SAVINGS AND LOAN DEPOSITS GROWING RAPIDLY IN STATE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29. (AP) - The federal home loan bank board said today savings accounts in its 23 Oregon affiliates jumped \$1,106,019 the first eight months of this year.

Such savings invested in these and all other federal associations and in many state-chartered associations in the United States are protected through insurance up to \$5000 on each account by the federal savings and loan insurance corporation, a board announced said.

The board added that during the eight-month period, assets of the Oregon associations increased from \$7,700,182 to \$10,158,187.

Direct reduction mortgage loans—those of which the face value of the mortgage is reduced by monthly payments—for construction, purchase, reconduction and refinancing of Oregon homes jumped from \$6,129,425 to \$8,374,421.

Federal associations in Oregon are located in Albany, Baker, Bend, Corvallis, Dallas, The Dalles, Eugene, Grants Pass, Hillsboro, Klamath Falls, Lakeview, McMinnville, Marshfield, Medford, Oregon City, Portland and Salem.

OREGON CITIZENS PAID \$11,095,908 TO U. S. THIS YEAR

Sum Was 57 Per Cent More Than Levied for Last Fiscal Period - Increase Reflects Business Upturn

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29. (AP) - The federal government extracted \$11,095,908.16 from the pocketbooks of Oregon taxpayers during the 1937 fiscal year, the internal revenue bureau said today.

The sum was 57 per cent more than the \$7,070,448.71 levied a year ago.

The increase reflects continued improvement in business, changed provisions and higher rates of taxes applicable with respect to individual and corporation incomes and estates and new levies upon payrolls, said Commissioner Guy T. Helvering.

Less Last Year Oregon's federal contribution, however, was but 24 per cent of the total 1937 collections. Commissioner Helvering reported the 1936 collections from the states and territories amounted to 32.2 per cent less than the 1937 total of \$4,653,195,315.28.

The approximately \$8,000,000 the government derived from income tax sources included \$2,917,783 collected from corporations and \$3,006,692 paid by individuals. The increases represented 45 and 83 per cent respectively above 1936.

The receipts from other specified taxes included the following: Excess profits, \$143,812; "unjust enrichment" (this relates particularly to agricultural adjustment taxes added to the sale price by vendors), \$1,055,814; capital stock, \$527,441; estate transfers, \$1,094,983; gifts, \$45,976.

Liquor taxes, \$1,034,156, of which \$607,360 came from levies on beer and other fermented malt liquors; tobacco manufacturers, \$1488; oleomargarine, \$23,036; narcotics, \$4260; stamp taxes, \$163,501.

Manufacturers' excise, of which \$507,865 came from a 3 per cent levy on power.

Admissions, \$70,382; dues and initiation fees, \$37,166.

Social security act, \$1,218,437, from a 2 per cent payroll tax, and \$210,290 from a 1 per cent tax on employers of eight or more persons.

In the portion of his address devoted to banking activities, Mr. Pfund outlined the organization of the American Bankers' association, 45 years ago, followed 30 years later by establishment of the American Institute of Banking, created for the schooling of bank employees in the methods and ethics of the banking profession.

The organization of the Oregon State Bankers' association and the accomplishments of this state association in furthering agricultural development in the state and encouragement of 4-H and other movements, were outlined by the secretary of that organization. Problems confronting bankers today, including deposit insurance, were briefly covered in Mr. Pfund's concluding remarks.

The speaker was introduced by Al Perry, new program chairman of the Medford Rotary club.

BANK ASSOCIATION SECRETARY TALKS AT ROTARY LUNCH

An interesting address dealing with the responsibilities of citizenship and the manifold activities of banking associations, was delivered before the Medford Rotary club Tuesday by Hans C. Pfund, secretary of the Oregon State Bankers' association.

A large gathering of Rotarians and guests filled the basement banquet hall of the Hotel Medford to hear the enlightening talk.

