

DAUGHTER KILLS MOTHER, BROTHER TAKES OWN LIFE

Wife and Son of Detroit Attorney Found Dead in Abandoned Auto—Second Son Is Grazed by Bullet

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Oct. 1.—(AP)—A mother and two of her children died of bullet wounds in separate shootings which Sheriff Jacob Andres described today as "double murder and suicide."

The bodies of Mrs. James G. McHenry, 55, wife of a Detroit attorney, and of her 7-year-old son, James Jr., both shot through the head, were found in an abandoned automobile near a cemetery a mile from Ann Arbor this morning.

A daughter, 22-year-old Ruth McHenry, was found fatally wounded in the family home at Detroit last night, a .22 caliber rifle beside her.

A fourth member of the family, 14-year-old Donald, was grazed by a bullet at the Detroit residence as he returned from school yesterday. He ran to a neighbor for help, and came back to find Ruth with a bullet in her head. She died at a hospital two hours afterward.

McHenry, who maintains a summer home at Ypsilanti, came to Ann Arbor at noon today. Sheriff Andres of Washtenaw county said he identified the bodies.

The sheriff said he believed Ruth shot and killed her mother and brother some time yesterday, then returned to Detroit to take her own life. The abandoned automobile was parked since noon yesterday in the spot where deputies found it.

Edward B. Green, assistant professor of psychology at the University of Michigan, said Ruth McHenry was staying at his home for the past three months, under the observation of Mrs. Green, who also is a psychologist.

CHINA ASKS L-N CONDEMN NIPPON

GENEVA, Oct. 1.—(AP)—China today flatly asked the League of Nations advisory committee on the Sino-Japanese war, on which the United States is a consultative member, to declare her a victim of Japanese aggression.

The request embodied the draft resolution submitted to the committee by Dr. V. K. Wellington Koo, Chinese delegate to the league, and demanded that the committee:

1. "Condemn the violation of international law and contractual obligations" of which the resolution accuses Japan.
2. "Condemn the illegal blockade of the Chinese coast."
3. "Declare the facts" constitute a case of external aggression."

New School Board For Rich District

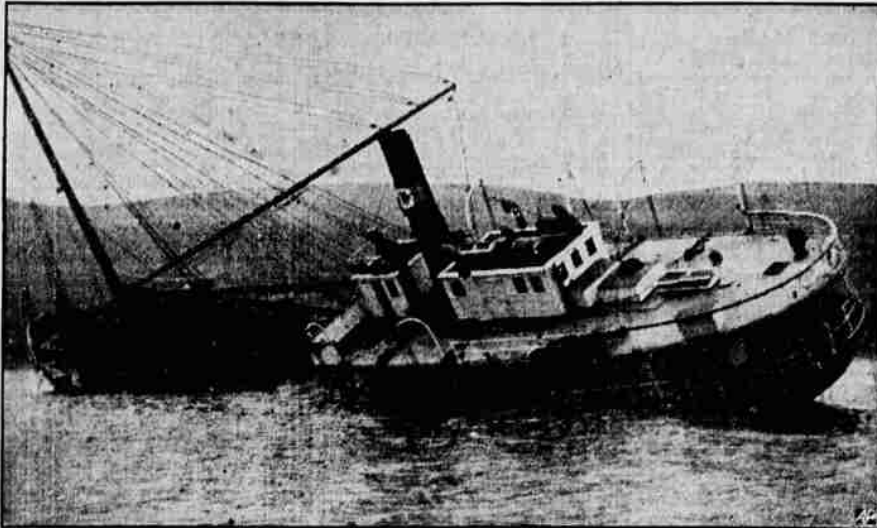

PORTLAND, Oct. 1.—(Sp)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who was greeted by the noisy acclaim of thousands when she passed through Portland Tuesday with her husband, the president, walked unescorted and almost unrecognized into the waiting-room of the Swan Island airport where United Air Lines passengers here last night.

