

Tiger Tornado Tests Power Against Hood River Invaders Tonight

TILT USHERS IN NIGHT FOOTBALL ON LOCAL FIELD

Kickoff Slated for Eight o'Clock—Soaked Turf Is Expected to Curb Passing—Tigers Keep Lineup

Under the lights at the high school stadium tonight, the Black Tornado of Medford high will receive its first major test of the 1937 football season. A powerful and veteran Hood River high school aggregation, defeated twice but still boasting a potentially great eleven, moves in from the banks of the Columbia river to face the Tigers in the first night football encounter in the history of Medford. The kickoff will be at 8 o'clock sharp.

Plasquin fans of the city, who like to back their favorite with something more than talk, have installed the Tornado of Coach Bill Bowerman as a 13-point favorite. This is probably due to the fact that Hood River, in the opening game of the season two weeks ago, was rapped by Lincoln High of Portland, 7-6, and followed that up with a 13-7 loss to Canas. Their high last Friday night, The Tigers have one game under their belts, an 18-0 win over a strong alumni club last Saturday.

Kickoff Curbs Passing
According to the weather man and from the general appearance of things this afternoon, it looks like the two ball teams will have anything but firm footing on the stadium turf this evening. There will be very little mud, if any, the deep-rooted grass will see to that. But, it figures to be wet, and that, with the possibility of a heavy rain, will undoubtedly preclude any great amount of forward passing or razzle-dazzle.

Both teams use the single wing-back backfield formation and balanced line, depending on sharp jolts inside and outside the tackles for their payoff maneuvers. Coach Bowerman's outfit features the Notre Dame shift, with a lightning-fast quartet of ball-carriers operating behind a line rather weak at the guards but hefty and experienced at the ends, tackles and at center. Reserves are an unknown quality, although they are big.

Hard Week of Drill
In preparation for this first game of a "sudden death" schedule that will either skyrocket the Tigers to the state peak or mean an unseasonable season, Coach Bowerman and his assistants, Ed Kirtley and Russ Acheson, have hammered their charges through a terrific practice week. If the Tornado isn't ready for big-time competition tonight, it won't be the fault of the coaching staff. Rough edges apparent in the alumni game have been pounded into shape, the attack that clicked for three touchdowns in the second half, has been cleaned, and the defense that jockeyed alternately hot and cold has been drilled intensively.

Bowerman announced his starting lineup would be the same, with two exceptions, that started the alumni battle last week. Don Monteth and Red Rott will be at the flanks, Dan Ehrhart and Hubert Santo at the tackles, Wally Rei and Gene Archibald at the guards and John Prentice at center. Prentice replaces Fred Stevens in the opening array, due to a bumped knee the latter received last week.

In the backfield, Warren Bayliss will open at the blocking back position. Bobby Ettinger will be at left half and Jack Hill at right half, and Edon Grow at fullback. Bayliss is replacing Ettinger at the quarterback post and Ettinger is moving into the left halfback position in place of Jack Bowman, who will see plenty of action.

Hood Team Heavier
The Medford line will average 170 pounds and the backfield 165. With the exception of Bayliss, the entire Tiger backfield are ten-second men. Coach Jimmy Carr of Hood River will open with the same line-up as at the ends, Kirtley and Prentice at the tackles, Wirtick and Jensen at the guards, and Gilbrith, center. Dentman will start at quarterback, Bentley and Kobeg will open at the halves, and Hart, a terrific line plunger, will be at full. According to reports from Hood River, the team will average 155 pounds in the line and 175 pounds in the backfield.

Officials will be Jean Berthel of Ashland, referee; Tom Turner of Roseburg, umpire; and Dwight French of Klamath Falls, head linesman.

FOURTEEN ERRORS IN MINOR SERIES

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Fourteen misplays in two games gave the 1937 world series, starting the foremost minor league clubs in baseball, the appearance today of a revival of Shakespeare's "Comedy of Errors."
They Added an uncertain, sometimes comical, touch to the usually serious competition between the leading teams of the American Association and International league, and figured prominently in the action which gave Columbus a two-game lead over Newark in the best-of-eight series.
Eight blunders, five by Newark, were made in the second game last night as the Columbus Red Birds came out ahead in a strange 11-inning engagement. The score was 5 to 4, the same as that by which the association champions won the opener Wednesday.

