

# Comedy-Romance With Bing Crosby, Martha Raye On Craterian Screen

### SONG HITS, PRETTY GIRLS FEATURED IN SPARKLING MUSICAL

With several famous comedians and comedy teams appearing in the supporting cast, "Double or Nothing," co-starring Bing Crosby and Martha Raye, opens a three-day showing today at the Craterian theatre.

Included among the more famous are Mary Carlisle who holds the distinct honor of being the only leading lady who has appeared in a second Crosby picture (her first being "College Humor"); Andy Devine, gravel-throated comic who has been making quite a name for himself recently on air shows; hard-boiled William Frawley; Fay Holden, Samuel S. Hinds, William Henry, the eccentric dancing team of Ames and Arno, the Calgary Brothers and Frances Faye.

In addition there is an aggregation of some seventy-five beautiful girls and handsome men known as the "Sing Band." This group uses no musical instruments yet "plays" popular music by imitating the various instruments of a dance orchestra so closely that it is said to be almost impossible for the human ear to tell the difference.

Crosby sings three new numbers during the course of the picture—"The Moon Got In My Eyes," "All You Have To Do Is Dance," and "It's the Natural Thing To Do." Two numbers especially written for Martha Raye's individual style are "It's On—It's Off" and "Listen My Children and You Shall Hear." The Sing Band also "plays" another new number, "After You," with Crosby joining the "band" for "Smarty."

"Double or Nothing," latest of the new show season offerings, is a gay comedy-romance which concerns a fortune-hunting foursome who set out to win a million dollars—offered to the one who can double \$5,000 in 30 days. Phoney stock, hole-in-one courses, canoe service piloted by ex-chorines, and a night club are the four methods of trying for the prize. From each comes some of the many hilarious film offers, interspersed here and there with specialties by the many entertainers in the cast.

### PHILIPPINE HEAD ASSAILS COURTS

**MANILA, Oct. 2.—(AP)—**President Manuel Quizon tonight claimed the "right and duty" to "arrogate the Philippine judiciary at the bar of public opinion," and credited President Roosevelt with creating in a similar manner a "wholesome effect" on United States courts.

Quizon asserted it was his official duty to criticize the courts "whenever in my opinion a denunciation of a wrongful act, even though performed in good faith, would be in the public interest."

Addressing the faculty and students of Santos Tomas University, his alma mater, Quizon pointed out that his oath of office required him to "do justice to every man."

"Justice shall be done to the poor and humble of this country," he said, "as long as I am president, I am determined to fight for the rights of everybody, rich and poor alike, but more particularly for those who have no money with which to pay expensive lawyers."

### OSAGE MATRIMONY SPREE EXPENSIVE

**PAWHUSKA, Okla., Oct. 2.—(UP)—**A prospective Osage Indian chief and his bride were united in marriage tonight following a week's celebration of ancient tribal marriage customs.

The week's festivities, which cost the tribe more than \$20,000, were attended by more than 2,000 Osages, colorfully dressed in blankets and ceremonial costumes.

John McKinley, Jr., the bridegroom, purchased his wife with horses, after the tribe's custom, and the bride, May Vest, showered her husband's people with clothing, keeping for herself only the clothes her husband provided.

The couple, following the custom of their forebears, were only slightly acquainted before their wedding. They are both related to Chief Fred Lockout, and it is believed they may some day rule the Osage tribe.

### Zimmerman Tells Low Bounty Upon State Farm Plan Japan Generals

**SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 2.—(AP)—**The nation's first "grain roots" hearing closed here today after four senators of an agricultural subcommittee had heard more than 50 witnesses, representing nearly 100 per cent of the farmers of the Pacific northwest, approve federally supervised agricultural administration.

Peter Zimmerman of Yamhill, Ore., representative of the Oregon State grange and the Oregon farmers' union, outlined a six-point program his organization had adopted along the general lines of the Fope-McGill bill for parity income of farmers and the Pope bill for crop insurance.

"The farmer, I find is the lowest paid man on the farm," he said. "The congress if it is sincere, must pass legislation which will insure the farmer at least his cost of production in years of heavy yield and insure him from losses in lean years."

