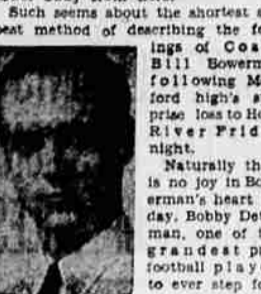

### Return of Prosperity, Epidemic of Injuries and Surprise by Bees Major Developments of Year

Major job of focusing the experts was turned in by the Boston Bees. Rated a seventh or eighth place outfit, they finished just a game out of fourth place on the strength of two 20-game pitching rookies, Lou Fette, who hit the 20-mark yesterday with a 6-0 shutout over the Phillies, and Jim Turner.

**OK, here is Mr. I. Pickem, and he mutters to let go both barrels. He says that nothing can phase him any more following this last football week-end. With what little prognosticating pride he has left, he points to the fact that he is still on a par with the "flip a coin" method of naming the winners. He also claims he has one shirt left, although this is doubted. Anyway, the old average is an even 500 now, slashed from a neat 567 last week because eight out of 12 so-called football games Saturday refused to wind up in the required fashion.**

**Statistics of the game showed how superior the Tiger line was to that of Hood River's. During the first half, the visitors gained only 20 yards through the Medford forwards, while those same linemen were opening huge holes through which Tiger backs raced for 176 yards, net. All told, Hood River gained 70 yards on the ground, but 50 of them came in the second half, while Medford, frantic, was employing a five-man line in an attempt to halt a barrage of forward passes. There is no team that can use a five-man line and effectively halt a running attack.**

**Behind the line, Medford's quartet of ball-packers ran all over the field. It proved it had speed, ruggedness and shiftness. It also proved it needed considerable drilling in staying with its blockers. Time after time, Hill, Grow, Campbell, and even Ettinger, swung wide around end and, instead of following a small army of wipers-up on out, cut back in to unseated. Only once did that prove effective: Ettinger broke loose on a cut-back and went 50 yards to the goal line. Every other time the mail-carrier left his interference, he was knocked over. In Ettinger's case he did it by pure speed more than anything else, literally outracing the Hood River secondary.**
