Milk Bottle Cops on California Line Aim of S.F. Dairy

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The Golden State company, dairy products firm, sought advice from Attorney General U. S. Webb today on legality of state line inspections to stop theft of milk bottles.
"We have a good law in California that makes it a misdemeanor for one company to use another's bottles—but there is a racket in shipping the bottles to other states," Secretary K. H. Keefer said.
"We have just learned that a lot of our bottles have been gathered up and shipped to Oregon. We are going to take it up with Oregon officials to see if they can do anything about it.
"Unless we can stop the thefts we may have to use paper bottles, such as we have been using in resort business at Yosemite and Lake Tahoe. The paper bottles are more expensive to use, and we don't want to change."

Australia Suffers From New Illness

SYDNEY, Australia.—(AP)—A new fever has been discovered in Queensland, and doctors trying to discover its cause have named it "Q."
The "Medical Journal of Australia" says attention was drawn to the illness by a number of cases among workers in a Brisbane meat-works.

OREGON QUOTA IS 640 IN CCC ENROLLMENT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The Civilian Conservation Corps will enroll 123,107 young men and 10,136 war veterans during October, Director Robert Fechner said.
Oregon's quota is 640 men.
Last minute shifts in camp sites for the period from October 1, 1937, to March 31, 1938, include, in Oregon, discontinuance of camps on the Sitkayon national forest near Agness and on private land near Condon, and the establishment of a camp in Coos county.

Outlook On Turkeys Encourages Growers

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Anticipating increased fall business because of mounting consumption of turkey meat, the annual convention of the Northwest Turkey Growers' association closed here today.
"The outlook for American turkey growers is very encouraging, compared with last year," said Harry J. Berrink of Seattle, newly elected president.
The new president, succeeding P. J. Davis of Cedaredge, Colo., is general manager of the Washington co-operative egg and poultry association.