### Violence Marks Labor Election

**SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—(UP)—**John F. Shelley, president of the San Francisco labor council who was beaten severely by asserted teamster delegates at the recent state Federation of Labor convention, left here tonight for Denver, Colo., as the representative of the local council at the American Federation of Labor convention.

By a vote of 204 to 191 Shelley was elected delegate over Fred West, candidate backed by teamster leaders, who have criticized Shelley's so-called "middle-of-the-road" policy in attempting to bring harmony between warring factions of the A.F.L. and the C.I.O.

### Portland Mayor Rushes East To End Labor Fuss

**PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 2.—(AP)—**Labor's three-way struggle for control of Oregon's sawmill and logging industry remained deadlocked today, while the C.I.O. and the Industrial Employees' Union filed additional charges of Wagner act violations.

The A.F.L. announced plans to halt loading of lumber on the Norwegian vessel Brandanger Monday, and brought a retort from E. B. O'Grady, Oregon CIO director, that the ship will be loaded. O'Grady predicted the boat will become a "new battleground."

The C.I.O. filed revised charges of "lockouts" against six Portland sawmills with Charles W. Hope, national labor relations board regional director, at Seattle. O'Grady attacked by both the C.I.O. and A.F.L. as an alleged "company union," the I.E.U., successor to the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, struck back by filing NLRB charges against the New Grande Rondo Lumber company at Willamette. The union asserted the mill sold its employees to join the A.F.L. or forfeit their jobs, and paid certain wages below I.E.U. standards.

National labor board charges against the I.E.U. are now pending hearing. Both the C.I.O. and A.F.L. charged the union with violation of the Wagner act.

Meantime, Mayor Joseph K. Carson was en route to Washington, D. C., where he declared he will seek to obtain "further information relative to our present (labor) difficulties." He said he will see labor board and other officials.

**ALBANY, Oct. 2.—(P)—**Wiley Driver, an employee of a construction company, was being sought today by 40 men in the Cascade Summit region near Iron mountain, south of the Santiam highway, where he disappeared last night. He and two companions were deer hunting and separated, agreeing to meet at Soda Forks at dusk. Driver failed to appear.

### Tropical Rains Hit New Orleans

**NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 2.—(AP)—**New Orleans residents waded today in a flood from rain caused by two tropical disturbances that merged in the Gulf of Mexico.

Water stood from a few inches to four feet deep in some streets. Precipitation of more than 1.54 inches was measured by weather bureau observers within 22 hours. In the afternoon the downpour slackened.

Thousands of persons were marooned in home or offices. Damages ran into thousands of dollars.

A tide several inches deep swept into famous Canal street, heart of the business district. Transportation and telephone service was demoralized. Some streets flooded with heavy wood blocks almost floated away.

The rain was the heaviest since the Good Friday deluge of 14.1 inches in 1927.

### Wheeler Absent At FDR. Welcome

**HELENA, Mont., Oct. 2.—(AP)—**An "important engagement" in California will prevent Senator Burton K. Wheeler, Montana's senior representative in congress, from joining treasury state citizens in welcoming President Franklin D. Roosevelt to the state Sunday.

Senator Wheeler telegraphed the Helena bureau of the Associated Press today from Gerber, Calif., saying he was writing his sincere regrets to the president that he would be unable to be in Montana for the chief executive's visit.

**Pedestrian Killed**  
**KIAMATH FALLS, Oct. 2.—(P)—**Wilbur F. Aber, about 40, of Coquille was fatally injured today when he was struck by a car as he attempted to cross The Dalles-California highway north of Merrill.

**China Acts**  
**NANKING, Oct. 2.—(P)—**China, believing the force of world opinion to be behind her, will press immediately for economic sanctions against Japan, a foreign office spokesman declared today.

**5 Workers Die**  
**DETROIT, Oct. 2.—(P)—**Five men were killed and at least a dozen workers injured this afternoon in a new interceptor sewer on West Jefferson avenue here when a construction crew was caught in a "sand boil."