In his introductory remarks, Mr. Pfund warned against the tendency of one-man leaderships and creation of powerful minorities in municipal, state and national organizations. The "public benefactor number one" is the citizen who limits his activities to a thorough understanding of and active participation in few, important organizations, the speaker maintained.

The good citizen is the man who places his primary interest first in his church, second in his chamber of commerce or similar civic organization, and third, in his trade organization. His influence is not "spread too thin" if this program is adhered to, Pfund said.

EVOLUTION THEORY REPREHENSIBLE IS WORD TO TEACHER

Judge Speaks Out in Hearing of Teacher's Attempt to Regain Job in Small Pennsylvania School.

WAYNESBURG, Pa., Sept. 29. (AP) - Judge Challen W. Wraychoff termed as "reprehensible" today the teaching that man ascended from a monkey. He made his statement at the hearing on Mrs. Laura Elms Morris' attempt to regain her teacher's job in the one-room Bell country school.

The judge commented upon a former pupil's testimony that the teacher said "man was something like an ape."

Always a Man. "I would consider as reprehensible the teaching that man was once a monkey, but not that he was once a lowly creature with his body properly covered with hair, and forced to live in caves or in holes in the ground as protection against wild beasts. But always a man."

Everett Fuller, an eighth grade pupil in the school which Mrs. Morris taught for 11 years before her dismissal on charges of incompetency and cruelty last spring, had testified the teacher made the evolution statement in explaining a picture of prehistoric man.

Only a Joke. Mrs. Morris has denied the charges and explained she was joking. The Fuller boy said Mrs. Morris permitted her pupils to throw mud balls, paperwads and "even over-shoes" in the classroom, but he added:

"She told us, 'You are only injuring yourselves. You're not hurting me as long as you don't make me the target.'"

Everett also said he had seen the teacher punish Eugene Jones, a 12-year-old pupil, with a paddle.

The middle-aged schoolmarm faced her former pupils with smiles as they testified against her in her fight to contest the school board's action on the ground it violated the new state teachers' tenure act.

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Hitler and Duce Part Like Pals at Berlin Depot Dictators Wear Satisfied Smiles at Ending of Five-Day Demonstration of Solidarity in Europe

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Both smiled broadly and appeared to be extraordinarily well-satisfied as they clasped hands warmly in farewell on the Lehrter station platform.

They chatted a few minutes, with Hitler leaning out his car window before the Italian special train pulled out of the station.

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Mussolini's last appearance before the Berlin public was in his ride with Hitler along a sort of "conquerors' trail" en route to the station between tens of thousands of cheering, yelling admirers lined up along the way.

Army detachments, naval units and even the air force turned out at the station with bands to send Hitler and Duce on his way with the same flare and military pomp to which he has been accustomed to his five-day visit to Nazi Germany.

Prior to his departure Mussolini honored Germany's world war dead, then reviewed a mammoth display of the third reich's military strength.

TILLAMOOK HERDS WIN NEW HONORS IN STATE FAT PRODUCTION TEST

CORVALLIS, Sept. 29. (AP) - While the two Tillamook county cow-testing associations continued their three months' supremacy during August, three new herds won individual honors.

The Ben Moushon herd of 14 cows led the state with an average production of 55.3 pounds of fat, closely followed by the Alois Weber herd of 39 cows in Tillamook County association, which turned in an average of 51.68.

Registered Jersey owned by A. C. Althaus of the Multnomah association, which produced 1318 pounds of milk containing 108 pounds of fat, within 1 1/2 pounds of the 1937 record. Second high cow was a grade Jersey, owned by Z. Rusa company of the Coquille Valley association, which produced 97.4 pounds of fat.

Among the 17 associations, Tillamook county led with an average of 35.1 pounds of fat, followed by the Tillamook-Owners Sampler, Coos county, Multnomah county, and Western Douglas associations.

Another record in total number of cows tested was made with 11,937 on the list.