She was en route to New York to fill a speaking engagement. Asserting that "it has all been in the newspapers" she laughingly declined to be interviewed.

TWO LOSE LIVES IN AUTO UPSETS

EUGENE, Oct. 1.—(AP)—O. J. Brown of Portland lost his life last night when his automobile overturned on a sharp curve four miles from Oakridge. The victim was pinned beneath the car.

A second Lane county crash critically injured Mrs. Roy Mean of Eugene. She was not expected to live following an accident which sent her automobile crashing into a power pole.

McMINNVILLE, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Fatally injured when her car overturned two and one-half miles south of Carlton, Mrs. Winnie Savage, 39, Portland, died ten minutes after being brought to a hospital here last night.

Sheriff George Manning said the car overturned when it failed to negotiate a turn in the highway.

BENEFICIAL RAIN DRENCHES VALLEY

A steady 12-hour rain drenched the central and upper Rogue River valley last night and today, with no sign of abating.

Outside of possible damage to unripened, ripened tomatoes, County Agent Robert G. Powell said the moisture was highly beneficial, and "doing much more good than harm."

The rainfall was reported general over southern Oregon and northern California.

LONG-WINDED LAWYER FAILS IN K. F. CASES

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Crisp Indian summer weather returned today after 86 of an inch of rain yesterday. The temperature wavered between a 62 degree maximum and a 51 degree minimum.

Despite the day-long oratory of Defense Attorney Boon Cason, Portland, which included references to Belshazzar's feast and a promise to buy the jurors lunch if they ever visited him in Portland, a circuit court jury last night convicted Byron Barpee, James Pulver and The Embassy, local night spot, of conducting gambling games, after deliberations of only about 10 minutes.

The circuit court trial was on an appeal from a justice court conviction, in which the defendants were fined \$250 each. Judge Edward B. Ashurst will impose new sentences. Cason put on no defense case, relying solely on his arguments.

Falls 130 Feet in Car. HOOD RIVER, Oct. 1.—(Sp)—Marvin Roth, apple warehouse employe, hopped his car over a 130-foot bluff near Dae, but escaped with only minor cuts and bruises. The accident occurred as Roth attempted to turn his automobile on a narrow road.

1940 "New Deal" To Be Inevitable Claims Copeland

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Senator Copeland (D-N.Y.) predicted today that what he called the "new deal" would be inevitable at the polls in 1940, with its presidential candidate selected from among President Roosevelt, Senator La Follette (P-Wis) and John L. Lewis.

The prospective candidates likely will be picked in that order "according to the present outlook," he told reporters.

"I think a new deal victory is inevitable in the next election, so far as we can see now," Copeland asserted. "I dislike to say that because my wishes are the other way."

FEAR BERLIN, ROME TO AID INSURGENTS

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Diplomatic quarters here are concerned by reports that Berlin and Rome are planning to foster a "drastic onslaught" in Spain to capture Madrid and endeavor to assure Inaugural General Francisco Franco a victory before winter.

Agreement on this action in an apparent effort to evade the issue of foreign volunteers in Spain, these quarters said, is believed to have been reached by Premier Mussolini and Reichschancellor Hitler in their talks at Berlin.

American Traveler Killed

ATHENS, Greece, Oct. 1.—(AP)—An American traveler and a British flying officer lost their lives when the British Imperial Airways flying boat Courier, sister ship of the Atlantic survey planes Cambria and Caledonia, sank today in landing on Phaleron bay. The bodies of Roy Henderson, the American, and Wing Commander D. Aeland of the British air force were recovered.

VANDERBILT HEADS BAR ASSOCIATION

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Arthur T. Vanderbilt—who taught night classes in Newark to work his way through law school—became head of the American Bar association today and immediately rallied lawyers to the task of "improving the administration of justice."

Number 1 problem confronting the bar, said the 49-year-old successor to Frederick H. Strinchfield of Minneapolis in his first speech to the association after taking office, is the "unparalleled growth of our administrative tribunals and the executive justice administered by them."

