YOUTH AID FUND ALLOTMENT GIVEN

PORTLAND, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Twenty-three Oregon colleges and universities will receive an allotment of \$115,290 from the national youth administration for aid to students during the 1937-38 school year. Karl W. Onthank, state N. Y. A. director, said today.

The allocation last year was \$254,800, from which 2166 students earned an average of \$1158 a month.

The institutions and their monthly allotments of one-ninth of their year's allocation are: Albany college, \$235; Eastern Oregon Normal, \$255; Linfield college, \$370; Marylhurst college, \$240; Mount Angel college, \$105; Mount Angel Normal school, \$60; Museum Art School, \$15; North Pacific Dental college, \$285; Northwestern Christian college, \$105.

Oregon Institute of Technology, \$225; Oregon Normal school, \$340; Oregon State college, \$4005; Pacific college, \$105; Pacific university, \$255; Portland Bible institute, \$120; Reed college, \$495.

Southern Oregon Normal, \$330; St. Helen's Hall, Junior college, \$135; University of Oregon, \$3,150; University of Oregon Medical school, \$165; University of Portland, \$325; Western Baptist Seminary, \$45; Willamette university, \$795.

FARM PURCHASING POWER SHOWS DIP

CORVALLIS, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Farm purchasing power as measured by the index of farm prices and costs was equal during August of this year to the 1926-30 average but was six points under August 1936, according to the latest summary of agricultural conditions made by the O.S.C. extension economist.

Seasonal influences and good crop prospects have lowered prices slightly in the past two months, though consumer purchasing power remains firm, the report shows. General crop estimates remain high throughout the country, though clover seed production, in which Oregon growers are interested, is far below normal and even below last year's yield.

Potato production statistics this year show a much larger than average percentage of the crop will probably be harvested in the western states. These will be in competition with other foods slightly lower in price than average at wholesale.

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT MAY BE SELECTED AT MEETING OCTOBER 11TH

EUGENE, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The University of Oregon may have a new president on Monday, October 11, it was revealed here late yesterday when it was announced a special meeting of the state board of higher education would be called on that date to consider Chancellor F. M. Hunter's recommendations.

Though no official announcement has been made of the candidates, the list is known to include some of the most prominent educators in the country. Among them are Dr. C. F. Raymer, noted economist of the University of Michigan; Dr. Homer Dodge, dean of the graduate school at the University of Oklahoma; David Faville, of the economics staff at Stanford; Dr. Clarence M. Updegraff, assistant to the president of the University of Iowa, who was on the campus this week, and several other outstanding figures.

It is expected that the decision at the meeting October 11 may not be final, but it is known the chancellor and the board want to secure a president as quickly as possible. Dr. C. V. Boyer has asked to be relieved as soon after September 30 as possible as Mrs. Boyer's health has been poor recently.

GERONIMO'S CAPTOR ANSWERS LAST CALL

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Brigadier General Robert Alexander Brown, 71, United States army retired, the man who captured Geronimo—America's Public Enemy No. 1 of years ago—died here after a short illness.

The old line cavalry officer, a veteran of both the Spanish-American and World wars, had been living quietly here for several years. Death came last night.

It was as a husky, young lieutenant just out of West Point that Brown first attracted attention by tracking down and capturing the Indian chief.

He was one of the senior colonels of the army at the start of the World war and he became a brigadier general and served with the 42nd division overseas.