MAJOR LEAGUE FIELD SONS, ALBANY COLLEGE JOCKEYS FOR CHOICE SPOTS AS END NEARS COLLISION AT ASHLAND

With the world series battle lineup all settled, and little old New York once more in exclusive possession, the also rans of the major league races settled down today to the business of picking the choicest spots remaining before the season ends Sunday.
When Carl Hubbell, the old con- vincer, put on the clincher with a five-hit, 2-1 win over the Phillies in the opener of a double bill yesterday—his 32nd of the year—the pennant races officially closed. The Giants had retained their National league laurels and qualified to tangle with their New York neighbors, the Yankees, in the series beginning next Wednesday.

It didn't matter that the Phils won the second game of the double bill, 6-2, against a makeshift lineup, or that the Yankees dropped their first twin bill of the year, losing 6-3 and 6-3 to the Athletics.

Yesterday's results also ended the fights for second place in both circuits. The Jinxed Chicago Cubs, taking their fifth straight game by topping the Cincinnati Reds, 4-1, rested securely in the National league runner-up spot, 8 1/2 games in front of their nearest rivals. At the same time, the Detroit Tigers, despite a 10-3 kicking around by the St. Louis Browns yesterday, couldn't be ousted from the No. 2 American league berth.

The rest of the first divisions in each loop remained in doubt, however.

Paired with Don Budge of Oakland, the world's greatest amateur player, the 30-year-old former queen of the courts displayed her old-time form as they eliminated Dorothy Andrus of Stamford, Conn., and Bobby Ruggs, Los Angeles, yesterday.
It was in the 48th annual Pacific coast championships, in which Mrs. Moody is entered only in mixed doubles. She played easily, placing her shots accurately and serving powerfully.
Mrs. Moody and Budge won the match, 6-3, 4-6, 6-1.

COAST SPOTLIGHT CENTERS ON U. S. C. CLASH WITH HUSKY

Stanford-Oregon and California-Oregon State Other Contests in Coast Conference Slated for Saturday

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The Pacific coast football spotlight will swing to Los Angeles tomorrow, where Washington and University of Southern California will battle in the most important of three conference clashes.

While California takes on Oregon State at Berkeley and Stanford meets Oregon at Eugene, the Huskies and Trojans, who with the California Bears are considered the big three of the conference, will meet on about even terms.
Both Prose Might
Washington proved its might by defeating Iowa, 14 to 0, last Saturday. U. S. C. walloped Amos Alonzo Stagg's College of the Pacific outfit, 40 to 0. California, which showed remarkable strength in snowing St. Mary's under a 30-to-7 score last Saturday, will open its conference play as top-heavy favorite over Oregon State. The Beavers lost to Idaho, 7 to 6, last week end.

Stanford, beaten 13 to 7 by Santa Clara, will go into the conference scramble against Oregon, who also lost its opener to University of California at Los Angeles last Friday night, 26 to 13.
An important non-conference game will pit Washington State against Idaho at Pullman. University of San Francisco entertains Daniel Baker college of Texas, in an inter-sectional game.

UCLANS Resting
U. C. L. A. will rest this week-end and play Stanford the following Saturday.
Gonzaga, which held Washington State college to a scoreless tie last Saturday, meets St. Mary's here Sunday. The Gaels were given a slight edge.

Wyoming and Nevada meet at Reno, Occidental will face San Diego State at San Diego; Pacific university and Portland will meet on the latter's field; and Ricks college and Idaho, southern branch, will play at Pocatello in other leading western contests.

In night games tonight, Whitworth will battle Willamette at Walla Walla, Wash.; Redlands and Loyola will meet at Los Angeles; and Fresno State college will play Willamette at Salem, Ore.

The game will open the season for both teams.