He referred to governmental agencies and boards which "have been called upon to take over problems which the legislature has neither the time, the knowledge nor the technical skill to handle."

Portland Firm Low On Road Contract

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Harold Blake, Portland, entered the low bid of \$42,738.23 for surfacing 16.2 miles on the Fremont national forest highway in Klamath and Lake counties, the U. S. district engineer's office announced today.

Among other bidders were: F. C. Hall company, Eugene, \$60,306.45; E. H. Tschner, Wallfowa, \$65,614.00; Clifford A. Dunn, Klamath Falls, \$67,350.75; McNutt Brothers, Eugene, \$69,147.20; F. C. Dillard, Medford, \$83,722.90.

CIO Gains Support Of Marine Firemen

PORTLAND, Oct. 1.—(Sp)—The C.I.O. gained the support of the marine firemen of San Francisco today in its efforts to break through an A.P.L. boycott of the sawmill industry.

George Brown, vice-president of the C.I.O. lumber union affiliate, reported the firemen ordered their local branch to send men aboard the schooner W. P. Chamberlain, Jr. The A.P.L.-C.I.O. jurisdictional clash halted loading operations two weeks ago.

PROGRAM OF CCC CUTS 244 CAMPS OFF PRESENT LIST

Enrolled Strength for Second Quarter of Fiscal Year to Be 300,000 Men, Corps Director Announces

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(Sp.)—Robert Fechner, director of the civilian conservation corps, today announced the CCC operating program for the second quarter of the current fiscal year. This program provides for the operation during October, November and December of 1937 CCC camps, a reduction of 244 in the present number, and the maintenance of the enrolled strength of the corps at 300,000 men.

To bring the camps up to strength, the program calls for the initiation of a replacement enrollment program on October 1, which will continue throughout the month. It is anticipated that more than 100,000 young men and 6000 war veterans will be given an opportunity to join the CCC in October.

The replacement enrollment program scheduled for next month will be the first large enrollment held since the passage of the act of July 1, and setting the maximum enrolled strength of the corps at 300,000 young men and war veterans, 10,000 Indians and 5000 residents of Puerto Rico, Alaska and the Virgin Islands.

Recent surveys conducted by the war department indicate that the discharge of men to accept employment and the dropping out of other enrollees at the conclusion of their enrollment on September 30 will bring the strength of the corps to below 200,000 men on that date. The exact number of men which will be needed to fill the camps to maximum strength will not be available until reports are received from the

To enroll in the civilian conservation corps under the provisions of the new legislation an applicant must be an unmarried male citizen of the United States between the ages of 17 and 23 (last birthday basis), physically able to perform hard work without injury to himself, and free from communicable diseases. The total service allowed in the civilian conservation corps may not exceed two years, using July 1, 1937, as the basis from which the length of service is computed.

To be eligible the law provides that young men possessing the above qualifications must also be unemployed and in need of employment. For the purpose of CCC selection the phrase "unemployed and in need of employment" shall be understood to cover unmarried, junior applicants otherwise qualified by age, citizenship, fitness and character; not regularly in attendance at school; not possessing other regular or full-time employment; who need employment, the job training, the educational and other opportunities offered by the civilian conservation corps; and who themselves, or whose families, due to financial limitations, are not in a position to secure or provide comparable experience and training.

All men selected who have dependents will be required to allot not less than \$22 per month to their dependents. Young men who do not have dependents will be required to deposit a minimum of \$22 per month in a special account which will be paid to them upon completion of their enrollment. Enrollment is for a term of six months and to obtain an honorable discharge this six months' period must be completed unless the enrollee obtains a bona fide offer of employment or unless there is urgent need for his presence at home.

May Re-enroll. No applicant who is regularly attending school or on vacation from school may be permitted to present himself as unemployed for the purpose of CCC selection.
