

ASHLAND COUNCIL MAY COMPENSATE BANDMEN FOR CONCERTS IN PARK

ASHLAND, Sept. 30.—(Sp.)—The city council put a tentative figure of \$520 in the 1938 budget Tuesday night to pay members of the municipal band for participation in Lithia park concerts, after O. F. Carson, a baritone in the band for the past 32 years, requested that such action be taken.

Members of the council were sympathetic, discussion indicated, and the matter will be thoroughly considered when the budget is studied for the first time at a special meeting called for next Friday night.

Carson pointed out that bands in other cities are paid, and that the concerts are even more important in Ashland because of the fame enjoyed by Lithia park, setting for the presentations. He said it was becoming more difficult to get full participation in the band, especially from the younger musicians, and that all the members were entitled to some compensation.

If the allocation is made, it will bring to \$1000 the sum spent by the city for the band, since Director Ward V. Crott is now paid \$480 annually to conduct the organization.

Councilman Ralph E. Koozer expressed the opinion that if the money is granted, there should be some assurance of more music for civic affairs.

ORIN R. GARRETT PASSES IN YREKA

Orin R. Garrett, who resided in Medford until three years ago, when he took up residence at Tule Lake, Calif., passed away Sunday at a hospital in Yreka, where he was taken on account of pneumonia.

Mr. Garrett was 50 years of age. He was born in Illinois, February 16, 1887. The body was brought to Medford Wednesday by Conger funeral parlors.

He leaves besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Garrett of Medford, two brothers, Chas. C. Garrett of Medford and F. A. of Wellsville, Mo.

Funeral services will be held at the Conger chapel at 1 p. m. Friday with Rev. James Hamilton officiating. Interment in Siskiyou Memorial park.
