not so long ago grave dangers threatened this powerful veterans organization. Partisan politics reared its destructive head; extravagant bonus demands threatened serious dissension; and there was genuine danger, that certain hot heads would gain control, and the Legion would become a kind of semi-secret, strong arm organization.

Fortunately wiser counsels prevailed, and no commander did more to put the Legion on an even keel, and make it a force for constructive disinterested service to the country, than the leader who has just retired.

It was Colmery who put the quietus upon those who favored a militant campaign against strikers and so-called "reds", under the aegis of 100% Americanism. Day in and day out he preached the danger and futility of strong arm methods, and the importance of restraint, tolerance and reason.

Repeatedly he became the defender of America's civil liberties, and no one in the country has done more to clear the atmosphere, regarding the so-called subversive elements in this country, than Commander Colmery in his farewell address when he paid his respects to Russian Communists on one hand, and the German Nazis on the other.

HE grouped them together, as they should be grouped, neither have any legitimate place in this country, when they seek to undermine our democratic institutions, and have the unmitigated impudence to suggest, loyalty to some foreign country, in preference to their own.

"A plague on both their houses!" The great service Commander Colmery rendered was in mentioning no words in mentioning the Nazis by name. A loss courageous and more demagogic type would have singled out the "reds" and let it go at that. That would have been safe and easy. For there is no popular support for Russian communism in this country and to adopt such a course would have been clear sailing.

But the Legion leader chose otherwise. In so doing he not only aroused the members of his organization, and the country, to the dangers of a wide-spread subversive movement in this country; but he emphasized the insidious dangers that ANY FORM OF NAZISM, in this country represents,—whether it raises the flag of the Swastika, or the Stars and Stripes.

NO danger of the Legion ever going "red." Not much danger of it ever going Nazi or Fascist, but at one time the latter danger did exist. And it is conceivable the danger might again arise.

If it ever does, men like Commander Colmery deserve the thanks of the country, for using their influence and exerting their leadership at the psychological time to prepare the country for such an emergency, and make any such effort a failure before it starts.

In the World war the Legion fought presumably to make the "world safe for democracy" and failed, for today throughout the world democracy was never in greater danger. If Commander Colmery's example is followed, however, the Legion can have the satisfaction of contributing more than any other organization toward making the COUNTRY safe for democracy in times of peace!

"FIRST Lady gives Nan kiss, as Roosevelt sees Boise." This reads a two-column headline on the first page of today's Oregonian.

Mrs. Honeyman, is to be congratulated. That kiss may well be the kiss of life politically to Portland's representative in the lower house of congress.

Many old timers in Southern Oregon will recall, how Binger Herman of Roseburg defeated all comers in the subsequent election, because he was lucky enough to have his picture taken with President Theodore Roosevelt, on the rear platform of his private car.

THE importance of such association of ideas, in practical politics, accounts for the tremendous demand, for seats of honor in the Presidential entourage, as it passes, through the state of Oregon. We don't know what Mayor Mahoney of Klamath Falls, would give to be in the shoes of Governor Martin or Senator McNary today, but we venture to say it would run into a large out of his official salary. And we won't be surprised if Willis gets in the front row yet. Klamath's perennial candidate, is a resourceful gentleman, and has a way with him.

BUT Mrs. Honeyman wins out anyway. The fact that she had been a Roosevelt bridesmaid, was one of the most effective talking points in the campaign last year, and now the fact that she and Eleanor kiss when they meet, should remove all doubt as to the affectionate intimacy that exists between Multnomah's congressional representative and the "Roosevelt family."

Of course such purely private social relationships have nothing to do with the qualifications of a candidate for office. But they have a heap to do with the way the totals stack up on the morning after. That is why an official kiss here, an official snap-shot there, or a presidential hand-shake somewhere else are so eagerly sought after,—particularly if they get in the newspapers.

Of course a year or two hence the situation may be very different than it is today. Sooner or later the political worm turns, the exact time no one can foresee. But sufficient unto the day is the smacker thereof, as far as our Nan is concerned.

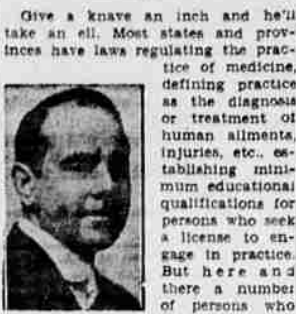

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Comment on the Day's News

AFTER a year of unprecedented labor disturbances, these things have happened to the nation's industry:

Output per man-hour has DECREASED 3.7 per cent. Output per worker has DECREASED 5.2 per cent. Labor cost per unit of output has INCREASED 79.3 per cent.

WHO suffers as a result of this situation? Here is the answer, as plain as the nose on your face: We ALL suffer.

WHY do we suffer? Again the answer is simple and plain. As output goes down and cost goes up, PRICES RISE. As prices rise, our money BUYS LESS.

THE more we produce, the more we have. The less we produce, the less we have. We can't share what isn't produced. All the windy talk indulged in by all the windy demagogues in the world can't change these fundamental facts.

AN effort to understand these fundamental facts, let's make them simple.

Suppose you and I and a dozen others are wrecked on a desert island. Because there are only a FEW of us, it is easy to see that if we work hard and efficiently and get along together we will have more to eat, more to wear and more shelter, whereas if we are lazy and inefficient and spend our time quarreling among ourselves we will have LESS to eat, LESS to wear and LESS shelter.

In a big country containing 130 million people, these things are harder to understand, but they work exactly the same way. We can't get around the fact that the more we produce the more we have and the less we produce the less we have.

THE past four years we have been working less and depending on Santa Claus to feed us. We have been quarreling among ourselves (as witness the epidemic of strikes that has swept the entire country) and letting production run down.

The figures quoted at the beginning of this article show what is happening to us as a result.
