

# GRANT CITIZENSHIP TO 13 IN FEDERAL COURT CEREMONIAL

Thirteen men and women were admitted to American citizenship by Judge James Alger Fee in United States district court this morning.

They were presented to the court as qualified for citizenship by W. Blackman, examiner for the Immigration and naturalization service. The citizenship oath was then administered.

The legal proceedings completed, Judge Fee recessed court so that a patriotic program might be carried out in the courtroom for the new citizens. The program was conducted by the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War and the American Legion. Col. W. H. Paine, retired army officer and prominent Legionnaire, was chairman.

The program was opened with a recitation of the George Washington prayer by Mrs. G. Q. D'Albini of the D. A. R. The American's Creed was then recited by D. A. R. members, led by Mrs. H. E. Armstrong, regent of the local chapter.

Col. Paine welcomed the naturalized Americans into citizenship, pointing out that they were now to participate fully in the rights and benefits as well as duties and responsibilities of United States citizens. He congratulated the new citizens upon their fitness for citizenship and welcomed them into the United States partnership.

American flags were presented to each of the new citizens by Mrs. Armstrong for the D. A. R., Mrs. G. W. Nelson gave to each a code telling the proper use of the American flag, acting for the Daughters of Union Veterans. Mrs. Minnie Albaugh expressed a welcome for the Daughters of Union Veterans and asked the new citizens to keep untarnished the flag for which the Union soldiers fought and died.

# L-N COMMITTEES AGREE JAPANESE VIOLATED PACTS

ments over widely separated regions of the country.

The conclusions continued: "After examination of facts laid before it the committee is bound to take the view that military operations are carried on by Japan against China by land, sea and air out of all proportion to incidents that occasioned the conflict; that such actions cannot possibly facilitate or promote the friendly co-operation between two nations that Japanese statesmen have affirmed to be the aim of their policy; that it can be justified neither on the basis of existing legal instruments nor on that of the right of self-defense, and that it was in contravention of Japan's obligations under the nine-power treaty of February 6, 1922, and under the pact of Paris of August 27, 1928."

Concession to China

Besides invoking the nine-power treaty, it was understood also that the concessions were made to a Chinese demand that the nine-power conference invitation should not be the only action taken. The Chinese representatives insisted the league also should recognize its obligation to act.

A draft of the proposals is to be submitted later to the subcommittee of thirteen, and if approved there to be then presented to the full advisory committee which in turn would report to the league assembly.

# DOUGLAS COUNTY PIN BALLS IN PLAY

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 5.—(P)—Pinball machines continued in operation in Douglas county today despite the district attorney's order banning them after midnight Saturday.

The situation took a new turn today with the announcement of District Attorney J. V. Long that a complaint and warrant of arrest would be issued against Earl Bush, one of the principal operators, and the case tried in the criminal court.

The action follows the recent opinion by Circuit Judge Carl Wimberly dismissing an injunction suit by Bush on the grounds that a court of equity lacked jurisdiction.

# ITALIANS ASSUME THEY'RE IN CLASS OF PEACE LOVING

BERLIN, Oct. 5.—(P)—Official quarters here were reluctant today to discuss President Roosevelt's Chicago speech calling for universal peace, pending a study of the president's complete text.

On the basis of brief reports on Mr. Roosevelt's statements, the tendency in the Wilhelmstrasse was to assume the president was referring principally to the far eastern situation.

"The speech will have tremendous repercussions," the spokesman said. "The full backing of the United States for nations who are working to preserve peace means that they will be greatly strengthened."

—Welcome, they said, these days when democracies must guard against propaganda from the anti-communist front just as much as against propaganda which totalitarian states have about.
